Acclaimed journalist Simon Shuster gives us the first inside account of the Russian invasion of Ukraine from the perspective of President Volodymyr Zelensky and his team, who granted him unprecedented access to their compound in Kyiv for several months, where he wrote *The Showman*.

Time correspondent Simon Shuster chronicles the life and wartime leadership of Volodymyr Zelensky from the dressing rooms of his variety show in Ukraine to the muddy trenches. Based on four years of reporting; extensive travels with President Zelensky to the front; and dozens of interviews with him, his wife, his friends and enemies, his advisers, ministers and military commanders, The Showman tells an intimate and eye-opening story of the President's evolution from a slapstick actor to a symbol of resilience. The book's early chapters offer the first detailed account of Zelensky's life in a nuclear bunker in the opening weeks of the invasion and the circumstances of his wife's escape to safety with their children. Later, as the Russians retreat from Kyiv, we see Zelensky and his team emerge from the bunker and lead Ukraine in a series of crucial victories. The result is a riveting, up-close picture of the invasion as experienced by its number one target and improbable hero.




An award-winning sociologist unearths how a group of ordinary people debilitated by excruciating pain developed their own medicine from home-grown psilocybin mushrooms—crafting near-clinical grade dosing protocols—and fought for recognition in a broken medical system.

Cluster headache, a diagnosis sometimes referred to as a 'suicide headache,' is widely considered the most severe pain disorder that humans experience. There is no cure, and little funding available for research into developing treatments.

When Joanna Kempner met Bob Wold in 2012, she was introduced to a world beyond most people's comprehension—a clandestine network determined to find relief using magic mushrooms. These 'Clusterbusters,' a group united only by the internet and a desire to survive, decided to do the research that medicine left unfinished. They produced their own psychedelic treatment protocols and managed to get academics at Harvard and Yale to test their results. Along the way, Kempner explores not only the fascinating history and exploding popularity of psychedelic science, but also a regulatory system so repressive that the sick are forced to find their own homegrown remedies, and corporate America and university professors stand to profit from their transgressions.

From the windswept shores of the North Sea through the verdant jungle of Peruvian Amazon to a kitschy underground palace built in a missile silo in Kansas, Psychedelic Outlaws chronicles the rise of psychedelic medicine amid a healthcare system in turmoil. Kempner's gripping tale of community and resilience brings readers on a eye-opening journey through the politics of pain, through the stories of people desperate enough to defy the law for a moment of relief.





Work, Intimacy, and the Power of Connecting

With the rapid development of artificial intelligence and labor-saving technologies like self-checkouts and automated factories, the future of work has never been more uncertain, and even jobs requiring high levels of human interaction are no longer safe. *The Last Human Job* explores the human connections that underlie our work, arguing that what people do for each other in these settings is valuable and worth preserving.

Drawing on in-depth interviews and observations with people in a broad range of professions—from physicians, teachers, and coaches to chaplains, therapists, caregivers, and hairdressers—Allison Pugh develops the concept of "connective labor," a kind of work that relies on empathy, the spontaneity of human contact, and a mutual recognition of each other's humanity. The threats to connective labor are not only those posed by advances in AI or apps; Pugh demonstrates how profit-driven campaigns imposing industrial logic shrink the time for workers to connect, enforce new priorities of data and metrics, and introduce standardized practices that hinder our ability to truly see each other. She concludes with profiles of organizations where connective labor thrives, offering practical steps for building a social architecture that works.

Vividly illustrating how connective labor enriches the lives of individuals and binds our communities together, *The Last Human Job* is a compelling argument for us to recognize, value, and protect humane work in an increasingly automated and disconnected world.

Allison Pugh is a professor of sociology and chair of the Department of Women, Gender and Sexuality, University of Virginia. She is the author of *Long and Beonging* (University of California Press), which won the 2010 William J. Goode award for the best book in the Sociology of the Family, and was a finalist for the 2010 C. Wright Mills award; and of *The Tumbleweed Society* (Oxford), and she is the editor of *Beyond the Cubicle: Job Insecurity, Intimacy and the Flexible Self* (Oxford).



The first and only book to tell the story of Disney Channel and its magical, miraculous heyday.

It wasn't always destined for greatness: by the early '90s the lineup was a scattered selection of nature programming and live broadcasts like the American Teacher Awards. But then, Disney hit gold, launching a random reboot of the '50s stalwart The Mickey Mouse Club. In a nationwide talent hunt, they cast a roster of then-unknowns which included Britney Spears, Christina Aguilera, Justin Timberlake, Ryan Gosling, JC Chasez, and Keri Russell. The show — and the channel — exploded with tweens. And a new target demo was born.

Under the guidance of their new network president, Anne Sweeney, Disney leaned into their new direction hard, becoming the first network to create programming for kids aged 9-14 that their parents could still stomach watching—all produced at once, with no more than sixty-five episodes per show. Even Stevens and Lizzie McGuire were part of that first mold; That's So Raven would be the first to break it when the network ordered seventy-eight episodes in order to avoid the uproar that met the "cancellation" of the first two. It was clear that fans wanted more, and Disney wanted to give it to them. But they'd made the mistake of letting Britney, Christina, and Justin go on to lucrative careers which didn't give them a cut of the money, a mistake they'd quickly rectify by locking their talent into restrictive, all-encompassing contracts. Disney was a star maker, churning out endless content to ravenous fans. But, as recent years have shed light on the intense struggles that come with burdening your young stars with purity rings, morality clauses, paparazzi, weight loss, sexuality, drug use, and no support network, the question remains: did Disney create stars, or just use them before abandoning them when things got hairy?

ProPublica recently revealed that Texas billionaire and Federalist Society donor Harlon Crow has been funding the lifestyle of Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas and his wife, conservative activist Ginni Thomas, detailing hundreds of thousands of dollars in undisclosed gifts, flights on Crow's private jet, and payments to cover boarding school tuition for Thomas's grand-nephew. Richard Painter, an ethics lawyer who served in George W. Bush's White House, decried the corruption: "This is way outside the norm, this is way in excess of anything I've seen. This amount of undisclosed gifts? You'd want to get them out of government."

In Stench, New York Times bestselling author David Brock will pull together, in powerful narrative detail, the untold deeper story of how this plot against America unfolded, a story in which the author himself played a key role, a grim saga of a stealth campaign to accomplish a right-wing revolution in the law and American society as a whole through cynical manipulation of the judicial conformation process. We cannot comprehend this riveting political moment, or the country's future course as a representative democracy, until the truth behind these breathtaking plots by secretive groups, like the Federalist Society and the Opus Dei movement inside the Catholic Church, is fully revealed and tied together in Stench, a hidden history of the hijacking of U.S. democracy.

It seeks to impart a sense of wonder about past civilizations based on new and revolutionary science. All of these past apocalypses have set us on the road to where we are now; modernity has been built, brick by brick, out of endless end times. Our current world is just one, imperfect, already post-apocalyptic option among many ways of being. Jagadish Shukla is a renowned climate scientist responsible for our ability to predict weather more than 10 days in advance. In the 1970s, Shukla created dynamical seasonal prediction—a new way of calculating climate trends that upended everything we knew about weather prediction. He then went on to teach scientists and governments the world over how to improve their prediction techniques, which in turn saved lives, made agricultural practices more effective, fed more people, and overall gave us better weather forecasts. He's just a wonder, as is this proposal, which is an inspiring and hopeful memoir of his life and work.

It's thanks to Shukla's discovery that we understand hurricane season as extensively as we do, or that we can see an extreme heatwave coming far enough in advance to warn the communities it will hit hardest. Throughout the subsequent years he founded a first-of-its kind meteorological institute. *A Billion Butterflies* will illuminate, inform, and inspire. Understanding dynamical seasonal prediction will change the way you experience a thunderstorm or interpret an entire city's monthly forecast; understanding its origins and the remarkable story of the man who discovered it will change the way you see our world.

Jagadish Shukla is a Distinguished University Professor and the Founding Chairman of the Department of Atmospheric, Oceanic and Earth Sciences at George Mason University. He has made fundamental contributions to the study of climate dynamics and was one of the lead authors of the 2007 report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which shared the Nobel Peace Prize with Vice President Gore.

In *The Creatures' Guide To Caring*, readers will meet an extended clan of caretakers of the natural world, from birds and bees to hyenas and frogs. In the field and in the lab, readers will also meet scientists who are tracking these animals, sketching their family trees, sequencing their DNA, and spying on them by drone. We'll see that their discoveries follow a common theme: no matter the gender (females, males, animals that switch their sex when the time is right) and no matter how closely or distantly related, we animals all use shared genes, hormones, and brain circuitry to care for our young.

Diving into the lived experiences of animals, readers will feel a sense of kinship with other species as they explore the evolution of parenting, even if that kinship is sometimes missing from their fellow Homo sapiens. New research reveals that anyone who spends time caring for an infant can activate the parts of their caretaking brain, which is an ancient brain architecture that we share with parents across the animal kingdom. At its heart, the book asserts that the separations we draw between ourselves and the other animals, or between different types of humans, deny us our humanity. We're all connected; humans evolved to care for children as villages and communities, and all of us carry this legacy in our brains and bodies.

To be clear: this isn't a book for parents only, though there's a lot here that will entice. Whether you're a parent or non-parent, or someone's uncle, daughter, or brother, *The Creatures' Guide To Caring* is for you. We are all born to care.

Emily Lordi, a professor of English at Vanderbilt and a writer-at-large for the *New York Times's T Magazine*, offers the first, comprehensive biography of Whitney, rescuing her from the incomplete and tiresome narrative that has begun to solidify in our collective consciousness. Emily recasts Whitney as the complex, luminous, sui generis woman and artist that she was.

She is considered by many to be the greatest vocalist of the 20th century. She has sold over 200 million records worldwide, won six Grammys, had 11 number ones, and her rendition of "I Will Always Love You" is the longest-running number-one single by a female artist—*ever*. She released her first album, Whitney Houston, in 1985—an instant classic and the very first record by a solo female artist to produce three number-one singles—and her last in 2009. After reaching stratospheric heights of fame and success, she tragically died in 2012 when she drowned in a hotel bathtub, with drugs in her body. Project Total Recall is a gripping exploration of the new frontier of brain science: optogenetics.

Memories are the windows to our lived-in realities and are what makes us who we are. During Steve Ramirez's first year of graduate school at MIT in 2012, he and his colleague Xu Liu turned on a light (a literal light—that's the "opto" in optogenetics) that would birth a new field of neuroscience: memory manipulation. Now, the stuff of sci-fi is becoming scientific fact every other week: we can shoot light into the brain to modulate neural activity and alleviate Parkinson's symptoms; we can turn depression-related symptoms on and off; and, we can view how thoughts are formed in the brain and how they manifest in pathological conditions.

Project Total Recall is an ultimate insider's account of cutting-edge neuroscience, which has launched a full-scale revolution in the way we treat and classify broken brains.

Steve Ramirez is a Junior Fellow at Harvard University and an Assistant Professor of Neuroscience at Boston University, where he is also the principal investigator of the Ramirez Group. His work in artificially manipulating memories has appeared in Science and Nature, and has been covered by *The New York Times, The Boston Globe*, and *TIME Magazine*. Steve has won numerous teaching and science awards, including the Smithsonian Magazine's "American Ingenuity" award, a Forbes "30 Under 30" award, and National Geographic Society's Emerging Explorer award, and he has also delivered TED talks.

A Biography of Sickle Cell Anemia and the Excruciating Quest to Cure the First Molecular Disease

In the vein of *The Emperor of All Maladies* and *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, Curved Air* will spin a gripping tale of incredible scientific possibility and devastating neglect and will appeal to the enormous audiences who bought these bestselling titles. This rich, nuanced, untold story, weaving science, history, medicine, politics, economics and ethics in a breezy, accessible style, is long overdue.

Curved Air is the groundbreaking story of sickle-cell disease, the classic hereditary blood disorder colloquially known as the "invisible malady." For more than a century, sickle-cell disease has symbolized the best of modern biomedical science. In the 1950s, it was the first genetic mutation to be described; in the 1970s, it was the first disease to be diagnosed prenatally using DNA testing; and in 2020, it was the first disease to be essentially cured using a revolutionary new gene editing tool. Yet, there is another, darker side to sickle-cell disease. Sickle-cell disease patients—whom are predominately African American—are frequently denied desperately needed pain medications by hospital staff who question the validity of their symptoms. Meanwhile, many patients lack basic information about and/or access to effective generic drugs and screening tools. Curved Air will bring "the invisible malady" into the spotlight and is set to be the definitive biography of one of the most notorious genetic diseases affecting humankind.

Placing science and modern medicine at the center of a vital and far-reaching historical and societal story, *Curved Air* will weave together the heartbreaking, inspirational stories of sickle-cell patients and their families with the story of sickle-cell itself, from that first officially described case in Chicago, through the pivotal discoveries over the past century that first revealed SCD to be a molecular disease, spurring a revolution in prenatal DNA diagnosis. It is a story set against the backdrop of medical racism that has hindered SCD research, funding, and medical care for decades.

Adam Met is the bassist for the hugely popular band AJR and the cofounder of Planet Reimagined, a nonprofit that addresses climate change through media. In *Amplify*, Adam harnesses his interdisciplinary thinking and experience as a musician, activist, and thought leader to explore how the music industry sparks passion, builds awareness, and engages supporters—plus how and why these tactics can and should be adopted for social change.

Combining storytelling about music and activism in the vein of Bono's *Surrender*, the scientific research into behavior of Jonah Berger's *Invisible Influence*, and the hands-on tactics and strategies of *Made to Stick*, this is an essential book for activists and anyone who designs campaigns and works to develop fan bases, audiences, or customers. There is a long history of music impacting social movements—slaveera spirituals, Vietnam War protests songs, even AJR's own "Burn the House Down," a song which the March for Our Lives movement adopted. While their celebrity certainly helps get the word out, musicians and the music business in general, have also developed concrete ways of connecting and activating large groups of people. And through his work with causes and activists, Adam has seen that successful music and winning social movement campaigns share important elements: popular and diverse participation; concrete and realistic goals; and effective strategies, effectively implemented. And *Amplify* will teach activists new strategies for succeeding in each of these areas.

START WITH A BEAR

How Sharing Our World with One of Its Biggest, Baddest Animals Could Save Us All

In the vein of *The Soul of an Octopus* and *Braiding Sweetgrass, Start with a Bear* is an inspired response to one of humankind's most pressing questions: How can we coexist with other species on a warming, increasingly crowded planet? The key is to focus on our largest and arguably most complicated animals, known as megafauna, and this book argues that, of them, the animal from which we can learn the most is perhaps the most polarizing of them all: the grizzly.

Ursus arctos or grizzly bears, also known as brown bears, occupy a pivotal place in the global extinction crisis. They are uniquely beloved, uniquely threatened, and uniquely poised for a comeback. Few people want a grizzly as a neighbor, and yet there are benefits to learning to live tolerantly, even peacefully, with big, formidable animals. Learning, or relearning, to do so can repair damaged ecosystems, make rural communities more resilient, help heal past injustices, and inspire a diverse new generation of conservationists. Thus, the prospect of recovering grizzly populations has become a test for larger conservation efforts, and nowhere is this test more fraught than in California. Grizzlies have been extinct in California for a century, but in the past few years efforts to bring them back have finally, and unexpectedly, gained momentum and are now being watched closely by everyone. If we can bring grizzlies back to California, the possibilities—for other species, other places, for the entire earth—are endless.

At the fore of these crucial efforts is the author of this book, Pete Alagona, who founded the California Grizzly Alliance in 2016. The group's ultimate goal is to reintroduce brown bears to the Golden State and to use this process as a template for improving human-wildlife coexistence around the world. And now it seems possible that California could see the return of its storied mascot within a decade, which would follow on the heels of this book's publication and make it a must-read for anyone interested in how make big ideas happen for the planet and its most iconic creatures.

The Global Fight for Dominance

In this new age of global conflict and competition playing out alongside the rise of AI, there has never been a greater need for a grounded understanding of how technology will change the way countries compete for their place in the world.

In *Bytes and Bullets*, Steven Feldstein, Senior Fellow at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, shows how technology is already upending how actors wage war. He explains that the winners will be the countries that can adopt disruptive technologies quickly—from AI systems and autonomous drones to satellite internet and advanced semiconductors—and the losers will be those that cannot. The fallout from this shift will very likely reshape our world in dramatic fashion.

The fascinating and frightening new piece of this equation lies in the uncertainty of who those winners and losers might be. More than at any other time in recent history, a single company, organization, or individual can alter the geopolitical playing field with swift and extreme consequences. For readers of Chris Miller's *Chip War*, David Sanger's *The Perfect Weapon*, Rush Doshi's *The Long Game*, and Levitsky and Ziblatt's *How Democracies Die*, *Bytes and Bullets* will take readers to Türkiye, where a single inventor created the cheapest, most reliable drone on the market, and is now responsible \$6 billion a year in weapons export earnings. It will take readers to the Ukraine battlefield where one unstable American CEO could decide the fate of the conflict through his control of Starlink. And it will take readers to the war in Israel and Gaza, where a simple tech breakthrough, likely discovered by a small group of individuals, allowed Hamas militants to evade Israel's Iron Wall.

Illuminating, timely, and engrossing, *Bytes and Bullets* shows that, to make sense of the coming world, we must understand how the new tools of conflict will rewrite all the rules.

Did you know the most fertile agriculture in human history occurred not in farm fields (the product of gigantic exertions of energy, science and tech) but with little effort in small garden beds? *Tiny Gardens Everywhere* is a kaleidoscopic, untold history of urban provisioning from environmental historian Kate Brown.

In a radical revisitation of urban, working-class history, *Tiny Gardens Everywhere* shows how, in the very bellies of market capitalism, some people managed to balance between wage labor and an alternative, market-shy world by making alliances with the microbial, vegetal, and animal kingdoms to create garden communities and grow their own food. The book's narrative rotates between these urban, food sovereignty projects of the past and similar trajectories in the present. The chapters in each section spin from eighteenth-century England to fin-de-siècle Berlin, Jim Crow Washington, DC, WWII in Germany and the US, postwar lawn enclosures in Memphis and Chicago, self-provisioning in Tallinn, Estonia, and alternative food movements in Mansfield, Ohio and Amsterdam in the 2020s.

It's a globe spanning tale—a future-facing book that addresses what people can do in these days of climate crisis. Contemporary passages in Tiny Gardens Everywhere will alter the imagination of what we think is possible as we face planetary environmental problems that loom so large that we often feel too paralyzed to take action, and are intended to serve as a primer for people interested in urban renewal and growing their own tiny gardens.

Kate Brown is an award-winning historian of environmental and nuclear history at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Her previous books include *Manual for Survival* and *Plutopia*, which won seven academic prizes.

The night sky has been a source of inspiration for religion and storytelling for as long as we've lived under the stars; some Aboriginal Australian oral star-stories seem to date back tens of thousands of years. But these are the last few years we'll be able to find an uninterrupted view of the stars, as international regulators have greenlit hundreds of thousands of new satellites proposed by Musk and competitors to launch over the next decade.

Ferrying the reader from ancient ruins to the cutting edge labs dissecting the harms of light pollution on animal – and human – subjects, *Starry Night* asks vital questions about our relationship with nature, the pursuit of meaning and connection, and the need to safeguard our precious ecosystems and a human future that doesn't involve subordinating even the health of once-unreachable ecosystems to the whims of venture capitalists. For readers of globe-trotting environmental adventure narratives a la David Quammen & Elizabeth Kolbert's *The Sixth Extinction*, and hidden universes a la Neil deGrasse Tyson and Ed Yong's *An Immense World*.

They played advance pressings of their albums for one another, and on those occasions the sense of rivalry bubbling beneath the surface of their relationship became apparent to others in the room. Beneath the competitiveness and cutting remarks, however, there was a bedrock of mutual admiration and respect. *Bob Dylan and the Beatles* will be a major new consideration of these beloved artists.







At the age of 16, he escaped persecution and made his way to America as a refugee. At age 28, he secured a billion-dollar IPO. 
task. Before this, I didn't have the means to achieve that programmatically, and I don't think many other people did either.

And then this is two days later. It shows how I was able to tuke the flow fields to create more complex constructions and add color to it. That delivered the early hints of what was to come later with Fidenza.

And I had really started to pay attention to the spacing. This one reminded me of corais and sea anemones. It had an organic quality to it while being very simple. The shapes are not overworked, not pretentious, and I loved that.


I started to introduce more variety and more variations of scale, more dynamic compositions. The positions of the segments, the thickness, these are all randomized. But they're randomized within a window. Which gives me a sense of control, but still gives the computer room to surprise me with something unexpected. In this I was liking the rhythmic quality particularly.

So now I started to move into color. There are a million ways colors can go wrong that just become obnoxious or overbearing. The way it works is I define a color palette by hand. I hand select the color and assign a probability to each color—so, a 70 percent chance of a shape being white, 20 percent chance of it being blue, and so on. Lots of surprises occur, some good, some really bad.




This gets closer to a finished work. It was for an interior mural that a company had commissioned. It was the same session as the preceding images—in 2020.

And, finally, Fidenza I started to hear about NFTS in '21. Started hearing about Art Blocks, which is a particular platform that serves generative art through the block chain. I felt it would be a natural fif for my work. I submitted an application to Art Blocks in 2021, said, "Hey I'm Tyler, Art Blocks sounds awesome, I have this program I think will really work well." I showed them these sorts of outputs and said this is the kind of thing I would like.





As indigenous scientist and author of *Braiding Sweetgrass* Robin Wall Kimmerer harvests serviceberries alongside the birds, she considers the ethic of reciprocity that lies at the heart of the gift economy. How, she asks, can we learn from indigenous wisdom and the plant world to reimagine what we value most? Our economy is rooted in scarcity, competition, and the hoarding of resources, and we have surrendered our values to a system that actively harms what we love. Meanwhile, the serviceberry's relationship with the natural world is an embodiment of reciprocity, interconnectedness, and gratitude. The tree distributes its wealth—its abundance of sweet, crisp berries—to meet the needs of its natural community. And this distribution insures its own survival. As Kimmerer explains, "Serviceberries show us another model, one based upon reciprocity, where wealth comes from the quality of your relationships, not from the illusion of self-sufficiency."

As Elizabeth Gilbert writes, Robin Wall Kimmerer is "a great teacher, and her words are a hymn of love to the world." *The Serviceberry* is an antidote to the broken relationships and misguided goals of our times, and a reminder that "hoarding won't save us, all flourishing is mutual."

Robin Wall Kimmerer is a mother, scientist, decorated professor, and enrolled member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation. She is the author of the #1 New York Times bestseller Braiding Sweetgrass: Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge and the Teachings of Plants as well as Gathering Moss: A Natural and Cultural History of Mosses. Kimmerer is a 2022 MacArthur Fellow. She lives in Syracuse, New York, where she is a SUNY Distinguished Teaching Professor of Environmental Biology, and the founder and director of the Center for Native Peoples and the Environment.





There are many miles from the business school and basketball court at the University of Southern California to 50 million viewers for the final episode of a TV show called Magnum P.I. Tom Selleck has lived every one of those miles in his own iconoclastic and joyful way.

Frank, funny and open-hearted, *You Never Know* is an intimate memoir from one of the most beloved actors of our time, the highly personal story of a remarkable life and thoroughly accidental career. In his own voice and uniquely unpretentious style, the famed actor brings readers on his uncharted but serendipitous journey. His rambunctious California childhood. His clueless arrival as a good-looking college jock in Hollywood (from the *Dating Game* to the Fox New Talent Program to co-starring with Mae West and escorting her to black-tie social functions). His journey offers a truly fresh perspective on a changing industry and a changing world. Beneath all the charm and talent and self-deprecating humor, Selleck's memoir reveals an American icon who has reached remarkable heights by always insisting on being himself.


A hilarious and moving memoir in essays about love and allyship, told through one Asian and Black interracial relationship.

When Nina Sharma meets Quincy while hitching a ride to a friend's barbecue, she spots a favorite book, Maxine Hong Kingston's *The Woman Warrior*, in the back seat of his cramped car, and senses a sadness from him that's all too familiar to her. She is immediately intrigued. In *The Way You Make Me Feel*, Sharma chronicles her and Quincy's love story and examines how their Black and Asian relationship becomes the lens through which she moves through and understands the world.

In a series of sensual and sparkling essays, Sharma reckons with caste, race, colorism, and mental health, moving from her seemingly idyllic suburban childhood through her and Quincy's early sweeping romance in the so-called postracial Obama years and onward to their marriage. Growing up, she hears her parents talk about the racism they experienced at the hands of white America—and as an adult, she confronts the complexities of American racism and the paradox of her family's disappointment when she starts dating a Black man. While watching *The Walking Dead*, Sharma dives into the eerie parallels between the brutal death of Steven Yeun's character and the murder of Vincent Chin. She examines the trailblazing Mira Nair film *Missis-sippi Masala*, revolutionary in its time for depicting a love story between an Indian woman and a Black man on screen, and considers why interracial relationships are so often assumed to include white people.

Written with a keen critical eye and seamlessly weaving in history, pop culture, and politics, *The Way You Make Me Feel* reaffirms the idea that allyship is an act of love.

Nina Sharma's work has appeared in *The New Yorker, Electric Literature, Longreads*, and *The Margins*. She served as the programs director at the Asian American Writers' Workshop and currently teaches at Columbia and Barnard College. She is a proud cofounder of the all–South Asian women's improv group Not Your Biwi.

A striking literary memoir of genderfluidity, class, masculinity, and the American Southwest that captures the author's experience coming of age in a Tucson, Arizona trailer park.

Newly arrived in the Sonoran Desert, eleven-year-old Zoë's world is one of giant beetles, thundering javelinas, and gnarled paloverde trees. With the family's move to Cactus Country RV Park, Zoë has been given a fresh start and a new, shorter haircut. Although Zoë doesn't have the words to express it, he experiences life as a trans boy—and in Cactus Country, others begin to see him as a boy, too. Here, Zoë spends hot days chasing shade and freight trains with an ever-rotating pack of sunburned desert kids, and nights fending off his own questions about the body underneath his baggy clothes.

As Zoë enters adolescence, he must reckon with the sexism, racism, substance abuse, and violence endemic to the working class Cactus Country men he's grown close to, whose hard masculinity seems as embedded in the desert landscape as the cacti sprouting from parched earth. In response, Zoë adopts an androgynous style and new pronouns, but still cannot escape what it means to live in a gendered body, particularly when a fraught first love destabilizes their sense of self. But beauty flowers in this desert, too. Zoë persists in searching for answers that can't be found in Cactus Country, dreaming of a day they might leave the park behind to embrace whatever awaits beyond.







Griffin Dunne's first three decades of growing up among a family of larger-thanlife characters and cultural forces in Hollywood and Manhattan were filled with extraordinary incident.

At nine, Sean Connery saved him from drowning. At thirteen, desperate to hook up with Janis Joplin, he attended his aunt Joan Didion and uncle John Gregory Dunne's legendary L.A. party for the publication of Tom Wolfe's *The Electric Kool-Aid Acid Test*. At sixteen, he got kicked out of boarding school, ending his institutional education for good. In his early 20s, he shared an apartment in Manhattan's Hotel Des Artistes with his best friend and soulmate Carrie Fisher, while she was filming some sci-fi movie called *Star Wars* and he was a struggling actor working as a popcorn concessionaire at Radio City Music Hall. A few years later, he produced and starred in the now-iconic film *After Hours*, directed by Martin Scorsese. In the midst of it all, Griffin's 22-year-old sister Dominique, a rising star in Hollywood, was brutally strangled to death by her ex-boyfriend, leading to one of the most infamous public trials of the 1980s, which ended in a travesty of justice that also somehow marked the beginning of their father Dominick Dunne's career as a bestselling author of true crime narratives.

And yet, for all its bold-face cast of characters and jaw-dropping scenes, *The Friday Afternoon Club* is no celebrity memoir. It is, down to its bones, a family story that brilliantly embraces the poignant absurdities and best and worst efforts of its loveable, infuriating, funny, and moving characters—its author most of all—finding wicked, self-deprecating humor and glints of surprising light in even the most harrowing and painful of circumstances.


As an aspiring novelist in his early twenties, Cory Leadbeater was presented with an opportunity to work for a well-known writer whose identity was kept confidential. Since the tumultuous days of childhood, Cory had sought refuge from the rougher parts of life in the pages of books. Suddenly, he found himself the personal assistant to a titan of literature: Joan Didion.

In the nine years that followed, Cory shared Joan's rarefied world, transformed not only by her blazing intellect but by her generous friendship and mentorship. Together they recited poetry in the mornings, dined with Supreme Court justices, attended art openings, smoked a single cigarette before bed.

But secretly, Cory was spiraling. He reeled from the death of a close friend. He spent his weekends at a federal prison, visiting his father as he served time for fraud. He struggled day after day to write the novel that would validate him as a real writer. And meanwhile, the forces of addiction and depression loomed large.

In hypnotic prose that pulses with life and longing, *The Uptown Local* explores the fault lines of class, family, loss, and creativity. It is a love letter to a cultural icon—and a moving testament to the relationships that sustain us in the eternal pursuit of a life worth living.

Cory Leadbeater received his MFA in fiction from Columbia in 2014, where he was the recipient of the Jacob P. Waletzky Fellowship. Before that, he attended Trinity College, where he was the recipient of the Fred Pfeil Memorial Prize in Creative Writing, the John Curtis Underwood Memorial Prize in Poetry, and the Ruel Crompton Tuttle Prize in Scholarship. My Fight to Become the First Transgender Olympic Runner

By turns harrowing and hopeful, *Make It Count* is the inspiring story of the first openly transgender woman to win a NCAA title, following her traditional upbringing in Jamaica, her fight to become a US citizen, and her efforts to achieve her Olympic dreams.

CeCé Telfer is a warrior. The first openly transgender woman to win an NCAA championship, she has contended with transphobia on and off the track since childhood. Now, she stands at the crossroads of a national and international conversation about equity in sports, forced to advocate for her personhood and rights at every turn. After spending years training for the 2024 Olympics, Telfer has been sidelined and silenced more times than she can count. But she's never been good at taking no for an answer.

Make It Count is Telfer's raw and inspiring story. From coming of age in Jamaica, where she grew up hearing a constant barrage of slurs, to beginning her new life in Toronto and then New Hampshire, where she realized what running could offer her, to living in the backseat of her car while searching for a coach, to Mexico, where she trained for the US Trials, this book follows the arc of Telfer's Olympic dream.

This is the story of running on what feels like the edge of a knife, of what it means to compete when you're not just an athlete but treated like a walking controversy. But it's also the story of resilience and athleticism, of a runner who found a clarity in her sport that otherwise eluded her—a sense of being simply alive on this earth, a human moving through space. Finally, herself.



CeCé Telfer is a Jamaican-American athlete who, in June 2019, became the first openly transgender woman to win a NCAA title. Telfer became a NCAA National Champion in the 400- meter hurdles event which put her on the trajectory of becoming a U.S. Olympic hopeful for the Tokyo Olympics 2021.

In June 2021, Telfer qualified for the 2021 U.S. Olympic Team Trials | Track & Field in the 100M & 400-meter hurdles. Following her victory in the 400-meter hurdles, Telfer appeared on ESPN's Outside the Lines on June 13, 2019. Telfer has appeared on multiple national media outlets and campaigns capturing global attention in Olympic sports, the LGBTQ community, along with world-renowned professional athletes and Olympians.

A SURVIVOR'S EDUCATION

Women, Violence, and the American Campus


A moving, timely and engaging memoir of domestic abuse, the American campus, and the narratives we choose to believe.

In Berkeley, on a picturesque university campus in the springtime, a young woman is shoved backwards down a concrete stairway by her partner. This follows months of escalating violence, during which he slams her into walls, chokes her, pours beer on her, threatens to kill her, stalks her, promises to split her head open with a hammer. She ends the relationship, cuts off contact, flees to the other side of the country, and initiates a Title IX case against him at the university. She knows what has happened to her, what she has experienced and survived: abuse, manipulation, threats against her life, gaslighting. She knows she has lived through these trials. But others say, simply, that she hasn't—and that her boyfriend is the real victim.

In this investigative memoir, historian and journalist Joy Neumeyer explores how violence against women is portrayed, perceived, defined, and adjudicated today, decades after the inception of Title IX. Interweaving the harrowing account of the abuse she experienced at the hands of her boyfriend when they were graduate students with those of other women who faced violence on campuses throughout history, Neumeyer offers a startling look at how little has changed n the years since Title IX was enacted, and uncovers its inherent flaws. She takes us through her own experience with the process, and reveals how in an effort to listen to survivors on campuses, the quasi-law, in reality, brings their experience into question.

Deeply reported, nuanced and timely, *A Survivor's Education* demystifies Title IX while also examining how entangled storytelling is with abuse and power, and how we can balance narrative and evidence in our attempts to determine what "really happened."







In 2016, Josiah Hesse wrote a deeply personal piece for *The Guardian* detailing the raw, emotional scars he still carried from his fundamentalist Christian upbringing. The piece immediately went viral, striking a chord with thousands of readers, and for Hesse, an "exvangelical" with only a 10th-grade education this was a moment of triumph. *Child Left Behind: An Exvangelical Memoir* uses Hesse's inspiring story of awakening and escape to expose how these conservative Christian conmen routinely stripped communities, such as Hesse's hometown of Mason City, IA, of their wealth, sanity, and self-esteem.

Hesse takes the reader on a very personal journey, from the stifling, working-class town of Mason City, through the institutions of the Christian right: a toxic mixture of schools that taught creationism, Christian camps that taught sexual shame, and greedy preachers that siphoned his community's wealth while preaching materialism and humiliating the poor. As it was for so many of his peers, such an upbringing was a funnel for Hesse to a career of 45 demeaning low-wage "disposable" jobs, all the way to Denver, CO, and Hesse's dawning awareness that God didn't exist, the world wasn't going to end, and that he was woefully unprepared for a future he never thought would arrive. Child Left Behind tells a story that goes far beyond that often-asked question: "why did 81% of evangelical voters—the majority of them poor, working class—support Donald Trump?" In it, Hesse brings deep feeling and piercing immediacy to what he describes as "the socioeconomic tragedy of the American working class." His journey from terrified zealot to self-educated journalist provides a lens into a much larger tale, one which reveals just how the Republican Party galvanized conservative evangelicals into the political force known today as the Christian right, decades before Trump ever uttered the phrase "Make America Great Again."

From documentaries to films to other books, Mo has been involved as a crucial figure in managing Pac's posthumous legend but has carefully monitored and withheld stories and involvement to ensure that he could tell his own stories, in his own words, when the time came. There is nobody else who sits at Mo's unique intersection of experiences; nobody else as accomplished a writer, rapper, producer, and who has witnessed so much history so intimately. And that space was Barneys.

Gene's memoir will tell the story of how he created the coolest department store the world has ever seen. It will also tell the story of the Pressmans: How his grandfather Barney founded the store downtown on 17th Street in 1923. What Barney's son Fred though should—and should not—happen with the store, as he looked to Europe's and Japan's menswear designers. And how Gene arrived on the scene and soon insisted on his own fiefdom within the business: an alcove on the top floor, where he'd bring in a few women's lines from Paris and see how that went. This memoir is about fathers and sons and brothers, about family dreams and drama in a city where all of it and more was and is still possible. It is a quintessentially New York story of the Pressman family, one of the city's most consequential dynasties, and the tale of a young man's indelible coming of age.

Told in stories and photographs (Melissa is an accomplished photographer with an extraordinary archive), the book will plunge readers into the riot and romance of one of the most mythologized decades in music.

Melissa's story includes some of the most recognizable names in rock history. There are her "grunge parents," Hole's Courtney Love—whose band Melissa joined in the wake of her husband Kurt Cobain's suicide—and Billy Corgan, the Grammy-winning impresario whose Smashing Pumpkins have disbanded and reunited for over three decades. Melissa toured with a "who's who" of 90s rock acts (Sonic Youth, Nine Inch Nails, Pavement, Marilyn Manson, Beck) that will appear throughout the book, to say nothing of the romances she enjoyed. One suitor whom she did connect with on a profound, spiritual level was Dave Grohl, who was finding success with his band Foo Fighters just as Melissa left Hole for The Smashing Pumpkins. Melissa's perspective on the 90s rock scene is singular in that she was one of the few involved who resisted the pull of substance abuse. She possesses clear, vivid recollections of episodes otherwise lost amidst addiction, chaos, and tragedy. Beyond capitalizing on nostalgia, this book is Melissa's emergence as a talented memoirist and authoritative voice of her generation. Hers is the story

of a young woman's journey through the extremes of fame, creative success, tragedy, frustration, romance, and reinvention, all the while trusting her moral compass and strong sense of self—and the occasional dream-like premonition—to guide her to where she needed to be.

Can you inherit a gene for being a good mother? Or a bad one?

The birth of her daughter Clementine doesn't immediately answer all the questions Ruthie has been asking. But by the end of this moving, profound, and ultimately joyful journey, she understands that mothering is built from its own code, and that she and Clementine have left an imprint on each other that is stronger than DNA—it's called love.


Death Row Welcomes You traces the interwoven lives of condemned prisoners and the men and women who come to Riverbend Maximum Security Institution on a near-weekly basis to visit them.

With their Monday night gatherings at the heart of the story, the book traces the paths that brought the characters — visitors and convicted murderers alike — to death row. These visitors are, for the most part, not activists, nor are they killer-obsessed death row groupies. In most cases they are average people whose lives, not to mention their views on the death penalty, were turned upside down by a face-to-face meeting with a death row prisoner. Through his reporting, Hale was introduced to many of the people that make up the community at the center of *Death Row Welcomes You*. It has afforded him a perspective that no other journalist has been granted, largely because Tennessee's Department of Correction has all but shut off official media access.

Hale writes with humanity, empathy, and insight earned by befriending death row prisoners and standing witnessing to their final moments.

Steven Hale is an award-winning writer who worked for ten years as a staff reporter covering criminal justice and politics for the *Nashville Scene*. He has written extensively about Tennessee's death row, for which he won an Association of Alternative Newsmedia "Best Reporting" Award in 2020.





In the spirit of critically acclaimed works such as Lawrence Wright's *God Save Texas* and Juan Gonzalez's now-classic history the *Harvest of an Empire, The Crossing* will provide readers with critical insights into the role of Latinos in America — and demonstrate the ways in which questions of race, power, and culture in El Paso are inextricably linked with both the past and present of the United States. Counter to prevailing narratives of the Lone Star State as a place of gun-toting Wild West mavericks, El Paso has long defined itself as a center of cooperation, progress, and racial harmony: a society that normalized intermarriage in the 19th century; established one of the nation's first integrated school districts in the 1950s; and, as early as 1965, became the first large Latino-majority city in the United States.

This is not to say that El Paso has been untouched by violence or racial bigotry. As a crucial gateway to both Mexico and the American West, El Paso has played host to its share of armed conflicts over the last six centuries, often grappling with outsiders who brought their own battles to this otherwise peaceful place. Indigenous tribes fought for primacy; conquistadors staked their claim; and both Mexican and American troops shed blood on the banks of the Rio Grande in clashes over land and power. More than simply a chronicle of character and events, Parker offers a deep analysis of El Paso's significance on the border, in the Southwest, and in the history of America's origins.

Richard Parker is the son of a Mexican mother and an American father, and grew up in El Paso, TX. His writing has appeared in *The Atlantic, Texas Monthly, Politico Magazine, The New Republic, The Los Angeles Times, The Philadelphia Inquirer, The Miami Herald,* and *The New York Times,* among others.





Poison, Profit, and the Woman Who Battled Big Lead and Transformed the World

This new work of historical narrative nonfiction tells a previously untold story following pioneering physician and public health expert Alice Hamilton, who almost single-handedly created the field of workplace safety and waged a fierce war against the booming American auto industry, whose use of leaded gasoline was poisoning factory workers and the American public.

Hamilton worked in Chicago as a pediatrician, but when she heard about the ailments of her young patients' parents, she turned to investigating their workplaces, which were often factories. What she found was appalling: poor ventilation, widespread use of hazardous chemicals, and a lack of even basic precautions. The most problematic component lead, which was used because it improved the performance of paint, plumbing, and building materials. But workers were becoming gravely sick and sometimes even dying in large numbers.

Hamilton is the titular doctor, but she had a formidable foil in her quest to protect workers and warn the public about lead. Here we meet Thomas Midgley, a driven inventor who applied his brilliant mind to the puzzle of how to make gasoline more effective in automobiles. His work, mostly at General Motors, led to the adoption of harmful leaded gasoline in cars around the world. Leaded gasoline, along with Midgley's other perilous invention led *New Scientist* to eventually call him "a one-man environmental disaster." But his first opponent was Alice Hamilton. *The Doctor and the Inventor* is, foremost, the riveting story of Hamilton and Midgley's decade-long battle over the merits of leaded gasoline, but also of the age-old tension between what an industry owes its labor and its consumers, and of what it means to stand up for what you know is right, even when you're in the extreme minority, and even when victory is not guaranteed. This book will introduce Alice Hamilton as the next unsung hero of workers' rights and public health at a moment when we are finally revisiting parts of American history and realizing that women have played a much larger part in it than we've been led to believe.

Jorge had been pulled from the family's Dodge Caravan, not by narcos with gold-plated AK 47s, but by Mexico's marine special forces, the nation's most elite counter-cartel unit, soldiers trained in American bases who had worked with the U.S. Army's Delta Force, DEA, CIA, and two years earlier had become legends after they captured infamous drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

In the Mexican press, the campaign of terror became known as la limpieza, the cleansing. But why would a country's own military inflict such injustice on its own people, individuals with no known ties to cartels? And why was no one—neither the Mexican police nor the United States' State Department, which has an obligation to investigate the deaths of US citizens abroad—doing anything about it?

We Want Them Alive follows three individuals as they seek answers to those questions: Maria, the determined mother who with a group of women set out to do the impossible; Raymundo Ramos, a former journalist and human rights activist rumored to be allied with the local cartel; and a marine, an anonymous soldier who will lift the veil on how America's chosen weapon in the drug war became mass murderers.

A history of The Grateful Dead's monumental speaker system and the superhuman ambition, invention, and drama behind its rise and fall in the 1970s, the book will draw on new sources and trace a line from the Dead and crew's innovations to the audio technology of today.

Much like the band's four surviving members who are in their 70s and 80s and still tour the world playing shows in front of millions, devotion to The Grateful Dead is a seemingly ageless phenomenon.

It's well known that, by all measures of size, endurance, and fervor, few fandoms rival that of the Dead. Their live music reached an estimated 25 million people in over 2,000 live shows between 1965 to 1995. Even in 2015, the Dead's five-day "Fare Thee Well" Tour broke records for both attendance and pay-per-view streaming. Their ever-zealous followers, Deadheads, inaugurated the now typical practice of superfandom with their mass-documentation of the band since its beginnings, via zines, concert tapes, clothing and merchandise, books and documentaries, photo archives and podcasts. Given the widespread passion for and public scholarship on the Dead, it's surprising that few cultural considerations of the band, in books or otherwise, have focused on the most concrete and literally staggering embodiment of their ingenuity: their groundbreaking speaker system dubbed the "Wall of Sound."

More than just a technological feat and an underexplored piece of Deadhead lore, the story of the Wall of Sound is a tale about human creativity and ambition, with a cast of eccentric, at times neurotic, yet endearing characters who orbited the band and contributed to its zeitgeist-defining rise and an equally dazzling—temporary—downfall.

The Untold Story of Birth Mothers

Bernadette gave her son up for adoption when she found herself pregnant at 17, in an Irish-Catholic household with a mother who had bipolar disorder, and a very strict father who would allow an abortion even though it was legal at the time.

One of the biggest taboos in adoption stories and articles is looking at this life-altering situation from the birth mother's perspective. Books and articles tend to focus on the adoptees and adoptive parents and families. *elinquished: The Untold Story of Birth Mothers* will take readers through Bernadette's own story—how she sought out this son 40 years later, even though she had a successful career and a loving family of four—but even more compellingly, Bernadette will be one of the first journalists to go to states that have outlawed abortion and interview young women who are facing the choice of adoption. To tell the story of birth mothers, Bernadette will lean heavily into memoir, but expand beyond her own experience by using research and interviews to provide a bigger picture, all woven into a narrative that will keep readers turning pages.

When the Supreme Courts draft to overturn Roe was first leaked, it included the phrase "domestic supply of infants" in Justice Alito's opinion, and he footnoted in his statement "...nearly 1 million women were seeking to adopt children in 2002 (i.e., they were in demand for a child), whereas the *domestic supply of infants* relinquished at birth or within the first month of life and available to be adopted had become virtually nonexistent." The argument seemed to be that if fewer women were given access to abortion, then more families hoping to adopt could be accommodated. What's not accounted for in this perspective are two reasons Bernadette wants to write this book: 1) Adoption is not an answer to abortion. Adoption, on the other hand, is an answer to the question, do you wish to (or are you able to) parent this child you have borne? And 2) To fully answer the second question, birth parents need to have information on what's involved. But since women like her have been so disgraced and discredited, their stories are not in the cultural vernacular and thus are unavailable to help people know what they're getting into.

Perhaps it is the juxtaposition of these unlikely traits working in harmony that mirrors our own human condition and causes the lakes to produce a magnetic pull on us. We often assume these lakes are barren and inhospitable, unaware of the crucial role they play in our ecosystems, the global water cycle, and public health. But Caroline Tracey is paying attention.

In Salt Lakes Caroline braids memoir and science writing to reveal the beauty and necessity of these underestimated bodies of water. Each chapter of her book will focus on a different salt lake, examining its conservation history, imperiled future, and intersections with her own story. As Caroline learns about these vulnerable lakes and the decades-long fight to protect them, she begins to explore her own queer identity and to build the boundary-defying life she's always longed for. In Caroline's deft hands, salt lakes become a symbol of resilience; a call to protect all that's rare and fragile in our environment and in our lives; and a reminder that each of us will need to adapt to our rapidly changing world. Her blend of memoir and science writing will appeal to fans of H is for Hawk by Helen McDonald and

Lab Girl by Hope Jahren. But we also anticipate that it will find a place on the shelf alongside other gorgeously written queer memoirs, like Carmen Maria Machado's In the Dream House and Maggie Nelson's The Argonauts.

Skillfully blending memoir, biography and narrative history, *The Coded Life* is a book about fatherhood and legacy—one man's exploration of the histories we inherit and what we pass along, by choice or otherwise.

In 1975, a man stumbled upon a box of small, hand-sewn notebooks in a house set for demolition in Wadesboro, North Carolina. After thumbing through the delicate pages and finding something akin to hieroglyphics, he passed the books to a retired NSA cryptanalyst who quickly cracked the code, uncovering the recorded life of a white Southern farmer named William Thomas Prestwood. The diaries offered a ground-level view of the 19th century from the perspective of a man who passed his days recording eclipses and dissecting rabbits and calculating planetary orbits and reading Goethe and sneaking into barn lofts and closets with dozens of lovers. "The reader is left," the now-deceased codebreaker wrote, "with the lasting impression that here in these pathetic little books is the very essence of Everyman's life from the cradle to the grave." But to Jones, this strange farmer was no Everyman. He was his great-great-great-great grandfather.

The Coded Life is a biography of a forgotten 19th century farmer, but it's also a memoir about a man coming home, becoming a father and thinking hard about the life he wants to leave for his sons. Along the way, Jones reckons with his family's complicity in slavery, dips his toes into the worlds of cryptography and genetics, and explores universal questions about land, legacy, American history and how that history robs the most vulnerable among us. As Jones seamlessly weaves these strands together across the pages of *The Coded Life*, Prestwood's quotidian diaries take on new importance and heightened stakes, the author using him as a lens through which to understand not only his own life but a family history rich with love and tradition—while also stained with secret and sin.

Jeremy B. Jones' first book, *Bearwallow*, was winner of the Independent Publisher Gold Medal for Memoir, and his essays have been published or are forthcoming in *The Bitter Southerner, Oxford American, Quarterly West*, and *The Iowa Review*. Through vivid personal narratives, original research, and unflinching scrutiny, *The Difference a Day Makes* will expose the realities of pretrial detention and the harrowing consequences, both immediate and lasting, of spending even just 24 hours in jail.

Of the ten million people who are admitted to U.S. jails each year, only twenty percent have been convicted of a crime. The rest, the overwhelming majority, are being detained pretrial. *The Difference a Day Makes* will explore how, despite the central tenet of American law—the presumption of innocence—jails subject people to a relentless series of horrors from the moment of their arrest to their release. Most troublingly, the dehumanizing experiences that accompany even just a single day in jail stick with detainees long after the fact, ruining their lives for years to come and setting them on paths that lead back to incarceration. The book will investigate pretrial detention as an underexamined lynchpin in a system that punishes by design and often irreparably, regardless of whether someone is guilty of the crimes they allegedly committed.

In the vein of Michelle Alexander's *The New Jim Crow* and Matthew Desmond's contemporary classic *Evicted*, *The Difference a Day Makes* will weave together the narratives of ten core characters whose experiences and voices illuminate the many facets of pretrial detention and its propensity for harm. These accounts, drawn from extensive interviews as well as hundreds of hours of observation in county jails, will unfurl against the backdrop of U.S. criminal policy, which has brought about a five-fold increase in the number of people detained pretrial over the past fifty years. *The Difference a Day Makes* will offer dramatic, up-close testimony to the human suffering that occurs in jail. At the same time, the book will call readers' attention to efforts to correct and transform our understanding of justice, and it will galvanize them to pursue such change in their own communities.







Egypt was a center of human experience for millennia. At the turn of the 19th century, Egypt's treasures took the western world by storm. Mummies, magic, adventure, pyramids, excavation, and gold – the public couldn't get enough – and hundreds of years later, the history and culture of ancient Egypt (and "Egyptology" as a field of study) continues to captivate. Like the artifacts they unearthed, *Women in the Valley of Kings* will carefully excavate and extricate these women from the heap of the narrative footnotes, bringing their stories into the light and showcasing their work to be the true treasures, big and small.

Kathleen Sheppard is a multi award-winning Associate Professor in the History and Political Science department at Missouri S&T in Rolla, Missouri, and has been on faculty at the American University in Cairo. She is a historian of science whose work crosses a number of disciplinary boundaries, including history of science, gender studies, Egyptology, and Science and Technology Studies (STS).



Hollywood's Doug Fairbanks Jr., and Mary Pickford, and famous sprinter Charlie Paddock, just dethroned as the world's fastest man, sat in lower boxes, hoping their old friend had one more miracle in him. In one of the last events in a sprawling and spotty three-weeks-long 8th Olympiad, the august French Olympic Games director Count Clary was unmissable with his wizard length white beard. The Games architect, the diminutive and often melancholic Baron Pierre de Coubertin, sat delighted by the arena's positive energy. Italian fascist displays and spectator riots tainted the previous weeks, but this was golden, each customer a part of something greater. It was like a first-order Fresnel lens, bending many points of light into a singular beam so strong and luminous it could cut through the darkness of a stormy sea. All had turned out despite an ongoing heat wave that scorched the city that day with 100-degree temperatures. On tap was the long awaited 100-meter swimming showdown between Chicago's brash world record holder Johnny Weissmuller and Hawaii's stoic Duke Kahanamoku, the two-time defending Olympic sprint champ.



No court decision has done more to hand elections to Republicans than Shelby.

Now lauded investigative reporter Daley reveals the story of this fifty-year Republican plot to end the Voting Rights Act and encourage minority rule in their party's favor. From the bowels of Reagan's DOJ to the walls of the conservative Federalist Society to the moneyed Republicans bankrolling restrictive voting laws today, Daley reveals a hidden history as sweeping as it is troubling. Through careful research and reporting, he connects Shelby to a well-funded, highly-coordinated right-wing effort to erode the power of minority voters and Democrats at the ballot box—an effort that has only grown stronger each year. In the process Roberts and his conservative allies have enabled fringe conservative theories about our elections with the potential to shape the 2024 election and topple the foundations of democracy.

Timely and alarming, Daley offers a powerful message that, while Shelby was the misguided end of the Voting Rights Act, it was also the beginning of something far darker.



In the mode of Stacy Schiff's Pulitzer Prize-winning *Véra*, the novelistic story of Vladimir Nabokov's wife and their fifty-two-year marriage, *Tanaquil* will carry all the cultural heft of a "ballet book." Le Clercq's and Balanchine's love story is one for the ages, akin to those depicted in Amanda Vaill's *Everybody Was So Young* and Sam Kashner and Nancy Schoenberger's *Furious Love*.

George Balanchine was to dance what Picasso was to painting—not just a genius, but an inventor of a modern art form, and a defining artist of his century, founding what would eventually become the New York City Ballet. Tanaquil Le Clercq would rise through Balanchine's school to become the fledgling City Ballet's star dancer, a sly performer whose unprecedented lines perfectly expressed the choreographer's radical vision. She became his fifth and final wife, and the only one—according to friends and fellow dancers—who truly understood him and loved him for who he was, rather than what he could do for her. In 1956, during City Ballet's European tour, Le Clercq was stricken with polio, leaving her without the use of

her legs. Her life and Balanchine's stalled as their efforts at rehabilitation failed along with their marriage. And yet, even after their divorce, with Le Clercq confined to her wheelchair, she remained Balanchine's trusted adviser, a quietly astute observer of his work who refused to let tragedy diminish her enjoyment of life and dance.

Dwight Eisenhower, Kay Summersby, and the Women of the General's Inner Circle During World War II

Telling untold stories from history, and uncovering forgotten ones, has become the literary project of our time.

Writers and scholars have dedicated themselves to the recovery of narratives that the historical record has ignored, and this act of unearthing has become a powerful means of questioning our cultural memory and the previously accepted historical record. Rarer, and perhaps even more illuminating, are the stories that were not passively forgotten but rather actively suppressed. Such is the case of Kay Summersby, known as the favored aide and driver to Supreme Allied Commander General Dwight D. Eisenhower during World War II, who has been erased from American history both literally and figuratively.

Kay, a glamorous former model eighteen years Eisenhower's junior, was one of the two-star general's most trusted advisors and closest confidants during the war. She was arguably the person who knew the famously closed-off Eisenhower best—and was also, possibly, his lover. But whether or not Ike and Kay had a physical affair, just the appearance of impropriety made her existence problematic to the future president's image and was enough to have her relegated to the historical margins. Eisenhower's biographers have waffled on the issue and failed to give Kay her due.

With *Other Fronts*, Elise hopes to bring Kay's story, and those of the other pioneering women in Ike's orbit during the same period, to a wide range of readers interested in World War II, women's history, and action-packed narrative non-fiction.

Black, White Colored tells the singular story of Lauinburg, North Carolina as a lens through which to view the story of race and identity in the United States in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

While many have heard about the 1921 race massacre in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the home of Black Wall Street, and the tragedy of the riots that wiped out much of the Black population and its wealth, few know about Laurinburg, North Carolina and the bloody race riot by the Red Shirts, a White supremacist group, that forced many black families and black-owned businesses to flee Laurinburg, North Carolina before Election Day, 1898. This was the only recorded insurrection that successfully changed the outcome of an election.

In the late 19th Century, Laurinburg, North Carolina in Scotland County stood as a beacon, an example of how Blacks and Whites could live and work together. Blacks were landlords, businessmen and doctors, a community who created their own an oasis amid chaos and dangerous gazes. Churches and businesses were built by families whose parents were enslaved a few years prior. Booker T. Washington sanctioned a school, The Laurinburg Institute, to fight the remnants of the Laurinburg insurrection through education. This institute was built on the land the Malloy family owned, and was responsible for the education of Dizzy Gillespie, Ben Vereen, the family of Spike Lee, Sam Jones, and many NBA basketball players. During Reconstruction and Jim Crow, Laurinburg and the Malloy home was a hot spot for notable doctors, tennis players, and political figures. The authors are a daughter and a granddaughter of Lawrence E. Malloy Sr., a key character in their book. They set out to research and share the history of their family and Laurinburg, North Carolina, both of which can be seen to be a microcosm of race and identity in the United States.

The untold story of Janet Flanner, a culture-writer stationed in Paris from 1925-1939, who woke the world to the political, economic, and military realities in Europe and singlehandedly turned a fledgling magazine called *The New Yorker* from a provincial gossip rag into a powerhouse of global reporting.

The story begins when Flanner, a Midwesterner living in Paris, receives a letter from Harold Ross and Jane Grant asking if she'd like to join their new project. It's a fun, humor magazine, explicitly apolitical (and not very good); would she report on the latest trends from the City of Lights? Flanner agrees. She loves art, beauty, and culture. She has no way of knowing that the following decade will be defined by an economic depression, the rise of fascism, and a darkness that is creeping across Europe.

Letters From Paris on Fire is a tightly coiled drama for readers of gripping, character-driven nonfiction such as Death in the City of Light by David King, The Hotel on Place Vendome by Tilar J. Mazzeo, and In the Garden of Beasts by Erik Larson. It's for fans of books featuring unconventional women and hidden figures—as woman in a male-dominated profession, Flanner revolutionizes journalism. She consistently bucks convention, escaping marriage (in exchange for long-term relationships with three women), life in America, and the confines of her job description, transforming from an insecure novelist to a trailblazing truth-teller. Along the way, she loses and regains her faith in the power of art, in the potential for goodness to prevail over evil, and in her own voice.

Mark Braude is a cultural historian and the author of *Kiki Man Ray, The Invisible Emperor*, and *Making Monte Carlo*. Race, School, and the Building of a Nation

An essential new work of narrative history—this book will chronicle of the social and political forces that shaped the emergence of the U.S. education system over the nineteenth century, a revised origin story that will open readers' eyes to a legacy of racism, violence, and exploitation involving Black, white, and Native Americans.

Jarvis Givens' research exposes the degree to which race—a factor that goes unexamined in other stories of early U.S. education—was part and parcel of the federal government's approach to establishing its schools. The book will document how the conquest and sale of Native American lands directly funded the country's public schools, many of which were constructed using the labor of enslaved Black Americans. The profits of slavery and settler colonialism underwrote classrooms for white students, in which they learned to adopt an American identity grounded in antiblackness and anti-indigeneity. Central to the book will be both the material backdrop of schools and the intimate interplay of Black, Native, and white education. Throughout the narrative, readers will encounter familiar characters such as Booker T. Washington and Thomas Jefferson whose lives and contributions to the national education system will be cast in a new light. Readers will also meet understudied historical communities—Native students at white-run, state-sanctioned schools that aimed to strip them of their tribal identity; enslaved and freed Black Americans living in Indian Territory—whose educational experiences illuminate the close, complicated relationships between races and how the United States deployed schools as a weapon in building the nation. Additionally, Jarvis will draw on his own experiences, from attending grade school in Compton, CA, through obtaining his doctorate, to show how this history reverberates in the present.

American Grammar will argue that if we are to address the stark educational inequities throughout the country today—especially for Black and Native students—we must confront how such inequities were built into our schools by design.

Obsessed with fame in an ancient culture where the battlefield was the surest place to win it, Alexander spent his entire adult life on campaign. THE GIRL IN BLUE A True Story of Defiance, Murder & Beautiful Obsessions

A spellbinding nonfiction historical thriller, *The Girl In Blue* unravels the tragic history behind *La Petite Irène*, an iconic Renoir portrait of a little girl with a blue ribbon, who, with her prominent Jewish family, fought to survive the German occupation of Paris during World War II and to recover the precious looted painting after it vanished in the murky international art market.

In 1941, as Nazi rule permeated ever more deeply into the fabric of French society, a specialized unit of German troops stormed the castle of Chambord in the Loire Valley to loot one of Pierre-Auguste Renoir's most gorgeous and evocative masterworks: *La Petite Irène*. The painting is of a young girl, who poses with her hands folded in her lap. As *The Girl in Blue* will chronicle in Doreen's signature writerly prose, the painting's theft, representative of one of world history's darkest chapters, tore apart the members of a prominent Jewish family and triggered a tragic cascade of deadly violence.

Irène Cahen d'Anvers, the little girl with the blue ribbon who sat for Renoir in 1880, belonged to one of Paris's wealthiest Jewish families. Her childhood was privileged and full of opportunity, but she was a restless soul. Just five years after marrying and conceiving two children, Irène unexpectedly eloped with the family's handsome Italian stable master and converted to his Catholic faith. When the Nazi party took power in Germany and occupied France, Irène's attempts to mask her Jewish identity may have spared her life, but they failed to protect the rest of her family. The book will show how Irène's life decisions—especially her sudden conversion to Catholicism and masterful evasion of arrest during the occupation—continue to divide her family for decades. *The Girl in Blue* will restore Irène's painful yet critical place in the history of Germany's occupation of France, the incarceration and torture of Jews at Drancy, and their ruthless extermination in Nazi concentration camps.

The Story and Meaning of Mount Rushmore

To be published for the 100th anniversary of Rushmore's dedication in October 2025.

An Eternal Tribute will be a newly energized consideration of supposedly familiar history and a work of literary nonfiction for the same readers of How The Word is Passed by Clint Smith, and On Juneteenth by Annette Gordon-Reed—and it is written with Peter Matthiessen's In the Spirit of Crazy Horse as its artistic polestar. Having to look no further than former President Trump's July 3, 2020 speech before the monument, Mount Rushmore remains a contested symbol at the heart of American identity and the nation's conception of its own history.

Davis will revisit the meaning and the myth of Mount Rushmore's creation via three narrative strands. The first is the story of Mt. Rushmore's origins and construction, with particular attention paid to its creator, sculptor Gutzon Borglum, an American artist whose parents had immigrated from Denmark as Mormons and who was born in a log cabin in Idaho. His ambition led him to study in Rodin's studio in Paris, to begin and fail to complete the Confederate shrine at Stone Mountain in Georgia, and to become a member of the Klu Klux Klan, all before embarking upon a sixteen-year quest to construct what he called his "Shrine of Democracy" in the Black Hills of South Dakota. The second strand is a contemporary travelogue through those very hills, known to the Lakota as Paha Sapa, wherein Davis gathers images and voices that present an altogether different view of America's greatest monument. For it is impossible to separate the story of Rushmore from the story of the United States' treatment of American Indians and the Federal government's shameful violation of the 1868 Treaty of Laramie. The third strand will consist of essayistic analysis that explores this moment of American "historical memory," asking: What is the role of our national monuments? Whose history do they tell? Should a place like Mount Rushmore—which has become celebrated by white nationalists—exist in 21st-century America?

The mountain lions of California are the last of a decimated population, descendants from the Ice Age, slipping through the shadows of American suburbia, reminding us that the wild isn't so far away. Deanne Stillman, acclaimed and bestselling author of literary nonfiction such as *Mustang: The Saga of the Wild Horse in the American West*, contemplates the deep-time legacy and unfolding fate of cougars in the American West. Spellbound by celebrity cats like P-22, the subject of the just-released documentary, "The Cat that Changed America," and others, such as the Culvert Cat who died trying to flee the Woolsey Fire, Stillman pursues the history and state of the mountain lion in the region that came be known as Los Angeles, a dynamic border where urbanity meets a slice of raw, untamed nature.

Ghost Cats will travel from the cougar's evolutionary origins, to the Pueblo's spiritual reverence for the animal, to Teddy Roosevelt's far-sighted conservation of its habitat that belied his complicated relationship to creatures he considered "abject cowards," "beast[s] of stealth and rapine," and "ferocious and bloodthirsty." In the present, Stillman accompanies the scientists fighting to understand and protect these vulnerable animals; and she weighs this schizophrenic history, in which humans fail to reconcile a dangerous combination of awe, indifference, and fear.

In a time when we have retreated to our homes, Stillman invites us to contemplate something completely primal, sheer wildness in flesh and sinew and claw, a manifestation of power, strength, self-knowledge, and mystery.

Deanne Stillman's books include *Blood Brothers, Desert Reckoning,* and *Mustang,* a *Los Angeles Times* Best Book of the Year. In addition, she wrote the cult classic, *Twentynine Palms,* another *Los Angeles Times* bestseller.

THE LOST FOUNDER

James Wilson and the Dream of a New America

You're probably familiar with many of America's founding fathers. Washington, Jefferson, Franklin, Hamilton, Madison—but one founder has somehow slipped through the cracks, despite the fact that his contributions were arguably more essential to the country's founding than those of any other, and his vision was without doubt the most democratic of them all. His name: James Wilson.

Jesse Wegman will reveal that James Wilson (and not James Madison) was the main architect of the Constitution—Wilson hand-wrote the first draft—and he was one of the few founders to sign both that document and the Declaration of Independence. He was a justice on the first Supreme Court; his interpretations guided the development of American law and inform its functioning even today. And despite his erudition and influence, Wilson was an unapologetic proponent of democracy; he believed political power must lie in the hands of common people. He was a poor immigrant from Scotland who studied with David Hume, Adam Smith, and Thomas Reid, and through them came to understand the crucial role of government in the lives of ordinary citizens. Wilson was also a complicated, flawed man who was nearly murdered by the people he championed, and whose mismanagement of his personal finances resulted in him being the only Supreme Court justice ever to go to prison. His eventual flight from his lenders led to a death in ignominy and his name being erased from history. There are at least three groups who are hungry for a book like this: the built-in readership that has always devoured stories of the founders; the younger generation of readers that is eager to hear new accounts about America's founding, complete with its complexities and contradictions; and the lawyers, judges, and other members of the legal world who rely on Wilson's thinking more than most of them realize.

Jesse Wegman joined the editorial board of the *New York Times* in 2013, and has since written close to 600 signed and unsigned editorials on the Supreme Court, politics, law, and justice. He was previously a senior editor at *The Daily Beast* and *Newsweek*, a legal news editor at Reuters, and the managing editor of *The New York Observer*. He is the author of *Let the People Pick the President*.

Freedom in Antebellum Black Manhattan

The typical history of Black Americans in New York City is that slavery, which was outlawed in New York in 1827, was followed by poverty and silence until the Harlem Renaissance occurred in the 1920s. *An Eternal Tribute* shows that this interpretation is not only incorrect but omits a rich story of Black American creativity and achievement.

Shane's new book shows us a New York of the 1820s through 1840s that was alive with creative, ambitious, and successful African Americans. No longer barely visible slaves, they invented tap dancing, started the first African American newspaper, and Black theater. African Americans created one of the earliest Black joint stock companies and much more. Fascinating individuals ranging from a Black millionaire, cross-dressers, pimps for touch houses (brothels) through to burners, or Black confidence tricksters, stalked the streets. It was one of the most exciting periods in the city's history—and a lot of that excitement can be attributed to Black freedom.

When New York finally ended slavery in 1827, the city was one of the first sizeable urban slave societies in the New World forced to come to grips with abolition. To an often-startling extent, this first attempt at integration worked. People, languages, and customs mixed promiscuously in the "amalgamated" city in these years. Freedom produced a change in consciousness. Its public spaces filled with the sight and sound of ordinary African New Yorkers—and that was deliberate. The way African New Yorkers dressed or strolled down Broadway, gambled on a dreamed number, and especially created music and dancing that made the city a different and more exciting place. Their activities not only marked a new and exhilarating status as free people, but also fascinated, occasionally horrified, white onlookers. The resulting conjunction between Black creative activity and white voyeurism was unprecedented and would not recur until the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s.

Shane White is Challis Professor of History Emeritus at the University of Sydney specializing in African American history. His last book, *Prince of Darkness* (2015) won the Society of the Historians of the Early American Republic's Best Book Prize and the New York Society's New York City Award.

A Terrible Swift Sword tells the tortured story of race relations in the United States through cases decided by the Supreme Court. That trajectory, Dred Scott to Harvard, tells us a story about where we began as a country and where we find ourselves today in the long and uneven effort to achieve racial equality. We seem, as society, to be on a knife edge, where race relations could tip in either direction. It is a good time to take a close look at our situation through the eyes of the law.

Louis Menand is an award-winning essayist, critic, author, professor, and historian, best known for his Pulitzer-winning book *The Metaphysical Club*, an intellectual and cultural history of late 19th and early 20th century America. His other notable works include the National Book Award-nominated *The Free World: Art and Thought in the Cold War, American Studies, Discovering Modernism*, and *Pragmatism*. In 2016, he was awarded the National Humanities Medal by President Barack Obama.

When we think of the great turning points in the evolution of art, we don't often think of mid-century Chicago, that looming metropolis with its reputation for industry and organized crime. But in fact Chicago in the 1930s, '40s, and '50s was the locus of some of our culture's most lasting artistic advances—in sculpture, dance, literature, architecture, and beyond—and we can't understand the story of modern art without celebrating this time and place. That's where this book comes in.

There was Ruth Page, the captivating ballerina; Katherine Dunham, the magnetic dancer and anthropologist; Richard Wright, at one time the most famous Black writer in America; Katharine Kuh, the visionary art curator; and Isamu Noguchi, who made his artistic mark on various worlds ranging from sculpture to costume design. In assorted combinations members of this group collaborated with each other, had affairs with each other, supported each other's work and dreams, and fed off of each other's talents in ways that forever changed the culture—ways that are still evident today. *Now We See the World Together* chronicles the three decades at the heart of these figures' careers, the 1930s through the 1950s, and for the first time examines how this period became a turning point in the history of modern art. As Liesl writes in the proposal, "this formative circle created some of the most recognizable styles of the twentieth century." And in fact, many of the challenges to democracy and equality that we're experiencing today have their roots in the backlash to the 1930s' progress, to which the book's main characters made indelible contributions.

Ernie Barnes, the football player-turned-artist whose lithe, exuberant, and instantly recognizable painted figures endeared him to generations of Black Americans, was largely overlooked by the fine art establishment until recently. In May 2022, over a decade after his death in 2009, Barnes was propelled back into the spotlight when his replica of his masterpiece, "The Sugar Shack," sold at Christie's for 15.3 million dollars. Now, the art world is finally giving one of the most important Black artists of the twentieth century his due.

Infinite Motion will be, remarkably, the first trade book to chronicle Barnes' life, career, and influence—a quintessential tale of Black American striving, from North Carolina under Jim Crow to professional football stadiums, nationwide gallery shows, and then to Hollywood, along the way establishing a new model for how fine artists engage with pop culture. Barnes' work is familiar to many readers who will come to the story of the man behind paintings used on iconic album covers and in the beloved '70s sitcom Good Times, and whose entrepreneurial spirit kicked off his art career as the first official artist of the American Football League. Whether he was portraying the athletes of the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics in his capacity as official artist of the Games, or working on a commission for Kanye West, or capturing the beauty in quotidian scenes of Black life, Barnes used his paintbrush to set the world in ecstatic and infinite motion. The book will reveal the inner workings of a complex and pathbreaking figure in American art history who

created prints of his paintings that adorned the walls Black households nationwide, cementing his era-defining style in the cultural imagination.

It won't surprise you to learn, after over a year of "Zoom school", that Tony and Ulrik argue that the education system is broken. They believe that having students hear and read material so that they, hopefully, memorize it, and then asking them to prove it by taking multiple-choice tests and exams, is bad way to educate people. But, in their book, Mastery, they argue that the system also fails to address inequity—they believe it perpetuates it—and they promote a new way of teaching that could change everything for the better.

One of the key advantages of mastery-based education is that students do not advance, individually, until they have passed milestones, and, therefore, it can be tailored to each student's ability and learning speed, allowing all to learn effectively. The nature of a mastery-based system is that teachers give more individualized feedback than they do in the traditional one—but as there are far fewer hours spent on group teaching, it can be less burdensome on teachers' time.

As Tony and Ulrik show in the proposal, mastery involves more collaborative work and creativity than traditional education, and it is much more immersive and engaging than classroom work. In fact, it is much more like real world work, a more solid preparation for the workplace than traditional education. In the schools where it has been implemented – which range from high schools to some medical schools – the change is almost always permanent. The change is also beneficial to students at the top, and at the bottom, of their class, as mastery is not about bell curve grading and averages, but instead, about learning to master actual skills, and students continue to get attention and help until they have mastered them.

Extensive cell-based studies, animal studies, and large human population studies led by her team and many independent researchers at Harvard University, Johns Hopkins University, University of Cambridge, and other prestigious institutions, have shown that C15:0 meets the four must-haves of a longevity molecule.
