
Aura must trust her new family and her heart to learn that some rules have to be broken.

Iconic author of Fahrenheit 451, The Martian Chronicles, and Something Wicked This Way Comes, Ray Bradbury believed that, someday, a collection of his letters could illuminate the story of his life in new ways. That story emerges across time and memory from the pages of *Remembrance*..

Ray Bradbury was one of the best-known writers and creative dreamers of our time. 
Bradbury scholar and biographer, Jonathan R. Eller, organized this volume into categories of correspondents, showing Bradbury's progression through life as he knew it, and not necessarily as the public perceived him. Letters to and from mentors and other writers are followed by correspondence with such film directors as John Huston, François Truffaut, and Federico Fellini. Letters with publishers and agents are followed by letters that capture moments of national and international recognition, the shadows of war and intolerance that motivated some of his best writing, and the friends and family members who shared the memories of his life. Among the writers whose letters illuminate Remembrance are Theodore Sturgeon, Sir Arthur C. Clarke, Twilight Zone writers Charles Beaumont and Richard Matheson, Dan Chaon, Bernard Berenson, Nobel Laureate Bertrand Russell, Graham Greene, Anaîs Nin, Gore Vidal, Carl Sandburg, and Jessamyn West.

Remembrance illuminates the most elusive aspect of Ray Bradbury's wideranging writing passions—the correspondence he sent and received throughout his long life, each letter originally intended for an audience of one.

MATTHEW RIDGWAY AND THE AMERICAN CENTURY

With the notable exception of Dwight Eisenhower, Matthew Ridgway was arguably the most important American general of the twentieth century. A 1917 graduate of West Point, Ridgway participated in or impacted momentous events spanning a nearly sixty-year period of the 20th Century. As a young officer, he served on the Mexican border, in Panama, Nicaragua, the Philippines, and China observing first-hand what he saw as the overreach of American empire. In World War II he became a founding father and a pioneer of airborne operations. An inspiring battlefield commander, he led troops from Sicily to Germany, Ridgway became one of the very few European theater officers accepted by General Douglas MacArthur for a command role in the planned invasion of Japan. Most famously, during the Korean War, Ridgway in late 1950 took command of the beleaguered, retreating, demoralized U.N. forces and completely transformed the situation. Under Ridgway's dynamic leadership, the U.N. reversed the tide of the war, ejecting communist armies from South Korea, in essence preserving the freedom of that country to this day. When President Harry Truman fired Douglas MacArthur in 1951, Ridgway succeeded him as commander of U.N. forces in the Far East. Soon thereafter, when Eisenhower decided to run for president, Ridgway succeeded him as commander of the nascent NATO armies in Europe, helping establish the most consequential alliance in American history. Not surprisingly, Ridgway eventually became chief of staff, the number one position in the Army. He enthusiastically oversaw the desegregation of the Army and, in the wake of the French defeat at Dien Bien Phu, argued vociferously, and successfully, against the introduction of American ground forces in Vietnam. After his retirement in 1955, he continued to influence American military policy for almost two decades.






