

From Minrose Gwin, award-winning author of *The Accidentals*, comes *Beautiful Dreamers*, a story of a precocious teen and her mother, their gay best friend, and the con man who unravels their family.

It's 1953 when Memory Feather and her mother, Virginia, are welcomed back home to the Mississippi Gulf Coast community of Belle Cote by Virginia's childhood friend Mac McFadden, whose verve and energy buoy the recently divorced Virginia to embrace this new chapter. Memory ("Mem") is unlike other girls: she is attuned to the voices of plants and animals and is missing two fingers on her twisted left hand. The three of them knit their lives together and become a close, though unconventional, family. While Mac's wealth, brains, and good humor have allowed him to carve out a niche in Belle Cote, his position as a gay man active in the burgeoning Civil Rights Movement exposes him to censure, harassment, and even brutality. When the unscrupulous and charismatic Tony Amato arrives in Belle Cote as Mac's "guest," he sets in motion a series of events that will shatter familial bonds and forever change Mem's life. Now, an adult Mem recounts the story of the scars Tony left in her teenage years, confronting her culpability in the disastrous events of that final summer.



A window into life on the fringes of a uniquely brutal American pastime and an intelligent, self-aware commentary on modern identity, artifice, and violence.

At 26, Dom Contreras has already spent a decade jobbing through the minor leagues of professional wrestling as Hack Barlow, a 300-pound axe-swinging lumberjack. As his body breaks down and his star power fades, he must invent a new gimmick before he loses the only job he's ever known. Meanwhile, Dom's 17-yearold sister Pilar is eager to make her own pro wrestling debut. Dom is determined to keep Pilar under his wing, away from the predators of a business infamous for eating its young. At the same time, he has a vision for her meteoric rise to the top--not just of his own outfit, the middling Mid-Coast Championship Wrestling promotion outside of Charlotte, but all the way to stardom (and a big payday) in the WWE. The siblings are close, spending much of their time packed into Dom's ancient Honda Civic en route to shows across the south, but as Dom craves privacy and Pilar reckons with her brother's conflicting roles of roommate, father figure, manager and coach, their relationship quickly begins to fray. After Dom loses his temper in a match and Pilar injures herself preparing for her big tryout, Bonnie Blue, the eccentric owner of MCCW, spots an opportunity. She is poised, after years of scheming, to unveil her life's handiwork: an underground, guerrilla-style pro wrestling network with bouts climaxing in real, premeditated injury. To save his career--and his sister's hopes of breaking out--Dom must become Bonnie's new star and take on the one persona he swore he'd never embrace.

In the vein of National Book Award finalist Chris Bachelder's *The Throwback Special, Kayfabe* explores the boundaries of sport, spectacle, entertainment, and exploitation. Like Kevin Wilson's *The Family Fang*, it centers a strange family seeking connection in an even stranger world. Evoking Sam Lipsyte's whip-smart humor and Lauren Oyler's biting insight, *Kayfabe* challenges readers to consider the truths that fakery can expose.



A modern coming-of-age story of love, belonging, and migration from a new literary force, Blue Light Hours arrives with the tender power of recent works by Katie Kitamura, Ayşegül Savaş, and Jessica Au.

In a small liberal arts college in the American Northeast, a young woman is buzzing as she settles into a dorm room in a country she's never been to-a dream that a scholarship, hard work, and the support of her mother in Brazil made possible. Once she's unpacked, she calls her mother. It's within this frame that Lobato directs our attention, through the Skype calls of a mother and daughter hoping to stay in one another's lives despite the continent between them. The daughter soon falls in with a small group of international students and starts to form a life-read-ing, thinking, drinking leftover booze from the rich students' parties, studying, talking. Eventually, the time for calls with her mother grows narrower, as does the conversation, and sometimes it's only late at night with a drink in both their hands, or simply an open computer screen while one falls asleep. As the year passes and the mother recovers from a period of poor health and the daughter begins to question where she fits, both wonder if this is the life they'll always have-not quite apart, but not together. Lobato questions the sacrifices that come with leaving one's home, and she forms a gorgeous portrait of love across borders, real and imagined.

Bruna Dantas Lobato's fiction has appeared in The New Yorker, Guernica, A Public Space, The Common, and other publications. Her literary translations include Caio Fernando Abreu's seminal story collections Moldy Strawberries (longlisted, PEN Translation Prize) and the National Book Award winner The Words That Remain.



A young woman's seasonal job takes a dark, surreal turn in this vivid and surprising debut.

When Elise and her boyfriend, Tom, set off for Minnesota, all she knows about harvesting sugar beets (Beta vulgaris) is that her paycheck will cover a few months' rent on their Brooklyn apartment. She'll try anything to escape the incessant debt collections calls—and chronic anxieties about her body and her relationship. But as the grueling graveyard shifts set in, Elise notices strange things: threatening texts, a mysterious rash, a string of disappearances from the workers' campsite, and snatches of a hypnotic voice coming from the beet pile itself.

As crewmembers vanish, Elise obsesses over Tom's closeness with their charismatic coworker Cee and falls back on self-destructive patterns of disordered eating and dissociation. Against the horrors of her uncertain future, is the siren song of the beet pile almost . . . appealing? Biting and eerie, *Beta Vulgaris* harnesses an audacious premise to undermine straightforward narratives of class, trauma, consumption, and redemption.

Margie Sarsfield was the recipient of the 2019 Calvino Prize. She earned her MFA from Ohio State University. Her work has appeared in *Salt Hill, CutBank, the Normal School, Seneca Review, Hippocampus,* and elsewhere. She lives in Reno, Nevada.





The Magpie at Night is a lyrical and searching portrait of the inner life of Li Qingzhao, one of the greatest poets in Chinese literary history. These spare and arresting poems evoke the quiet and haunting beauty of country life during the Song dynasty; the unseen, restive labor of the poet; and Li Qingzhao's bracing and complex take on what it means to create art as a woman in the shadow of exile, war, imprisonment, and an unwelcoming literary establishment. In Chen's splendid new translation, each of Li Qingzhao's ci—lyrics that were originally set to music—is as sharp and fresh as the edge of a new spring leaf. These richly textured melodies tell a story that will resonate with scholars eager to restore this iconic figure to the canon, as well as with contemporary readers who will relate to the strikingly modern mode in which she delivers her wry and unsentimental thoughts on art and posterity.

Li Qingzhao (1084–1151), also known as Yi'an Jushi, is considered the greatest woman poet in Chinese history, though only two English translations of her works are in print today. During her lifetime, she defied cultural expectations for women by writing and persevering through war, exile, imprisonment, and the loss of her fortune.

Wendy Chen is the author of the novel *Their Divine Fires* and the poetry collection *Unearthings*. She is the recipient of prizes and fellowships from the Academy of American Poets, MacDowell, and elsewhere. She is an assistant professor of creative writing at the University of Nevada.

Why did you decide to translate Li Qingzhao's work?

"Scholars and artists in the generations following her death have acknowledged her as a master at her craft—a status few women have ever achieved in Chinese history. Yet despite her distinguished reputation in China, she remains relatively unknown and untranslated in the West. When I first started translating her work as an undergraduate in 2011, only one translation of her complete works in English remained in print (Rexroth, 1980). Gender, I believe, plays no small part in this neglect. As part of my project, I am also interested in reclaiming Chinese/English translations as a space where Chinese and Chinese-American voices can be heard and appreciated." —Wendy Chen




The paths of four family members diverge drastically when the U.S. government begins detaining Vietnamese Americans, in this sharp and touching novel about growing up at the intersection of ambition and assimilation.

Ursula, Alvin, Jen, and Duncan grew up as cousins in the sprawling Nguyen family, but the truth about their family is much more complicated. As young adults, they're on the precipice of new ventures—Ursula as a budding journalist in Manhattan, Alvin as an engineering intern for Google, Jen as a naive freshman at NYU, and Duncan as a promising newcomer on his high school football team. Their lives are upended when a series of violent, senseless attacks across America create a national panic, prompting a government policy forcing Vietnamese Americans into internment camps. Jen and Duncan are sent with their mother to Camp Tacoma while Ursula and Alvin receive exemptions.

Cut off entirely from the outside world, Jen and Duncan try to withstand long dusty days in camp, forced to work jobs they hate and acclimate to life without the internet. That is until Jen discovers a way to get messages to the outside. Her first instinct is to reach out to Ursula, who sees this as an opportunity to tell the world about the horrors of detention—and bolster her own reporting career in the process.

Informed by real-life events from Japanese incarceration, the Vietnam War, and modern-day immigrant detention, Kevin Nguyen gives us a version of reality only a few degrees away from our own—much too close for comfort. Moving and finely attuned to both the brutalities and mundanities of racism in America, *My Documents* is a strangely funny and touching portrait of American ambition, fear, and family. The story of the Nguyens is one of resilience and how we return to each other, and to ourselves, after tragedy.

Kevin Nguyen is the author of the novel *New Waves* and is the features editor at *The Verge.* Previously, he was an editor at *GQ*. He lives in Brooklyn.

It's Sunday, September 16th, 2001. Franny, a thirty-eight-year-old Korean-American lawyer and her husband, Tom, have left Brooklyn to board the Sonata on a five-day passage to Bermuda. Franny's brother Jae and girlfriend Esther have persuaded Franny to host this trip in honor of their mother's 70th birthday, or chilsun, a major rite of passage celebrated by Korean families. But as Tom points out, Franny has never been close to her mother and it was "surreal"-even wrong-to be setting off on a cruise ("they are not cruise people") in the wake of the 9/11 attacks, as lower Manhattan continues to burn. With few professional prospects on the horizon, a now sober Doug has reluctantly joined his castmates and is dreading the specter of his dark past. Lucy, the only Black female graduate student in her department at MIT, ambivalent the elite tech jobs she seeks, has uncharacteristically accepted a last-minute invitation to join her new roommate on the cruise. Within the sealed, carnival-like atmosphere of the Sonata, Wake traces these passengers' lives as they attempt to escape, deny and ultimately, confront the enormous losses they've left behind.

Wake takes Jung Yun's masterful writing to the next level in a deeply moving, revelatory work. With exquisite prose, indelible characters and pitch perfect dialogue, *Wake* illuminates the intricacies of human relationships, even as it explores and exposes larger issues of race, class, and trauma against the backdrop of our most pressing economic and political realities. Like *Let the Great World Spin* by Colum McCann or *There There* by Tommy Orange, Yun follows multiple distinct narratives unified by one setting and a central event with a complexity and depth of characters such as those in Jennifer Egan's *A Visit From the Goon Squad*.

With a clear eye for its characters and their flaws, *Work to Do* explores the promise and challenges of organizing; the realities of queer folks in middle age and beyond; and the entanglement of the work we do and the people we are—at home and in public, on the softball field, in the bedroom, behind the register, and in the check-out line.

Work to Do centers on three characters: Eleanor, an old-school lesbian and the store's sometimes-despotic owner; manager Roz, who finds herself constantly watching the weather just to get a glimpse of her meteorologist ex-wife; and staff member and chief union organizer Randy, whose passion for fair wages can't entirely outbalance the indignities of online dating and looming middle age. Over the course of one climactic week, Eleanor, Roz, and Randy weather hurricanes both literal and metaphorical in an attempt to untangle the work they do from the people they have been—and the futures they hope to make for themselves and those around them.

For readers of Torrey Peters's *Detransition, Baby* and Sara Nović's *True Biz, Work to Do* deftly rotates among multiple points of view to unpack the collision of idealism and action, the tension between our pasts and our present, and our all-too-human longings for connection, romance, and good work.

An algorithm has predicted that she's likely to kill or be killed in the next 30 days. With a backpack of supplies and her trusty Interactive Toy, a stuffed seal named Zeno, Kate sets off on a journey to New York, where she hopes to find refuge with a family friend named Terry Greene.

Wilson, Jay, and Kate don't know it yet, but their individual quests will bring them together in a life-or-death battle for human autonomy.



In an unnamed city always slick with rain, Charles Unwin toils as a clerk at a huge, imperious detective agency. All he knows about solving mysteries comes from the reports he's filed for the illustrious detective Travis Sivart. When Sivart goes missing and his supervisor turns up murdered, Unwin is suddenly promoted to detective, a rank for which he lacks both the skills and the stomach. His only guidance comes from his new assistant, who would be perfect if she weren't so sleepy, and from the pithy yet profound Manual of Detection (think The Art of War as told to Damon Runyon).

Unwin mounts his search for Sivart, but is soon framed for murder, pursued by goons and gunmen, and confounded by the infamous femme fatale Cleo Greenwood. Meanwhile, strange and troubling questions proliferate: why does the mummy at the Municipal Museum have modern-day dental work? Where have all the city's alarm clocks gone? Why is Unwin's copy of the manual missing Chapter 18? When he discovers that Sivart's greatest cases - including the Three Deaths of Colonel Baker and the Man Who Stole November 12th - were solved incorrectly, Unwin must enter the dreams of a murdered man and face a criminal mastermind bent on total control of a slumbering city.

The Manual of Detection will draw comparison to every work of imaginative fiction that ever blew a reader's mind - from Carlos Ruiz Zafón to Jorge Luis Borges, from *The Big Sleep* to *The Yiddish Policeman's Union*. But, ultimately, it defies comparison; it is a brilliantly conceived, meticulously realized novel that will change what you think about how you think.

As Kit helps Lenora write about the events leading to the Hope family massacre, it becomes clear there's more to the tale. But when new details about her predecessor's departure come to light, Kit starts to suspect Lenora might not be telling the complete truth—and that she's far more dangerous than Kit first thought.






