Economists dream of equilibrium. It's time to wake up.

In mainstream economics, markets are ideal if competition is perfect. When supply balances demand, economic maturity is orderly and disturbed only by shocks. These ideas are rooted in doctrines going back thousands of years yet, as James K. Galbraith and Jing Chen show, they contradict the foundations of our scientific understanding of the physical and biological worlds.

Entropy Economics discards the conventions of equilibrium and presents a new basis for thinking about economic issues, one rooted in life processes—an unequal world of unceasing change in which boundaries, plans, and regulations are essential. Galbraith and Chen's theory of value is based on scarcity, and it accounts for the power of monopoly. Their theory of production covers increasing and decreasing returns, uncertainty, fixed investments over time, and the impact of rising resource costs. Together, their models illuminate key problems such as trade, finance, energy, climate, conflict, and demography.

Entropy Economics is a thrilling framework for understanding the world as it is and will be keenly relevant to the economic challenges of a world threatened with disorder.



How Companies Hold Us Captive and How to Break Free

A brilliant analysis of contemporary life that explores how tech companies, vying to make us lifelong customers through the allure of seamless, ultra-convenient shopping experiences, are trapping us in a prison of unthinking, unsatisfying convenience.

The problems Luc identifies are subtle innovations that make life, at first, more pleasant and easy. They seem to like it when companies target their products and services. It's not as if we don't know that we are being manipulated by algorithms – we all do – but we take advantage of these things, anyway, and it does feel a tiny bit flattering on a personal level, as if Google or Amazon appears to have made an effort. Customer data reveals that people also appear to care more about how a service or product is delivered than about the service or product itself. How easy is it to make the reservation, and how quickly can we check in, has become more important than where we are going and what we want to do when we get there. But what if, when we arrive at the hotel or receive our latest package, we realize, this isn't what we want at all? Luc Wathieu is one of the subtlest and most interesting critics of consumer culture, and what he identifies, and explores in this book, is a sort of passivity, a lack of human connection, a lack of real satisfaction and a depression that accompanies contemporary life.

This passive, unthinking state of mind is the conscious goal of the companies we interact with today, who only see our value if we become lifelong customers (as opposed to one-off, occasional buyers of their products). YOU MIGHT WANT THIS is the child of *Why We Buy* and *How to Do Nothing*. I promise it will make you think differently about everything from Netflix to Starbucks and What's App – and to make you wonder if the current incarnation of the consumer society isn't more insidious and life-draining than it appears.

Luc Wathieu is a behavioral economist, professor of marketing at Georgetown University, and renowned expert on consumer behavior, analytics, and marketing innovations. He enjoys a global academic career that brought him from Brussels to Paris, Hong Kong, Boston, Berlin, and now Washington, D.C.

Cliff seeks to answer the question that has fascinated him for years: why do some of us see challenges as invitations to act, rather than burdens to deal with or threats to fear? Why do some people think up bold ideas and find a way to make their goals a reality no matter the odds, while many others tell themselves to "be realistic," take the safe route, and let those dreams go? What is it about the mindset of "doers" that enables them to act when the rest of us would deem it impossible?

The answer, Cliff argues, is a combination of audacity, self-confidence, and—above all—a sense of permission that comes from within. We can all flip our Permission Switches, but doers' Permission Switches are permanently set to ON. Lindy Elkins-Tanton is a world class scientist and extraordinary leader who has had career-long intersectional experience with teams across the private sector, government, and academia. *Human To Human* will be Lindy's timely, essential, and practical guide to creating the best possible teams. Addressing questions explored in such bestselling classics as Dan Coyle's *The Culture Code* and Jon Gordon's *The Power of a Positive Team*, Elkins-Tanton offers real world strategies and experience from the successful teams she herself has led—some 2,500+ strong.

Great teams, in Elkins-Tanton's view, have three levels—the individual who thinks inwardly about their own capabilities and effects on others; then the individual networks outwardly, creating connections and building a team; and finally, leadership which thinks from above, using the aerial view of strategy while embodying the culture and progress they want to see in their team. Individuals, the team as a whole, and leadership combine to create extraordinary teams with great culture. The three parts of Human To Human lay out how these three levels are created and function. Part I outlines the five key attributes that each team member must develop. They include how to communicate clearly and calmly even in the most difficult circumstances and recognizing the importance of process through strategic thinking and metacognition. Every organization, every team is made up of a network of dyads—one-on-one relationships. In Part II, Elkins-Tanton describes how individuals grow their networks into teams and set team culture. At that point the team is ready for empowering practices such as transparent communication and structured decision-making. Leadership is a crucial part of successful teams since people do not often perform at their best without leadership. Leaders need to articulate and exemplify team culture and use practices, delineated in Part III, that include keeping teams from "losing the recipe" and excelling at meetings, margins, and metrics to guide, measure, and reward the team to maintain the highest levels of team performance and happiness.

Lindy Elkins-Tanton is an American planetary scientist and professor. She leads the \$1.2Billion NASA Psyche Mission, co-founded the ed-tech company Beagle Learning, and is a frequent speaker on teams, team culture, and mega-projects.



A debut graphic memoir—and living history of climate justice—based on the stories of six frontline resisters to the Mountain Valley Pipeline in Appalachia, offering a portrait of the diverse people and places of Appalachia, and the creation of a hopeful movement.

Real people are standing up for both their communities and the planet. Drawing from original interviews with the author, *Holler* is an illustrated look at six inspiring changemakers whose stories should be better known. Denali Nalamalapu, a climate organizer in their own right, introduces readers to six ordinary people who became resistors of the Mountain Valley Pipeline, a project that spans approximately 300 miles from northwestern West Virginia to southern Virginia—a teacher, a single mother, a nurse, an organizer, a photographer, and a seed keeper. While each resistor has their own motivation and methods, they share a love for the land and a desire to preserve it. When the world tells them to sit down and back off, each one refuses to be quiet or give up. There is always hope.

More than anything, *Holler* is an invitation to readers everywhere searching for their own path to activism: sending the message that no matter how small your action is, it's impactful. The story of the Mountain Valley Pipeline is one of many: the people of Appalachia have resisted fossil fuel projects for a century. And it's a story we can all relate to, in one way or another, as each and every one of our communities faces the increasing threats of the climate crisis, and the corporations that benefit from the destruction of our natural resources. For adults and a mature YA audience, *Holler* is a moving and deeply accessible—and beautifully visual—story about change, hope, and humanity.

Denali Sai Nalamalapu is a climate organizer from Southern Maine and Southern India. They have written for *Truthout*, *Prism*, and *Mergoat* Magazine, and their climate activism has been covered in *Shondaland*, *Vogue India*, *Self*, *The Independent*, and elsewhere. They studied English Literature at Bates College and completed a Fulbright grant in Malaysia. Denali currently leads the grassroots environmental justice coalition Protect Our Water, Heritage Rights (POWHR).

In *Compost This Book*, the dynamic LA-based writer, artist, content strategist and composting maven Cassandra Marketos sets out to provide an essential, inspiring and delightfully off-beat introduction to composting for both beginners and current enthusiasts, with a book so gorgeous it should sit on a coffee table.

No matter where you live on the planet, if you care about doing your part to combat global warming, composting is probably the single most effective change you can make to your daily life. Despite the exploding interest in composting, there are very few books that offer guidance or inspiration; and those that do have a design quality similar to a child's school report.

Drawing on her extensive experience as a community composter and compost consultant in Los Angeles, *Compost This Book* focuses on the key components necessary to establish a productive and enjoyable compost pile, but it also includes some unique reflections on compost and the philosophical implications of decomposition similar to her current work found in her popular Substack newsletter The Rot: therot.substack.com. The book has an inspiring, quirky voice and a brevity that make it both a beautiful piece of writing and an ideal companion for individuals interested in getting started with composting. Written in vivid prose, On Fire For God is a stirring and urgent examination of the far-reaching emotional, political, and sociological effects of the Christian Right. With unflinching honesty, exvaneglical journalist Josiah Hesse shares his personal journey from the stifling working class town of Mason City, Iowa, through the institutions of the Christian right: a toxic mixture of schools, ministries, and Christian camps that taught creationism, foretold horrific stories of the rapture, instilled sexual shame, and fearmongered followers into believing ceaseless agony was awaiting sinners in the afterlife. Like many of his peers, Hesse eventually escaped his hometown a high-school dropout, ultimately finding himself squatting in Denver where, for the first time, he truly considers that perhaps God doesn't exist, the world wasn't going to end, and that he was woefully unprepared for a future he never thought would arrive.

While prevailing theories about the disappearing working class point to opioids, automation, or globalism as the culprits, Hesse's story of awakening and escape exposes how conservative Christian conmen routinely strip communities, such as Hesse's hometown of Mason City, Iowa, of their wealth, rationality, and self-esteem. His story goes far beyond that often-asked question: "Why did 81% of evangelical voters—the majority of them poor and working class—support Donald Trump?" Instead, Hesse brings deep feeling and piercing immediacy to what he describes as the socioeconomic tragedy of the American working class.

Maurice, Little Mutulu, Mogie, Mocedes, Mopreme, 'Preme -- Mopreme Shakur has been known by a lot of names. He is the eldest son of Mutulu Shakur: a leader of men, a prominent figure in the movement for the liberation of Black people, a thirty-six-year-long political prisoner in a country that doesn't admit we have them. Enter Barney Pressman, his grandfather and founder of Barneys New York, which was at the time a thriving downtown discount retailer of men's clothing that would soon become the largest, most successful merchant of menswear in the world. Each morning, Gene and Barney would head downtown, the elder to the executive suite and the younger to the warehouse floor. Not by command, but by instinct, the younger Pressman wanted to know how every part of the business worked. Gene was something else: an impresario, a visionary, and an artist who created an atmosphere with the people and designs he and his family intentionally invited into his space. And that space was Barneys.

Gene's memoir will tell the story of how he created the coolest department store the world has ever seen. It will also tell the story of the Pressmans: How his grandfather Barney founded the store downtown on 17th Street in 1923. What Barney's son Fred thought should—and should not—happen with the store, as he looked to Europe's and Japan's menswear designers. And how Gene arrived on the scene and soon insisted on his own fiefdom within the business: an alcove on the top floor, where he'd bring in a few women's lines from Paris and see how that went. This memoir is about fathers and sons and brothers, about family dreams and drama in a city where all of it and more was and is still possible. It is a quintessentially New York story of the Pressman family, one of the city's most consequential dynasties, and the tale of a young man's indelible coming of age.

We have heard from the men about what it's like to train to be a celebrated chef in the form of Michael Ruhlman's *The Making of a Chef* and Anthony Bourdain's *Kitchen Confidential*, but their stories are over 20 years old. Hope Wabuke welcomed her son with open arms, and yet she could not separate her excitement and love from her anxiety. She knew the names of the unarmed black boys and girls lost in recent years: Trayvon Martin, Tamir Rice, Mike Brown, Jordan Davis, Ayana Davis, and now George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Jacob Blake and on and on and on. She knew what the world was capable of.

This is the reality of being a black mother to a black son: Racism and violence live at the surface. In Wabuke's memoir-in-essays, she wrestles with the violent realities her son will face growing up black in America, set against the realities she herself faces as a Black woman, a single mother, the daughter of refugees, a scholar, an artist, and a domestic abuse and sexual assault survivor. How does she take the lessons of her own life, of the systemic oppression of black bodies, and teach her son to not just survive, but to thrive? Building upon her viral essay "Five Moments in the Life of a Black Mother" from *The Hairpin*, Wabuke explores the cultural, historical, and personal trauma particular to black motherhood. From that wonderful day her son was born, to facing years of domestic violence inside her home and racial violence outside her home, to spending a year in a domestic violence shelter with her one-year-old baby boy, to finding a stable life with her son in a city where she can work and write, Wabuke gives urgent, beautiful life to a story of motherhood and survival. Extending a conversation carved out by Ta-Nehisi Coates's work and engaging with writers like Morgan Jerkins and Tressie McMillan Cottom in their discussions of culture and feminism, Wabuke's searing memoir brings one woman's story front and center.

She then sued Alberto and Nike and settled last fall, and now she's sharing her story.

Fastest Girl will be an eye-opening, game-changing memoir of running, coming of age as an athletic phenom, soaring success, and a toxic and abusive sports industrial complex that nearly snuffed out one of its brightest stars. In the years since Mary left Nike, she has become an advocate for survivors of abuse, and her primary aim with this book is to reveal that abuse is much subtler, more camouflaged, than we generally believe. This is especially true in sport, where the lines between virtues like grit and tenacity and their more insidious forms—obsession, mania—are often blurred.

Fastest Girl will appeal to readers of not only running memoirs, like Alexi Pappas's Bravey, but also to readers of unflinching accounts of surviving trauma and abuse. Those who made successes out of Chanel Miller's Know My Name, Stephanie Foo's What My Bones Know, Jennette McCurdy's I'm Glad My Mom Died, and even Britney Spears's The Woman in Me will be similarly immersed in and moved by Mary's experiences in Fastest Girl.


We all feel it — the distraction, the loss of focus, the addictive focus on the wrong things for too long. We bump into the zombies on their phones in the street, and sometimes they're us. We stare in pity at the four people at the table in the restaurant, all on their phones, and then we feel the buzz in our pocket. Something has changed utterly: for most of human history, the boundary between public and private has been clear, at least in theory. Now, as Chris Hayes writes, 'With the help of a few tech firms, we basically tore it down in about a decade.' Hayes argues that we are in the midst of an epoch-defining transition: attention has become a commodified resource extracted from us, and from which we are increasingly alienated.

Because there is a breaking point. 

American history is almost always told from East to West. Yet a closer look at the past reveals the country's start began not in the East, but in the West—at a Texan city situated in a natural shallow crossing of the Rio Grande River: El Paso.

El Paso is the crossroads of Indigenous America, the nexus of a thousand-year-old Native American migration and trade route, linking MesoAmerican and Pueblo empires and beyond. It's where the European conquest of North America began, and where the United States' Manifest Destiny was later achieved. Here, East met West, where the consequential transatlantic route, the Southern Pacific, was completed in 1881. Here the West was "won"—the Indian Wars were not fought on the Great Plains, but in the Southwest, with a scorched-earth strategy that went on for decades. It's where Immigrant America starts—more immigrants have passed through El Paso than Ellis Island—and where crucial battles for Civil Rights were fought—the city smashing through racial and ethnic discrimination before anywhere else in the nation.

The Crossing is a revelatory new history of El Paso that recasts the city as the unacknowledged cradle of American history, where cultures have encountered each other for centuries and forged a thriving multi-ethnic community far ahead of the rest of the nation. As award-winning, El Paso—native journalist Richard Parker charts, the city holds not only the framework of our American story, but also a model for a more diverse and flourishing country.

Richard Parker is the son of a Mexican mother and an American father, and grew up in El Paso, TX. 

A history of The Grateful Dead's monumental speaker system and the superhuman ambition, invention, and drama behind its rise and fall in the 1970s, the book will draw on new sources and trace a line from the Dead and crew's innovations to the audio technology of today.

Much like the band's four surviving members who are in their 70s and 80s and still tour the world playing shows in front of millions, devotion to The Grateful Dead is a seemingly ageless phenomenon.

It's well known that, by all measures of size, endurance, and fervor, few fandoms rival that of the Dead. Their live music reached an estimated 25 million people in over 2,000 live shows between 1965 to 1995. Even in 2015, the Dead's five-day "Fare Thee Well" Tour broke records for both attendance and pay-per-view streaming. Their ever-zealous followers, Deadheads, inaugurated the now typical practice of superfandom with their mass-documentation of the band since its beginnings, via zines, concert tapes, clothing and merchandise, books and documentaries, photo archives and podcasts. Given the widespread passion for and public scholarship on the Dead, it's surprising that few cultural considerations of the band, in books or otherwise, have focused on the most concrete and literally staggering embodiment of their ingenuity: their groundbreaking speaker system dubbed the "Wall of Sound."

More than just a technological feat and an underexplored piece of Deadhead lore, the story of the Wall of Sound is a tale about human creativity and ambition, with a cast of eccentric, at times neurotic, yet endearing characters who orbited the band and contributed to its zeitgeist-defining rise and an equally dazzling—temporary—downfall.

It's a very entertaining, beautifully written memoir of his personal relationship with a sport that could well be on its last legs.

We often assume these lakes are barren and inhospitable, unaware of the crucial role they play in our ecosystems, the global water cycle, and public health. But Caroline Tracey is paying attention.

In *Salt Lakes* Caroline braids memoir and science writing to reveal the beauty and necessity of these underestimated bodies of water. Each chapter of her book will focus on a different salt lake, examining its conservation history, imperiled future, and intersections with her own story. As Caroline learns about these vulnerable lakes and the decades-long fight to protect them, she begins to explore her own queer identity and to build the boundary-defying life she's always longed for. In Caroline's deft hands, salt lakes become a symbol of resilience; a call to protect all that's rare and fragile in our environment and in our lives; and a reminder that each of us will need to adapt to our rapidly changing world. Her blend of memoir and science writing will appeal to fans of *H is for Hawk* by Helen McDonald and

Lab Girl by Hope Jahren. But we also anticipate that it will find a place on the shelf alongside other gorgeously written queer memoirs, like Carmen Maria Machado's *In the Dream House* and Maggie Nelson's *The Argonauts*.

WHAT KIND OF MOTHER

The Untold Story of Birth Mothers

Bernadette gave her son up for adoption when she found herself pregnant at 17, in an Irish-Catholic household with a mother who had bipolar disorder, and a very strict father who would allow an abortion even though it was legal at the time.

One of the biggest taboos in adoption stories and articles is looking at this life-altering situation from the birth mother's perspective. Books and articles tend to focus on the adoptees and adoptive parents and families. *elinquished: The Untold Story of Birth Mothers* will take readers through Bernadette's own story—how she sought out this son 40 years later, even though she had a successful career and a loving family of four—but even more compellingly, Bernadette will be one of the first journalists to go to states that have outlawed abortion and interview young women who are facing the choice of adoption. To tell the story of birth mothers, Bernadette will lean heavily into memoir, but expand beyond her own experience by using research and interviews to provide a bigger picture, all woven into a narrative that will keep readers turning pages.

When the Supreme Courts draft to overturn Roe was first leaked, it included the phrase "domestic supply of infants" in Justice Alito's opinion, and he footnoted in his statement "...nearly 1 million women were seeking to adopt children in 2002 (i.e., they were in demand for a child), whereas the *domestic supply of infants* relinquished at birth or within the first month of life and available to be adopted had become virtually nonexistent." The argument seemed to be that if fewer women were given access to abortion, then more families hoping to adopt could be accommodated. What's not accounted for in this perspective are two reasons Bernadette wants to write this book: 1) Adoption is not an answer to abortion. Adoption, on the other hand, is an answer to the question, do you wish to (or are you able to) parent this child you have borne? And 2) To fully answer the second question, birth parents need to have information on what's involved. But since women like her have been so disgraced and discredited, their stories are not in the cultural vernacular and thus are unavailable to help people know what they're getting into.

Decoding My Ancestor's Scandalous Secret Diaries

Skillfully blending memoir, biography and narrative history, *The Coded Life* is a book about fatherhood and legacy—one man's exploration of the histories we inherit and what we pass along, by choice or otherwise.

In 1975, a man stumbled upon a box of small, hand-sewn notebooks in a house set for demolition in Wadesboro, North Carolina. After thumbing through the delicate pages and finding something akin to hieroglyphics, he passed the books to a retired NSA cryptanalyst who quickly cracked the code, uncovering the recorded life of a white Southern farmer named William Thomas Prestwood. The diaries offered a ground-level view of the 19th century from the perspective of a man who passed his days recording eclipses and dissecting rabbits and calculating planetary orbits and reading Goethe and sneaking into barn lofts and closets with dozens of lovers. "The reader is left," the now-deceased codebreaker wrote, "with the lasting impression that here in these pathetic little books is the very essence of Everyman's life from the cradle to the grave." But to Jones, this strange farmer was no Everyman. He was his great-great-great-great grandfather.

The Coded Life is a biography of a forgotten 19th century farmer, but it's also a memoir about a man coming home, becoming a father and thinking hard about the life he wants to leave for his sons. Along the way, Jones reckons with his family's complicity in slavery, dips his toes into the worlds of cryptography and genetics, and explores universal questions about land, legacy, American history and how that history robs the most vulnerable among us. As Jones seamlessly weaves these strands together across the pages of *The Coded Life*, Prestwood's quotidian diaries take on new importance and heightened stakes, the author using him as a lens through which to understand not only his own life but a family history rich with love and tradition—while also stained with secret and sin.

Jeremy B. Jones' first book, *Bearwallow*, was winner of the Independent Publisher Gold Medal for Memoir, and his essays have been published or are forthcoming in *The Bitter Southerner, Oxford American, Quarterly West*, and *The Iowa Review*. A graduate of the nonfiction MFA program at Iowa, he is an associate professor of English at Western Carolina University.

We Want Them Alive begins with the disappearance of one person, Jorge Antonio Hernandez Dominguez, an 18-year-old U.S. citizen, in the border town of Nuevo Laredo, Mexico. On April 4th 2018, the young man, having finished work, left home to pick up dinner. He would never return. As his mother Maria would soon learn, Jorge's disappearance was one of 49 others over the course of three months, all attributed to the Mexican marines. Bodies would be found days later, buried in the desert, with a single hand purposefully left above ground. Others would never be found, robbing their families of any sense of closure. Jorge had been pulled from the family's Dodge Caravan, not by narcos with gold-plated AK 47s, but by Mexico's marine special forces, the nation's most elite counter-cartel unit, soldiers trained in American bases who had worked with the U.S. Army's Delta Force, DEA, CIA, and two years earlier had become legends after they captured infamous drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman.

In the Mexican press, the campaign of terror became known as la limpieza, the cleansing. But why would a country's own military inflict such injustice on its own people, individuals with no known ties to cartels? And why was no one—neither the Mexican police nor the United States' State Department, which has an obligation to investigate the deaths of US citizens abroad—doing anything about it?

We Want Them Alive follows three individuals as they seek answers to those questions: Maria, the determined mother who with a group of women set out to do the impossible; Raymundo Ramos, a former journalist and human rights activist rumored to be allied with the local cartel; and a marine, an anonymous soldier who will lift the veil on how America's chosen weapon in the drug war became mass murderers.

A major new work of narrative nonfiction that pulls back the curtain on a deeply sinister, multi-billion-dollar criminal operation that began targeting the public during the pandemic: the rise of "pig-butchering scams" fueled by human trafficking and forced labor.

The scam often begins with an innocuous "wrong number" text sent via WhatsApp or a friendly hello on Facebook or LinkedIn. As soon as the victim replies, the scammers start turning the psychological screws with promises of easy money. Many of these crimes are unreported, and almost all go unsolved. But from among the millions who have fallen victim to this fraud, a small cohort have fought back. *The Big Trace* will follow Brian Bruce—a Mississippi family man—who became an expert at cryptocurrency tracing in a bid to find his scammers and bring them to justice. Working alongside law enforcement and a Singaporean activist nicknamed "Xellos," he has achieved unprecedented victories for himself and other scam victims. As Bruce quickly realized, though, everyday Americans were far from the only ones to suffer under this criminal regime.

Since 2020, hundreds of thousands of people have been trafficked into dystopian scam compounds scattered across Cambodia, Myanmar, and Laos. Lured in with lucrative offers for non-existent jobs, recruits are threatened with beatings and forced to send the seemingly innocuous texts we all receive on our phones. They are the victims of a nefarious new type of modern slavery that's become so industrialized that forced scam laborers are often bought and sold on messaging platforms like Telegram. With its extraordinary characters, life-or-death consequences, and urgent message, *The Big Trace* will reshape conversations about cybercrime and human trafficking and is poised to join the ranks of investigative classics such as John Carreyrou's *Bad Blood*. As a story of hubris and ill-gotten gains, it echoes the portrait of Jho Low in Tom Wright and Bradley Hope's *Billion Dollar Whale*. Nick Bilton's *American Kingpin*, about the Silk Road online drug marketplace, also offers an apt comparison for The Big Trace, as a story about how criminals innovate and about the humble, hard-working people who try to stop them.

UNTITLED ON PORTRAIT OF WALLY

How an Intrepid Customs Agent and a Gutsy Federal Prosecutor Brought Justice to the Art World

A revelatory new work of narrative nonfiction which explores one of the most consequential legal dramas in the history of art: the custody battle for prominent Austrian Expressionist Egon Schiele's fabled *Portrait of Wally.* The efforts of federal prosecutors and investigators not only led to a settlement in favor of the painting's rightful owners, but to new standards for museums and a new paradigm for the restitution of looted objects.

Painted in 1912, *Portrait of Wally* was one of the artist's greatest works. It was raw and emotional, depicting Schiele's lover and muse, Wally Neuzil. After Schiele's death in 1918, the painting was acquired by Lea Bondi, a Jewish collector who thrived in Vienna's diverse artistic world. But in 1938, it was stolen by a Nazi gallerist, and Bondi was forced to flee to London. She tried to recover the painting in the aftermath of the war, only to be betrayed by a passionate young collector named Rudolph Leopold, who coveted it for himself. With *Portrait of Wally*, Leopold found the cornerstone for what would, in time, emerge as the greatest private collection of Schiele's art anywhere in the world. Cohen's book will piece together this intricate secret history, exploring archives across the United States and Europe.

Bondi's heirs tirelessly sought to reclaim the painting, and in 1997 had a chance. Loaned by the newly established Leopold Museum in Vienna, *Portrait of Wally* was to headline a retrospective at MOMA. But the *NYT's*' Judith Dobrzynski rocked the art world when she revealed the true history of the painting. Just weeks later, it was dramatically seized by the Manhattan DA, beginning an epic, decade-long legal battle. That closely fought case will provide the structure for the book, as well

as its emotional climax: a 2008 courtroom showdown between Leopold and the Bondi heirs. Cohen's book has all the makings of a page-flipping literary thriller in the vein of *Catch Me If You Can*, yet it also promises to tell a more profound story about justice and restitution—one akin to such works as *Killers of the Flower Moon* by David Grann and *Say Nothing* by Patrick Radden Keefe.

On the surface Abby Choi led a life of perfection. She was an ambitious socialite on the rise in Hong Kong's rarefied and competitive monied social scene. But a dark, sinister reality lurked behind Abby's polished façade, one that she was desperate to escape but ultimately could not. Though she never betrayed a hint of her troubles or personal life online, in reality Abby Choi was, at twenty-eight, a twice-married mother of four young children. She hadn't been born rich; her family's money came from her mother's second marriage to a powerful mainland Chinese construction magnate when Abby was in high school. Abby, desperate to chart her own path, to earn her own money and position in the world, and an outsider at a Hong Kong high school where old guard families sent their kids, fell for the one person she shouldn't: Alex, the handsome bad-boy son of a fantastically corrupt, violent, and powerful police chief with ties to Hong Kong's infamous underworld. Her life would never be the same, even after she and Alex divorced and she married up, way up.

Abby Choi never made it to twenty-nine, though how and why she died is a story that could only take place in modern-day Hong Kong. And it reveals so much about what the remarkable, courageous people of that city, from every social class and circumstance, are facing in this watershed moment in history.

Through vivid personal narratives, original research, and unflinching scrutiny, *The Difference a Day Makes* will expose the realities of pretrial detention and the harrowing consequences, both immediate and lasting, of spending even just 24 hours in jail.

Of the ten million people who are admitted to U.S. jails each year, only twenty percent have been convicted of a crime. The rest, the overwhelming majority, are being detained pretrial. *The Difference a Day Makes* will explore how, despite the central tenet of American law—the presumption of innocence—jails subject people to a relentless series of horrors from the moment of their arrest to their release. Most troublingly, the dehumanizing experiences that accompany even just a single day in jail stick with detainees long after the fact, ruining their lives for years to come and setting them on paths that lead back to incarceration. The book will investigate pretrial detention as an underexamined lynchpin in a system that punishes by design and often irreparably, regardless of whether someone is guilty of the crimes they allegedly committed.

In the vein of Michelle Alexander's *The New Jim Crow* and Matthew Desmond's contemporary classic *Evicted*, *The Difference a Day Makes* will weave together the narratives of ten core characters whose experiences and voices illuminate the many facets of pretrial detention and its propensity for harm. These accounts, drawn from extensive interviews as well as hundreds of hours of observation in county jails, will unfurl against the backdrop of U.S. criminal policy, which has brought about a five-fold increase in the number of people detained pretrial over the past fifty years. *The Difference a Day Makes* will offer dramatic, up-close testimony to the human suffering that occurs in jail. At the same time, the book will call readers' attention to efforts to correct and transform our understanding of justice, and it will galvanize them to pursue such change in their own communities.

Journalist and anthropologist Cecilia Ballí's *Mariachi Dreams*, chronicling a year in Starr County, Texas, where three of the country's top high school mariachis vie for trophies and glory, complete with character portraits, heated competition, and a backdrop of polarizing border policy.

Every year along Texas's southern border, in a small, poor, rural region called Starr County, three of America's top high school mariachi groups vie against each other for glory and bragging rights. Cecilia Ballí first threw open the doors to the world in a *New York Times* Magazine piece in late 2022, and the response was overwhelming: a flood of appreciative notes from readers, hundreds of comments, emails from professors who began teaching the piece in their classes, and interest from the film and TV world that led to both the scripted and unscripted rights to the piece being optioned. In *Mariachi Dreams* she continues the story, chronicling a full calendar year among these three teams, not only because her *Times* piece revealed that there was an audience for it but because right now the story of high school mariachi is actually a story about so much more.

Just as Buzz Bissinger's *Friday Night Lights* looked beyond the goalposts to issues like religion, race, and class in a small town where football was king, *Mariachi Dreams* will lift its gaze from competitive mariachi and focus, too, on immigration, border history, the changing demographics of Texas and all of America, and what it means to straddle dual cultures the way most of the book's characters do. This book will captivate readers with its immersive plot, enlighten them with its timely themes, mark the powerful debut of a new voice in narrative journalistic nonfiction, and introduce mariachi to the world as the site of so much magic, heartbreak, transformation, and belonging.





Though Unger later recovered his name and became a bestselling author on Republican abuses of power, the October Surprise remained his white whale, the project he—as well as legendary investigative journalist, the late Robert Parry—worked on late at night and between assignments. In *Den of Spies*, Unger reveals the definitive story of the October Surprise, going inside his three-decade reporting odyssey, along with Parry's never-before-seen archives, and sharing startling truths about what really happened in 1980. The result is a real-life political thriller filled with double agents, CIA operatives, slippery politicians, KGB documents, wealthy Republicans, and dogged journalists. Sherman's March and Emancipation

A groundbreaking account of Sherman's March to the Sea—the critical Civil War campaign that destroyed the Confederacy—told for the first time from the perspective of the enslaved people who fled to the Union lines and transformed Sherman's march into the biggest liberation event in American history.

In the fall of 1864, Gen. William T. Sherman led his army through Atlanta, Georgia, burning buildings of military significance—and ultimately most of the city—along the way. From Atlanta, they marched across the state to the most important city at the time: Savannah. Mired in the deep of the South with no reliable supply lines, Sherman's army had to live off the land and the provisions on the plantations they seized along the way. As the army marched to the east, plantation owners fled, but even before they did so, slaves self-emancipated to Union lines. By the time the army seized Savannah in December, as many as 20,000 enslaved people had attached themselves to Sherman's army. They endured hardships, marching as much as twenty miles a day—often without food or shelter from the winter weather—and at times Union commanders discouraged and even prevented the self-emancipated from staying with the army. Racism was not confined to the Confederacy.


Historian Bennett Parten brilliantly reframes this seminal episode in Civil War history. He not only helps us understand how Sherman's March impacted the war, and what it meant to the enslaved, but also reveals how it laid the foundation for the fledging efforts of Reconstruction. Sherman's march has remained controversial to this day. But as Parten reveals, it played a significant role in ending the Civil War, due in no small part to the efforts of the tens of thousands of enslaved people who became a part of it. 

Whether they were skimming money from innocuous-seeming charities, coolly slipping weapons into hidden compartments of vans and houses, or scouring local graveyards for the names of dead Irishmen to use on federal firearm forms, the gunrunners approached their mission—to unite Ireland under one flag, by any means necessary—with ruthless poise, even as investigators closed in, members of their own movement began to turn on them, and bodies stacked up on all sides.

A gripping tale of crime, rebellion, and the hazy line between them, *The Next One Is for You* is the definitive account of America's hand in the Troubles—a conflict whose resonance is still felt today, in the United States and Ireland alike.

The Hidden Story of an Insurrection, a Family, a Town and Identity in America

Black, White Colored tells the singular story of Lauinburg, North Carolina as a lens through which to view the story of race and identity in the United States in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

While many have heard about the 1921 race massacre in Tulsa, Oklahoma, the home of Black Wall Street, and the tragedy of the riots that wiped out much of the Black population and its wealth, few know about Laurinburg, North Carolina and the bloody race riot by the Red Shirts, a White supremacist group, that forced many black families and black-owned businesses to flee Laurinburg, North Carolina before Election Day, 1898. This was the only recorded insurrection that successfully changed the outcome of an election.

In the late 19th Century, Laurinburg, North Carolina in Scotland County stood as a beacon, an example of how Blacks and Whites could live and work together. Blacks were landlords, businessmen and doctors, a community who created their own an oasis amid chaos and dangerous gazes. Churches and businesses were built by families whose parents were enslaved a few years prior. Booker T. Washington sanctioned a school, The Laurinburg Institute, to fight the remnants of the Laurinburg insurrection through education. This institute was built on the land the Malloy family owned, and was responsible for the education of Dizzy Gillespie, Ben Vereen, the family of Spike Lee, Sam Jones, and many NBA basketball players. During Reconstruction and Jim Crow, Laurinburg and the Malloy home was a hot spot for notable doctors, tennis players, and political figures. The authors are a daughter and a granddaughter of Lawrence E. Malloy Sr., a key character in their book. They set out to research and share the history of their family and Laurinburg, North Carolina, both of which can be seen to be a microcosm of race and identity in the United States.

The untold story of Janet Flanner, a culture-writer stationed in Paris from 1925-1939, who woke the world to the political, economic, and military realities in Europe and singlehandedly turned a fledgling magazine called *The New Yorker* from a provincial gossip rag into a powerhouse of global reporting.

The story begins when Flanner, a Midwesterner living in Paris, receives a letter from Harold Ross and Jane Grant asking if she'd like to join their new project. It's a fun, humor magazine, explicitly apolitical (and not very good); would she report on the latest trends from the City of Lights? Flanner agrees. She loves art, beauty, and culture. She has no way of knowing that the following decade will be defined by an economic depression, the rise of fascism, and a darkness that is creeping across Europe.

Letters From Paris on Fire is a tightly coiled drama for readers of gripping, character-driven nonfiction such as Death in the City of Light by David King, The Hotel on Place Vendome by Tilar J. Mazzeo, and In the Garden of Beasts by Erik Larson. It's for fans of books featuring unconventional women and hidden figures—as woman in a male-dominated profession, Flanner revolutionizes journalism. She consistently bucks convention, escaping marriage (in exchange for long-term relationships with three women), life in America, and the confines of her job description, transforming from an insecure novelist to a trailblazing truth-teller. Along the way, she loses and regains her faith in the power of art, in the potential for goodness to prevail over evil, and in her own voice.

Mark Braude is a cultural historian and the author of *Kiki Man Ray, The Invisible Emperor*, and *Making Monte Carlo*. He has been a visiting fellow at the American Library in Paris, a postdoctoral fellow at Stanford, a National Endowment for the Humanities Public Scholar, and the recipient of a Silvers Grant.

THE GIRL IN BLUE A True Story of Defiance, Murder & Beautiful Obsessions

A spellbinding nonfiction historical thriller, *The Girl In Blue* unravels the tragic history behind *La Petite Irène*, an iconic Renoir portrait of a little girl with a blue ribbon, who, with her prominent Jewish family, fought to survive the German occupation of Paris during World War II and to recover the precious looted painting after it vanished in the murky international art market.

In 1941, as Nazi rule permeated ever more deeply into the fabric of French society, a specialized unit of German troops stormed the castle of Chambord in the Loire Valley to loot one of Pierre-Auguste Renoir's most gorgeous and evocative masterworks: *La Petite Irène*. The painting is of a young girl, who poses with her hands folded in her lap. As *The Girl in Blue* will chronicle in Doreen's signature writerly prose, the painting's theft, representative of one of world history's darkest chapters, tore apart a prominent Jewish family and triggered a tragic cascade of deadly violence.

Irène Cahen d'Anvers, the little girl with the blue ribbon who sat for Renoir in 1880, belonged to one of Paris's wealthiest Jewish families. Her childhood was privileged and full of opportunity, but she was a restless soul. Just five years after marrying and conceiving two children, Irène unexpectedly eloped with the family's handsome Italian stable master and converted to his Catholic faith. When the Nazi party took power in Germany and occupied France, Irène's attempts to mask her Jewish identity may have spared her life, but they failed to protect the rest of her family. The book will show how Irène's life decisions—especially her sudden conversion to Catholicism and masterful evasion of arrest during the occupation—continue to divide her family for decades. *The Girl in Blue* will restore Irène's painful yet critical place in the history of Germany's occupation of France, the incarceration and torture of Jews at Drancy, and their ruthless extermination in Nazi concentration camps.

The Story and Meaning of Mount Rushmore

An Eternal Tribute will be a newly energized consideration of supposedly familiar history and a work of literary nonfiction for the same readers of How The Word is Passed by Clint Smith, and On Juneteenth by Annette Gordon-Reed—and it is written with Peter Matthiessen's In the Spirit of Crazy Horse as its artistic polestar. Having to look no further than former President Trump's July 3, 2020 speech before the monument, Mount Rushmore remains a contested symbol at the heart of American identity and the nation's conception of its own history.

Davis will revisit the meaning and the myth of Mount Rushmore's creation via three narrative strands. The first is the story of Mt. Rushmore's origins and construction, with particular attention paid to its creator, sculptor Gutzon Borglum, an American artist whose parents had immigrated from Denmark as Mormons and who was born in a log cabin in Idaho. His ambition led him to study in Rodin's studio in Paris, to begin and fail to complete the Confederate shrine at Stone Mountain in Georgia, and to become a member of the Klu Klux Klan, all before embarking upon a sixteen-year quest to construct what he called his "Shrine of Democracy" in the Black Hills of South Dakota. The second strand is a contemporary travelogue through those very hills, known to the Lakota as Paha Sapa, wherein Davis gathers images and voices that present an altogether different view of America's greatest monument. For it is impossible to separate the story of Rushmore from the story of the United States' treatment of American Indians and the Federal government's shameful violation of the 1868 Treaty of Laramie. The third strand will consist of essayistic analysis that explores this moment of American "historical memory," asking: What is the role of our national monuments? Whose history do they tell? Should a place like Mount Rushmore—which has become celebrated by white nationalists—exist in 21st-century America?

The Last Mountain Lions of Los Angeles

"If you've been outdoors in a place where cougars live, then you've been close to a cougar. They saw you, but you didn't see them."

The mountain lions of California are the last of a decimated population, descendants from the Ice Age, slipping through the shadows of American suburbia, reminding us that the wild isn't so far away. Deanne Stillman, acclaimed and bestselling author of literary nonfiction such as *Mustang: The Saga of the Wild Horse in the American West*, contemplates the deep-time legacy and unfolding fate of cougars in the American West. Spellbound by celebrity cats like P-22, the subject of the just-released documentary, "The Cat that Changed America," and others, such as the Culvert Cat who died trying to flee the Woolsey Fire, Stillman pursues the history and state of the mountain lion in the region that came be known as Los Angeles, a dynamic border where urbanity meets a slice of raw, untamed nature.

Ghost Cats will travel from the cougar's evolutionary origins, to the Pueblo's spiritual reverence for the animal, to Teddy Roosevelt's far-sighted conservation of its habitat that belied his complicated relationship to creatures he considered "abject cowards," "beast[s] of stealth and rapine," and "ferocious and bloodthirsty." In the present, Stillman accompanies the scientists fighting to understand and protect these vulnerable animals; and she weighs this schizophrenic history, in which humans fail to reconcile a dangerous combination of awe, indifference, and fear.

In a time when we have retreated to our homes, Stillman invites us to contemplate something completely primal, sheer wildness in flesh and sinew and claw, a manifestation of power, strength, self-knowledge, and mystery.

Deanne Stillman's books include *Blood Brothers, Desert Reckoning,* and *Mustang,* a *Los Angeles Times* Best Book of the Year. In addition, she wrote the cult classic, *Twentynine Palms,* another *Los Angeles Times* bestseller.

Race, School, and the Building of a Nation

An essential new work of narrative history—this book will chronicle of the social and political forces that shaped the emergence of the U.S. education system over the nineteenth century, a revised origin story that will open readers' eyes to a legacy of racism, violence, and exploitation involving Black, white, and Native Americans.

Jarvis Givens' research exposes the degree to which race—a factor that goes unexamined in other stories of early U.S. education—was part and parcel of the federal government's approach to establishing its schools. The book will document how the conquest and sale of Native American lands directly funded the country's public schools, many of which were constructed using the labor of enslaved Black Americans. The profits of slavery and settler colonialism underwrote classrooms for white students, in which they learned to adopt an American identity grounded in antiblackness and anti-indigeneity. Central to the book will be both the material backdrop of schools and the intimate interplay of Black, Native, and white education. Throughout the narrative, readers will encounter familiar characters such as Booker T. Washington and Thomas Jefferson whose lives and contributions to the national education system will be cast in a new light. Readers will also meet understudied historical communities—Native students at white-run, state-sanctioned schools that aimed to strip them of their tribal identity; enslaved and freed Black Americans living in Indian Territory—whose educational experiences illuminate the close, complicated relationships between races and how the United States deployed schools as a weapon in building the nation. Additionally, Jarvis will draw on his own experiences, from attending grade school in Compton, CA, through obtaining his doctorate, to show how this history reverberates in the present.

American Grammar will argue that if we are to address the stark educational inequities throughout the country today—especially for Black and Native students—we must confront how such inequities were built into our schools by design.

Rosenberg connects stories of historical fans and proto-fans to central questions about gender, power, taste, and technology, revealing not just a rich array of subcultures but also how those subcultures have left their indelible mark on the world at large.

Across decades, fandom has defined identity, built community, and fostered creativity, and in this book, Rosenberg will illuminate how understanding what came before Tumblr, Twitter, and TikTok is the key to shoring up the foundations of fandom as a force for joy and togetherness, even in the midst of polarization, censorship, and technological change. Sprinkled throughout the book will be narrative vignettes designed to transport readers into the hearts and minds of the fans of yesteryear, creating a perfect union of the deeply nerdy and highly accessible that will speak equally to her fellow fans and the fandom-curious. Fandom Forever (And Ever) will be catnip for readers of subculture-specific deep dives like Lizzy Goodman's Meet Me in the Bathroom, pop culture-fueled social histories like Jill Lepore's The Secret History of Wonder Woman, and accessible yet rigorous analysis in the vein of Amanda Montell's Cultish—as well as a critical first trade book to take the entirety of fandom's history as seriously as it deserves.

MOMENT IN THE SUN

Freedom in Antebellum Black Manhattan

The typical history of Black Americans in New York City is that slavery, which was outlawed in New York in 1827, was followed by poverty and silence until the Harlem Renaissance occurred in the 1920s. *An Eternal Tribute* shows that this interpretation is not only incorrect but omits a rich story of Black American creativity and achievement.

Shane's new book shows us a New York of the 1820s through 1840s that was alive with creative, ambitious, and successful African Americans. No longer barely visible slaves, they invented tap dancing, started the first African American newspaper, and Black theater. African Americans created one of the earliest Black joint stock companies and much more. Fascinating individuals ranging from a Black millionaire, cross-dressers, pimps for touch houses (brothels) through to burners, or Black confidence tricksters, stalked the streets. It was one of the most exciting periods in the city's history—and a lot of that excitement can be attributed to Black freedom.

When New York finally ended slavery in 1827, the city was one of the first sizeable urban slave societies in the New World forced to come to grips with abolition. To an often-startling extent, this first attempt at integration worked. People, languages, and customs mixed promiscuously in the "amalgamated" city in these years. Freedom produced a change in consciousness. Its public spaces filled with the sight and sound of ordinary African New Yorkers—and that was deliberate. The way African New Yorkers dressed or strolled down Broadway, gambled on a dreamed number, and especially created music and dancing that made the city a different and more exciting place. Their activities not only marked a new and exhilarating status as free people, but also fascinated, occasionally horrified, white onlookers. The resulting conjunction between Black creative activity and white voyeurism was unprecedented and would not recur until the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s.

Shane White is Challis Professor of History Emeritus at the University of Sydney specializing in African American history. His last book, *Prince of Darkness* (2015) won the Society of the Historians of the Early American Republic's Best Book Prize and the New York Society's New York City Award.

Dwight Eisenhower, Kay Summersby, and the Women of the General's Inner Circle During World War II

Telling untold stories from history, and uncovering forgotten ones, has become the literary project of our time.

Writers and scholars have dedicated themselves to the recovery of narratives that the historical record has ignored, and this act of unearthing has become a powerful means of questioning our cultural memory and the previously accepted historical record. Rarer, and perhaps even more illuminating, are the stories that were not passively forgotten but rather actively suppressed. Such is the case of Kay Summersby, known as the favored aide and driver to Supreme Allied Commander General Dwight D. Eisenhower during World War II, who has been erased from American history both literally and figuratively.

Kay, a glamorous former model eighteen years Eisenhower's junior, was one of the two-star general's most trusted advisors and closest confidants during the war. She was arguably the person who knew the famously closed-off Eisenhower best—and was also, possibly, his lover. But whether or not Ike and Kay had a physical affair, just the appearance of impropriety made her existence problematic to the future president's image and was enough to have her relegated to the historical margins. Eisenhower's biographers have waffled on the issue and failed to give Kay her due.

With *Other Fronts*, Elise hopes to bring Kay's story, and those of the other pioneering women in Ike's orbit during the same period, to a wide range of readers interested in World War II, women's history, and action-packed narrative non-fiction.

Yet as fabulous and famous as those in her scene were, Jean herself has largely remained a hidden subject.

Jean Stein best known for her masterpiece, Edie: An American Biography, an oral narrative on the life and times of Warhol Superstar Edie Sedgwick consisting of close to three hundred interviews she recorded. Yet despite knowing and loving Edie herself, she left out her own voice.

That's where historian and documentary film producer Kevin Burke comes in. Kevin will write the first book to be written about this remarkable and brilliant woman, constructed with the help of her family and access to her newly opened archive at the New York Public Library.

Kevin Burke is a historian, documentary film producer, and host/executive producer of the award-winning podcast series Your Hometown. In addition to serving as the director of research at the Hutchins Center for African & African American Research at Harvard University, he is the founder and CEO of Kevin Burke Productions, Inc., a New York-based company. His film credits include working as a producer on the popular PBS series Finding Your Roots, now in production on its tenth season; Making Black America: Through the Grapevine (PBS, 2022); the Emmy-nominated series The Black Church: This Is Our Story, This is Our Song (PBS, 2021); and Reconstruction: America after the Civil War (PBS, 2019), winner of the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award. With Henry Louis Gates Jr., Burke is the coauthor of And Still I Rise: Black America since MLK (Ecco/HarperCollins, 2015) and co-editor of the Norton Critical Edition of Solomon Northup's 1853 memoir, Twelve Years a Slave (W. W. Norton & Co., 2016). Burke graduated from Harvard College in 1998 and from Harvard Law School in 2003. He received his master's degree in History and Ph.D. in the History of American Civilization from Harvard in 2004 and 2006, respectively.

THE LOST FOUNDER

James Wilson and the Dream of a New America

You're probably familiar with many of America's founding fathers. Washington, Jefferson, Franklin, Hamilton, Madison—but one founder has somehow slipped through the cracks, despite the fact that his contributions were arguably more essential to the country's founding than those of any other, and his vision was without doubt the most democratic of them all. His name: James Wilson.

Jesse Wegman will reveal that James Wilson (and not James Madison) was the main architect of the Constitution—Wilson hand-wrote the first draft—and he was one of the few founders to sign both that document and the Declaration of Independence. He was a justice on the first Supreme Court; his interpretations guided the development of American law and inform its functioning even today. And despite his erudition and influence, Wilson was an unapologetic proponent of democracy; he believed political power must lie in the hands of common people. He was a poor immigrant from Scotland who studied with David Hume, Adam Smith, and Thomas Reid, and through them came to understand the crucial role of government in the lives of ordinary citizens. Wilson was also a complicated, flawed man who was nearly murdered by the people he championed, and whose mismanagement of his personal finances resulted in him being the only Supreme Court justice ever to go to prison. His eventual flight from his lenders led to a death in ignominy and his name being erased from history. There are at least three groups who are hungry for a book like this: the built-in readership that has always devoured stories of the founders; the younger generation of readers that is eager to hear new accounts about America's founding, complete with its complexities and contradictions; and the lawyers, judges, and other members of the legal world who rely on Wilson's thinking more than most of them realize.

Jesse Wegman joined the editorial board of the *New York Times* in 2013, and has since written close to 600 signed and unsigned editorials on the Supreme Court, politics, law, and justice. He was previously a senior editor at *The Daily Beast* and *Newsweek*, a legal news editor at Reuters, and the managing editor of *The New York Observer*. He is the author of *Let the People Pick the President*.

Obsessed with fame in an ancient culture where the battlefield was the surest place to win it, Alexander spent his entire adult life on campaign. During its 13-year campaign, Alexander's army marched over 20,000 miles, through most of the regions where the US has concentrated its military energies since 2001. He was there before us.

In our present moment, so alive to the idea of "greatness," an examination of Alexander and his myth can open a rich discussion about both the personal and national ambition to be great. Alexander's life is the template against which those of subsequent conquerors from Julius Caesar to Genghis Khan to Napoleon have been compared. Alexander's career, like that of Caesar, became a lesson in the dangers of a military despot. However, political and cultural trends suggest a surprising hunger for latter-day Alexanders.

An English professor at West Point, **Elizabeth Samet** received her BA from Harvard and her PhD from Yale. *Soldier's Heart* won the *Los Angeles Times* Book Prize for Current Interest and was also named one of *The New York Times*'s 100 Notable Books in 2007.

GOLD'S FOOL

A hunt for hidden gold, a hunt for the secret identity of a notorious Nazi, and one of the strangest Holocaust-related courtroom dramas in recent memory. Written by the author of *Plunder: A Memoir of Family Property and Nazi Treasure*, *Gold's Fools* is an outlandish but ultimately tragic tale of two best friends out to destroy each other.

Glenn Feldman, a lawyer in his sixties, has very publicly accused his best friend and business partner, Irwin Lande, of hiding in the basement of his 20,000 square-foot mansion billions of dollars' worth of Nazi gold. The gold, Feldman claims, was passed down to Lande by a deceased relative, Ludwig Delphiner. But Feldman has amassed thousands of pages of evidence which, he claims, proves that Delphiner was in fact the assumed identity of the Nazi Commissioner for Jewish Affairs in Hungary during WWII, Árpád Toldi. Lande was, then, the knowing beneficiary of a fortune seized from Jews exterminated in the camps—in effect, Feldman is accusing Lande of being a Nazi collaborator. Gold's Fools has the intrigue of a real-life mystery—Is there gold hidden in Lande's basement? Is Delphiner really Árpád Toldi?—and the tension of a courtroom drama.

But the deeper Kaiser dug into the story, the more bizarre and convoluted it became, the less clear the stakes. There were forged wills and hijacked weddings and smuggled corpses and threats from organized crime. The cast of characters included dirty cops, hapless private investigators, a former astronaut, and the Canadian Minister of Justice. At the center was one man's quixotic crusade to prove to the world that he has uncovered one of the greatest crimes in history.

Le Clercq, Balanchine, and a Life at the Forefront of the 20th Century

In the mode of Stacy Schiff's Pulitzer Prize-winning *Véra*, the novelistic story of Vladimir Nabokov's wife and their fifty-two-year marriage, *Tanaquil* will carry all the cultural heft of a "ballet book." Le Clercq's and Balanchine's love story is one for the ages, akin to those depicted in Amanda Vaill's *Everybody Was So Young* and Sam Kashner and Nancy Schoenberger's *Furious Love*.

George Balanchine was to dance what Picasso was to painting—not just a genius, but an inventor of a modern art form, and a defining artist of his century, founding what would eventually become the New York City Ballet. Tanaquil Le Clercq would rise through Balanchine's school to become the fledgling City Ballet's star dancer, a sly performer whose unprecedented lines perfectly expressed the choreographer's radical vision. She became his fifth and final wife, and the only one—according to friends and fellow dancers—who truly understood him and loved him for who he was, rather than what he could do for her. In 1956, during City Ballet's European tour, Le Clercq was stricken with polio, leaving her without the use of

her legs. Her life and Balanchine's stalled as their efforts at rehabilitation failed along with their marriage. And yet, even after their divorce, with Le Clercq confined to her wheelchair, she remained Balanchine's trusted adviser, a quietly astute observer of his work who refused to let tragedy diminish her enjoyment of life and dance.

In assorted combinations members of this group collaborated with each other, had affairs with each other, supported each other's work and dreams, and fed off of each other's talents in ways that forever changed the culture—ways that are still evident today. *Now We See the World Together* chronicles the three decades at the heart of these figures' careers, the 1930s through the 1950s, and for the first time examines how this period became a turning point in the history of modern art. As Liesl writes in the proposal, "this formative circle created some of the most recognizable styles of the twentieth century." And yes, Burning Man'23, aka mud fest, is covered. Weber, who has had a front row seat to everything newsworthy that's gone on in San Francisco for the past four decades, was there for that, too.

Jonathan Weber moved to San Francisco in 1990 as the *Los Angeles Times*' first-ever tech reporter. From there he helped found the Industry Standard. How George Washington's Enslaved Chef Transformed American Cuisine and Secretly Cooked His Way to Freedom

Hercules Posey was an enslaved cook for George Washington during the 1780s and 90s. A renowned chef during his lifetime, Hercules self-emancipated from Mount Vernon in 1796. Hercules and his remarkable story form the dramatic throughline of *Stirring Liberty*, but the book also paints a holistic portrait of the worlds of Mount Vernon, Alexandria, Philadelphia, and New York City that he moved through, and those who labored alongside him. We learn about other Black culinarians including Nathan and Doll, the enslaved cooks who trained Hercules; Hannah and Isaac Till who cooked for Washington during the Revolutionary War and as Free Blacks worked as caterers in Philadelphia; Polly Paine whose pepperpot became a Philadelphia favorite; and Charles Sang whose sculpted sugar tableaus were in demand among Philadelphia's elite. By including details of current events, other enslaved and free people, the white community that Hercules served, and the frenetic nation-building of the time, *Stirring Liberty* will demonstrate the possibility of making the enslaved, their experiences, motivations, desires, and difficulties real for the reader.

The Human Zoo will animate the decades across which human zoos served as a major galvanizing force in science, colonialism, and mass entertainment. Enticing history buffs, science enthusiasts, and social justice advocates alike, it will appeal to readers of such influential historical nonfiction as Truevine and River of the Gods. It will also aspire to join the ranks of such iconic, bestselling works of "alternative history" that challenge Eurocentric readings of the past, such as Empire of the Summer Moon and King Leopold's Ghost.

By the late nineteenth century, an entire industry had grown up around the exhibition of Indigenous people who had been kidnapped, coerced, or otherwise convinced to leave homelands ravaged by colonialism to be displayed across Europe and the United States. Simultaneously, human zoos became the sordid laboratories through which a nascent scientific field called anthropology came of age. The Human Zoo follows the perspective of five main characters: The German impresario Carl Hagenbeck, through which readers will see the creation of the human zoo and the business model that would drive it for decades; the Apache warrior Geronimo, who after being captured by the U.S. government sought to use his newfound celebrity status in the human zoo to advocate for his people; the dueling anthropologists WJ McGee and Franz Boas, who used the arena of the human zoo to battle for the future of an emerging academic field, with the former positing then-dominant theories of scientific racism and cultural evolution, and the latter pushing a revolutionary new theory of cultural relativism; and Ota Benga, a young Pygmy who found himself the unwilling symbol of the human zoo's final days.

With this book, Parks aims to tell the full story of the human zoo in way that no one has before, making the case to readers that the impact of these highly influential and under-covered phenomena still echo across our culture today.

The Tragic Sinking of the Steamship Valencia

The sinking of the *Valencia* was one of the most harrowing and significant disasters of its era—and an important precursor to the fabled sinking of the Titanic six years later. Much in the vein of Erik Larson's bestselling *Dead Wake*, *Wrecked* will bring the catastrophic *Valencia* sinking to life and establish it as a pivotal moment in the remarkable history of the Pacific Northwest.

On a mild January day in 1906, the *Valencia* steamed out of San Francisco and began the four-day voyage to Seattle. It was a journey made countless times by steamships, yet the *Valencia*'s crew were well aware of what could go wrong. Hundreds of ships had gone down off the west coast of Vancouver Island, an area known as the "Graveyard of the Pacific" for its poor visibility, rocky shoals, and fearsome currents. The captain, Oscar Marcus Johnson, was an experienced mariner, but on the third day of the journey, he lost his bearings in the increasingly thick winter fog. As *Wrecked* will narrate in cinematic detail, the vessel's hull was torn by jagged rocks on Vancouver Island's shallow coastline—beginning a terrifying multi-day ordeal for those onboard and a desperate "Hail Mary" rescue operation for the island's lighthouse keepers and telegraph operators.

Among the passengers was a young teacher named Frank Bunker, accompanied by his wife and their two children. The hopeful future they dreamed of would be tragically destroyed on the first night—Bunker watched his wife and children drown—yet he somehow remained determined that he, at least, would survive. Against the odds, he swam to shore and became the leader of a band of survivors later known as the "Bunker Party." They would endure unimaginable hardship as they trekked through miles of wilderness for help. Of the approximately 165 souls who left San Francisco, they would be among the fewer than 40 to survive. Opposite Bunker, Wrecked will follow Vancouver Island telegraph lineman David Logan, lighthouse keeper Minnie Paterson, and marine investigator James Gaudin as they raced to save the Bunker Party as well as the more than eighty people still trapped aboard the ship as it collapsed into the Pacific. Seeing Vancouver Island through their eyes will bring it to life for readers and offer a remarkable portrait of this unique historical moment.

Evoking recent bestselling historical narratives such as Douglas Brunt's *The Mysterious Case of Rudolf Diesel* and Adam Hochschild's *American Midnight*, as well as Greg Steinmetz's critically acclaimed *American Rascal*, *The Territory* is, at its core, a cinematic, stranger-than-fiction political thriller.

The Territory begins at the close of the nineteenth century, when a seasoned political operative named William "Bull" Andrews, the beneficiary of a master class in corruption from decades working in Pennsylvania politics and with John Rockefeller's Standard Oil Company, sought to build an empire in the far-flung territory of New Mexico. His plan was at once simple and ambitious: Create a business behemoth on misappropriated funds, claw for political power in the fledgling territory and push it toward statehood, raking in ungodly profits if (but more likely when) it was admitted into the union. The scheme—which required the indefatigable Bull to have his hands not just in New Mexican politics, but in Pennsylvanian politics, the halls of the U.S. Congress, and even the office of the president—eventually came crashing down with the high-profile suicide of a Pennsylvania cashier and a rising wave of reform intent on doing the impossible: breaking the control of the corrupt Republican machine. The book reaches its dramatic conclusion with a colorful courtroom trial—but somehow Bull Andrews gets off scot-free.

This book is framed around one territory's quest for statehood. But the story of Bull Andrews, the Pennsylvania Republican machine, and the corruption that drove New Mexico's admittance into the union is also, in microcosm, a story of the early twentieth-century American reform movement—a pivotal period in which Democratic and Republican progressives at the local, state, and national level sought to rein in corporate greed, make government less corrupt, and address pressing issues around industrial capitalism.



In a world where there is so much conflicting information about how we are supposed to live, what can we really know?


Knowing the truth, what's real from what's fake, should be easy. In today's world, that's far from the case. Life in Three Dimensions explores the shortcomings of happiness and meaning as guides to a good life, pointing to complacency and regret as a "happiness trap" and narrowness and misplaced loyalty as a "meaning trap." Psychological richness, Oishi proposes, balances the other two, offering insight and growth spurred by embracing uncertainty and challenges. In a lively style, drawing on a generation of psychological studies and on examples from famous people, books and film, Oishi introduces a new path to a fuller, more satisfying life with fewer regrets.

Shigehiro Oishi is the Marshall Field IV Professor of Psychology at the University of Chicago. He is one of the foremost authorities on happiness, meaning, and culture. He is the author of *The Psychological Wealth of Nations*, and his research has been featured in major media outlets, including *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*.

It won't surprise you to learn, after over a year of "Zoom school", that Tony and Ulrik argue that the education system is broken. They believe that having students hear and read material so that they, hopefully, memorize it, and then asking them to prove it by taking multiple-choice tests and exams, is bad way to educate people. But, in their book, Mastery, they argue that the system also fails to address inequity—they believe it perpetuates it—and they promote a new way of teaching that could change everything for the better.

One of the key advantages of mastery-based education is that students do not advance, individually, until they have passed milestones, and, therefore, it can be tailored to each student's ability and learning speed, allowing all to learn effectively. The nature of a mastery-based system is that teachers give more individualized feedback than they do in the traditional one—but as there are far fewer hours spent on group teaching, it can be less burdensome on teachers' time.

As Tony and Ulrik show in the proposal, mastery involves more collaborative work and creativity than traditional education, and it is much more immersive and engaging than classroom work. In fact, it is much more like real world work, a more solid preparation for the workplace than traditional education. In the schools where it has been implemented – which range from high schools to some medical schools – the change is almost always permanent. The change is also beneficial to students at the top, and at the bottom, of their class, as mastery is not about bell curve grading and averages, but instead, about learning to master actual skills, and students continue to get attention and help until they have mastered them.

Tony Wagner is one of the best-known education experts writing today. He is the author of several books, including most recently, *Learning By Heart*. **Ulrik Christensen**, a learning entrepreneur who has worked in Danish education, and who serves on the board of McGraw-Hill, is Executive Chairman and founding partner of Area 9 Group.

Nancy Friday's My Mother, Myself meets Eve Rodsky's Fair Play in Good Daughtering, a book that recognizes the invisible labor performed by daughters, and helps daughters realize how much to do (and not do) to keep balance in their lives and maximize joy in their relationships.

Communications expert Allison Alford coined the term "daughtering" in her seminal research on the role of adult women communicating in family roles. She defines "Daughtering" as the active way that women "show up" in their families as part of their adult daughter roles, through tasks, emotions, or thinking work. Daughters decide how much and how often to lean-in to their family experiences. This is not a passive role, but a dynamic interplay of decision-making with anticipated outcomes and benefits. Many times, the daughters don't even notice they are doing it. So, while the current culture might not even be thinking about daughters or see them as just another member of the larger family, there's a lot of energetic, and sometimes draining, work being done by them to hold families together. At the expense of these daughters' time, energy, and money, families function and even flourish.

Alford will look at how women spread themselves thin as they serve their parents, helping each reader assess which daughtering type she is, and giving her tips on how to manage her relationships. In the book, Allford defines daughtering: the invisible work involved; the different approaches to it; the top 10 myths of daughtering; and how to recognize when you are feeling emotionally healthy or unhealthy about the relationships with your parents. Plus, there will be advice on how to do daughtering the right way for you, and how to recalibrate if you need to. Throughout the book will be helpful quizzes, checklists, and other elements to help the reader evaluate where she is and where she would like to be.

It is a book that is crafted with a woman's entire body, mind, and spirit in the spotlight, not just her ovaries. The book will allow women to truly understand and proactively manage their health as they age.

Dr. Poynor aims to reframe the conversation around women's health by creating a new health category for women that will examine the impact that changing hormones have on all systems of their bodies (including heart, brain, gut, hair/ skin), rather than solely focusing on the reproductive organs. As an acclaimed integrative women's health expert, gynecologic oncologist, and advanced pelvic surgeon. With three decades' experience treating patients, Dr. Poynor is adamant that women are ignored after a certain age and are desperate to understand how their hormonal shifts are having a strong, sweeping impact across all areas of their health.



It wasn't always destined for greatness: by the early '90s the lineup was a scattered selection of nature programming and live broadcasts like the American Teacher Awards. But then, Disney hit gold, launching a random reboot of the '50s stalwart The Mickey Mouse Club. In a nationwide talent hunt, they cast a roster of then-unknowns which included Britney Spears, Christina Aguilera, Justin Timberlake, Ryan Gosling, JC Chasez, and Keri Russell. The show — and the channel — exploded.


Under the guidance of their new network president, Anne Sweeney, Disney leaned into their new direction hard, becoming the first network to create programming for kids aged 9-14 that their parents could still stomach watching—all produced at once, with no more than sixty-five episodes per show. Even Stevens and Lizzie McGuire were part of that first mold; That's So Raven would be the first to break it when the network ordered seventy-eight episodes in order to avoid the uproar that met the "cancellation" of the first two. It was clear that fans wanted more, and Disney wanted to give it to them. But they'd made the mistake of letting Britney, Christina, and Justin go on to lucrative careers which didn't give them a cut of the money, a mistake they'd quickly rectify by locking their talent into restrictive, all-encompassing contracts. Disney was a star maker, churning out endless content to ravenous fans. But, as recent years have shed light on the intense struggles that come with burdening your young stars with purity rings, morality clauses, paparazzi, weight loss, sexuality, drug use, and no support network, the question remains: did Disney create stars, or just use them before abandoning them when things got hairy?

Long before she was a rare book dealer, Rebecca Romney was a devoted reader of Jane Austen. She loved that Austen's books took the lives of women seriously, explored relationships with wit and confidence, and always, allowed for the possibility of a happy ending. She read and reread them, often wishing Austen wrote just one more. But Austen wasn't a lone genius. Jane Austen's Bookshelf investigates the disappearance of Austen's heroes—women writers who were erased from the Western canon—to reveal who they were, what they meant to Austen, and how they were forgotten. 

Scott Chernoff has lived a life about which most "Star Wars" fans only dream: he's interviewed all the stars of the prequel and original trilogies, including George Lucas, Harrison Ford, and Natalie Portman, to name just a few. A complete, and objective history of the Police, one of the most iconic bands of a generation, has never been written.

This is a band that sold more than 100 million albums around the world, revolutionized MTV (and then disbanded at the height of their popularity), all without sacrificing a shred of artistic integrity. When they surprised us by reuniting after 22 years later in 2007 - to take their act to even larger venues – somehow it all seemed like a natural progression.

But this isn't a story about album sales and sold-out arenas. It's about the combustible, creative genius between three artists – Sting, Stewart Copeland and Andy Summers - that led to five stellar albums over five years, peaking with 1983's "Synchronicity," a record that's considered the defining work of the second British Invasion. On Spotify, the Police continue to stream 27 million songs a month. There is a lot to uncover. And as a compulsive, obsessive reporter, Geoff Edgers plans to document every moment.

Geoff Edgers has been the National Arts Reporter at the Washington Post since 2014. He's profiled Adam Sandler, Sean Penn, Ava DuVernay, Steve Miller, U2, Chevy Chase, Lionel Richie, Julia Louis Dreyfus, Eddie Murphy, the Eagles, and Norm Macdonald, among others. Before the Post, he was an arts reporter at the Boston Globe. Edgers has written three children's books, including biographies of Stan Lee, the Beatles and Elvis, and also wrote Walk This Way: Run-DMC, Aerosmith and the Song that Changed America Forever. John, Paul, George, Ringo, and Bob got drunk and high together after concerts and shared meals at one another's homes. They played advance pressings of their albums for one another, and on those occasions the sense of rivalry bubbling beneath the surface of their relationship became apparent to others in the room. Beneath the competitiveness and cutting remarks, however, there was a bedrock of mutual admiration and respect. *Bob Dylan and the Beatles* will be a major new consideration of these beloved artists.

The Palace Papers meets D.C. in Azadeh Moaveni's The East Wing, an account of the often glamorous, always strategic, and mostly unsung women who worked under America's most iconic and infamous First Ladies.

The East Wing will be the true story, previously hidden by opaque social custom and patriarchal structures alike, of how women's power in Washington first accumulated, then grew and still evolves today, in the hands of an indelible but all-too-often self-effacing (by design) cast of both liberal and conservative women. It will be the first-ever reported portrait of the most consequential East Wing aides to First Ladies, from Malvina Thompson and Eleanor Roosevelt, to Letitia Baldrige and Jackie Kennedy, to Muffie Cabot and Nancy Reagan, to Desiree Rogers and Michelle Obama, to the double Stephanies and Melania, to present-day. Plenty of other books have been written about First Ladies (and Moaveni will have fresh observations and reported details about these pivotal figures), but, incredibly, no other book has focused on the women who serve them.

Moaveni will blend original reporting, including in-depth interviews with key players from past East Wings, with expert research and analysis, to construct a cinematic, suspenseful, story-driven account that takes readers deep inside the fascinating and high-stakes world of the First Lady's staff like never before. The stories of the women of the East Wing are closely guarded, in part, because of how much they reveal about cultural shifts and our national predicaments. About the enduring misogyny at the heart of American politics; about national ambivalence around women's advancement; about the clash between patriotism and realities of race; about social class and identity politics; about the collapse of what used to be called high society; and finally, about what money-driven machine politics has done to Washington, to White House entertaining, to us.

History has taught us that, for a multitude of reasons, it often takes decades for certain visionary cultural and political figures to assume their rightful place in the narrative of their times. With *A World We Can Bear*, Yale lecturer and Yale Review editor Sam Huber calls for us to reappraise a feminist trailblazer who herself has long been overshadowed by the more famous and telegenic (not to mention heterosexual) Gloria Steinem and Betty Friedan.

Kate Millett (1934-2017) reshaped the world's understanding of the violence of patriarchy and the possibilities of both the women's movement and queer liberation. Written with the full cooperation and support of Millett's estate and widow, readers will encounter a woman who became representative of late 20th-century feminism even as she bristled at the expectations of fame and leadership, and whose life embodied the conflicting currents within the movement as it evolved into a major historical force. In calling back to an emerging feminism that was, as Sam writes in the proposal, "wilder, rangier, both more idiosyncratic and more prescient" than we give it credit for today, the book will offer to anyone who considers themselves a feminist a dramatic, instructive, and beautifully rendered study in living out one's political principles.

Kate Millett's bestselling first book, 1970's *Sexual Politics*, inaugurated an intrepid career in letters and activism with its paradigm-shifting takedown of the dons of American literature. This book will chronicle the varied stages of Millett's extraordinary life, including her involvement with the National Organization for Women as well as more radical feminist groupsm, which put her at the center of the women's movement alongside Steinem and Friedan in the 1960s and '70s. Her story captures not just a progressive counterculture but its collision with the mainstream—and the backlash that followed.



Accused of misleading investors and mishandling funds, Bankman-Fried became a target of prosecutors.

Now, *Cryptomania* unfolds the tumultuous twenty months inside this male-dominated, overhyped industry that led to its downfall. Drawing on exclusive reporting and an extensive network in the global NFT community, Andrew Chow chronicles the battle for crypto's soul, and the human toll of its economic meltdown—from the conmen and eccentrics driving the bubble to the victims caught in its burst.







Jagadish Shukla is a renowned climate scientist responsible for our ability to predict weather more than 10 days in advance. Understanding dynamical seasonal prediction will change the way you experience a thunderstorm or interpret an entire city's monthly forecast; understanding its origins and the remarkable story of the man who discovered it will change the way you see our world.

Jagadish Shukla is a Distinguished University Professor and the Founding Chairman of the Department of Atmospheric, Oceanic and Earth Sciences at George Mason University. He has made fundamental contributions to the study of climate dynamics and was one of the lead authors of the 2007 report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which shared the Nobel Peace Prize with Vice President Gore.

In *The Creatures' Guide To Caring*, readers will meet an extended clan of caretakers of the natural world, from birds and bees to hyenas and frogs. In the field and in the lab, readers will also meet scientists who are tracking these animals, sketching their family trees, sequencing their DNA, and spying on them by drone. We'll see that their discoveries follow a common theme: no matter the gender (females, males, animals that switch their sex when the time is right) and no matter how closely or distantly related, we animals all use shared genes, hormones, and brain circuitry to care for our young.

Diving into the lived experiences of animals, readers will feel a sense of kinship with other species as they explore the evolution of parenting, even if that kinship is sometimes missing from their fellow Homo sapiens. New research reveals that anyone who spends time caring for an infant can activate the parts of their caretaking brain, which is an ancient brain architecture that we share with parents across the animal kingdom. At its heart, the book asserts that the separations we draw between ourselves and the other animals, or between different types of humans, deny us our humanity. We're all connected; humans evolved to care for children as villages and communities, and all of us carry this legacy in our brains and bodies.

To be clear: this isn't a book for parents only, though there's a lot here that will entice. Whether you're a parent or non-parent, or someone's uncle, daughter, or brother, *The Creatures' Guide To Caring* is for you. We are all born to care.

With her rare combination of skills as a storyteller and thinker as well as her deep knowledge and experience as an organizer, this book is both completely unique to her abilities and urgently needed, especially as we see a wave of labor struggles taking hold across the US and around the world. In the style and vein of Timothy Snyder's *On Tyranny, A More Perfect Union* is a book about and for the cornerstone of any democracy, the people.

Vanessa Veselka is a novelist who has been, at various times, a teenage runaway, a sex-worker, a union organizer, a student of paleontology, a musician, a cab driver, and a mother. In the vein of *The Emperor of All Maladies* and *The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, Curved Air* will spin a gripping tale of incredible scientific possibility and devastating neglect and will appeal to the enormous audiences who bought these bestselling titles. How Sharing Our World with One of Its Biggest, Baddest Animals Could Save Us All

In the vein of *The Soul of an Octopus* and *Braiding Sweetgrass, Start with a Bear* is an inspired response to one of humankind's most pressing questions: How can we coexist with other species on a warming, increasingly crowded planet? The key is to focus on our largest and arguably most complicated animals, known as megafauna, and this book argues that, of them, the animal from which we can learn the most is perhaps the most polarizing of them all: the grizzly.

Ursus arctos or grizzly bears, also known as brown bears, occupy a pivotal place in the global extinction crisis. They are uniquely beloved, uniquely threatened, and uniquely poised for a comeback. Few people want a grizzly as a neighbor, and yet there are benefits to learning to live tolerantly, even peacefully, with big, formidable animals. Learning, or relearning, to do so can repair damaged ecosystems, make rural communities more resilient, help heal past injustices, and inspire a diverse new generation of conservationists. Thus, the prospect of recovering grizzly populations has become a test for larger conservation efforts, and nowhere is this test more fraught than in California. Grizzlies have been extinct in California for a century, but in the past few years efforts to bring them back have finally, and unexpectedly, gained momentum and are now being watched closely by everyone. If we can bring grizzlies back to California, the possibilities—for other species, other places, for the entire earth—are endless.

At the fore of these crucial efforts is the author of this book, Pete Alagona, who founded the California Grizzly Alliance in 2016. The group's ultimate goal is to reintroduce brown bears to the Golden State and to use this process as a template for improving human-wildlife coexistence around the world. And now it seems possible that California could see the return of its storied mascot within a decade, which would follow on the heels of this book's publication and make it a must-read for anyone interested in how make big ideas happen for the planet and its most iconic creatures.

It will take readers to the Ukraine battlefield where one unstable American CEO could decide the fate of the conflict through his control of Starlink. And it will take readers to the war in Israel and Gaza, where a simple tech breakthrough, likely discovered by a small group of individuals, allowed Hamas militants to evade Israel's Iron Wall.

Illuminating, timely, and engrossing, *Bytes and Bullets* shows that, to make sense of the coming world, we must understand how the new tools of conflict will rewrite all the rules.

Cold is a book for anyone who wants to explore the ways in which humans are drawn to the cold, through culture, art, and environment. In the vein of Katherine May's Wintering, Bonnie Tsui's Why We Swim and Jenny O'Dell's How to Do Nothing, Cold weaves interviews and scientific research with prose and reflection.

Grappling with the cold has defined much of modern history in countries that experience vast seasonal shifts. Unlike our ancestors, and their limited options, we have a multitude of ways in which we can control how we experience and feel cold. That has helped to remove some of the danger of cold—and increased the allure. Yet when presented with the option of cold or warm, how many of us make that choice? Do the modern conveniences that offer up consistently comfortable ambient temperatures prevent us from experiencing some of the contrasts that remind us that we are part of a natural world, made up of natural cycles?

This is a timely topic. We may not live in cold places, but temperature impacts all of us, even more so in a changing climate. Cold, however we're drawn to it, is not just about lifehacking, or optimizing, or tapping into a new trend. It's a lens to a better understanding and connection to the world around us, and in turn, to ourselves. *Cold* will reveal scientists at the forefront of research on cold exposure and impact of nature on our wellbeing, as well as cultural thinkers and creatives who work on this topic, highlighting our crucial human need to be connected to the natural world. It will cover what cold has to offer us, and what we're at risk of losing as we look towards a warmer future. Because whatever way we experience cold, it just might help to tell a picture of a larger, more profound human truth, about what it means to exist as a living organism on this planet.

Forgiveness in Tough-on-Crime America

An urgent new work of nonfiction by Pulitzer Prize-winning *New York Times* senior writer Dan Barry. In *Mercy*, Dan will bring readers inside the starkly intimate open-door hearings held by the Minnesota Board of Pardons as it considers the case for mercy for two Americans convicted of felony crimes.

One is Jim Lorge, a former meth cook who has successfully turned his life around. He lives with his mother and his teenage son. He works as a drug counselor and is a role model to recovering addicts in his community—but he still bears the stigma of a felony conviction. The other is Maureen Onyelobi, a former school bus driver serving life without parole for her part in a cold-blooded murder. After her sentencing, Onyelobi made national news as the country's first incarcerated person to be accepted into law school. She is now seeking a commutation so she can one day be free. But like Lorge, and like everyone else scheduled to appear before the board on those two fateful days in June 2023, she is also asking for something more fundamental: the forgiveness of her community.

Featuring Dan Barry's finely honed prose and closely observed, humanistic storytelling, *Mercy* will evoke the hope, despair, and gratitude experienced by these supplicants. Even Lorge, a free man, struggles to put his past behind him and find housing for himself and his fiancée because of his status as a convicted felon. Then, too, *Mercy* will introduce readers to the officials who sit in judgement, including the board's de facto chair, Minnesota Governor Tim Walz. *Mercy* will follow Walz as he weighs the case of each supplicant and asks himself: What is a just punishment? What do we need to do to be redeemed? When do we deserve mercy? *Mercy* will explore all of these essential questions as it tells the story of two people trying to start again, of the people they hurt, and of the judgement we as a society still stand to give.

Justice and Mercy in the Age of School Shooters

The remarkable inside story of the deadliest mass murder case to ever go to trial in the United States, the 2018 shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, and a look into the case's profound significance for the future of American justice.

On February 14, 2018, a 19-year-old named Nikolas Cruz opened fire on his former classmates at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, killing 17 students and faculty in cold blood. It was a devastating national tragedy, and unlike so many school shooters, Cruz lived to face the consequences. He would plead guilty, but the prosecution, working closely with the victim families, wanted him to pay with his life—beginning a four-year legal battle that would roil this close-knit community.

The defense's argument was simple, clear, and compelling: since Cruz's brain had been harmed in utero by his mother's alcohol abuse, he was unable to comprehend the gravity of his crimes and thus his sentence should be life in jail rather than death by lethal injection. For its main characters, *Life and Death* will follow Cruz's idealistic defense team: Kate O'Shea, a motorcycle mechanic-turned "mitigation specialist" who knocked on countless doors for information about Cruz's history; Joel Maney, a former cop who visited Cruz more than 100 times in jail; Casey Secor, an expert on capital case voir dire who served as outside counsel; and Melisa McNeill, the lead public defender for the case and a mother of three. However improbably, in a climate of intense community grief, O'Shea and her colleagues persuaded three jurors to vote against the death penalty. Cruz, a young man they showed to be incapable of understanding the magnitude of the vicious, seemingly inhuman crimes he had committed, would not be executed by the state of Florida.

As an attempt to understand how a boy becomes a killer, Joe's book will appeal to readers of Sue Klebold's memoir, *A Mother's Reckoning*. Its empathetic storytelling and command of the science of fetal alcohol spectrum disorder will evoke titles such as Robert Kolker's *Hidden Valley Road*, which explored the reality of schizophrenia through the story of one family. Finally, as a crime narrative about how a community reckons with a history of violence, we think Joe's book will earn comparisons to Patrick Radden Keefe's widely acclaimed *Say Nothing*.

LUXURY SURVEILLANCE

How Big Tech Sells Us the Pleasure of Being Watched

Appealing to the same readers of *The Anxious Generation* and *The Coming Wave*, and necessarily advancing the arguments in bestsellers such as *The Age of Surveillance Capitalism* and *Weapons of Math Destruction*, *Luxury Surveillance* brilliantly deconstructs one of the most troubling features of the digital revolution.

<u>"Luxury Surveillance,"</u> a term coined by Chris and the digital-studies scholar David Golumbia, is the idea that consumers who seek optimization and insights from their Apple Watches, Garmins, Oura Rings, etc., are in fact exposing themselves to deeply unsettling levels of power. If you consider that technically there is little difference between an ankle monitor and a wearable, consumers should be asking themselves: What exactly have I signed up for?

As digital surveillance grows exponentially across the world, how does the visibility—or invisibility—of these technologies elicit performative acts from people at each end of the surveilling gaze? How does surveillance transform a community and a populace? Moreover, when the privileged embrace surveillance technologies, what are the implications for the rest of us?

Starting with his youth in Detroit in the 1970s, where the clicking sound of electronic door locks followed Black men as they walked down the street, surveillance made Gilliard feel like a stranger in his own neighborhood. Later, he recognized these technological moments as forerunners of Ring doorbells and message boards like Neighbors and Nextdoor that allow people to broadcast their racialized anxieties about the existence of the other in "their" neighborhoods. The "click" of a lock reverberates through time as the precursor to more advanced and pervasive digital technologies.

Through a mix of personal narrative, deep analysis, and humorous, dangerous, and compelling examples of surveillance at large, *Luxury Surveillance* will examine the various dimensions of this landscape and plot a course forward.
