Hawthorn: A Scottish Ghost Story Elaine Thomson

I had the sensation of wet lips moving, of a bubbling, gasping breath struggling to voice words that could not be uttered. Fear rose within me, hot and scalding, like bile.

Hawthorn is the first in a planned quartet of ghost stories, each set in a different part of Scotland at the four 'turning points' of the year: Samhain (or Halloween), the spring equinox, midsummer and midwinter. The other three novels publish in 2026 and 2027.

Hawthorn is set in nineteenth-century Caithness and follows cartographer Robert Sutherland as he attempts to chart Scotland's most north-easterly county, and instead finds himself recuperating from a near-fatal accident in an old mansion, cared for by a wealthy widow and her beautiful daughter. But as events take ever stranger and more terrifying turns, Robert begins to wonder whether his presence at the house is really a coincidence, or whether someone – or something – has summoned him there.







Against a background of society of the cusp of huge changes, a group of eminent townsfolk decide to set up a Circulating Library unwittingly creating opportunities for their ordered lives to fracture and relationships to become frayed and entangled in ways that could not have foreseen.

The Cromarty Library Circle is a novel of a society as it seeks to move from the Romantic and Regency period towards a new and unknowable age. From the formerly enslaved parlourmaid at the hotel to the fragile young wife of the laird, from the refugee Polish count and his friends - the schoolmaster who hides a secret and the bank clerk who dreams of a new life in America - to the young wife of the town's minister, passionately in love with her husband but threatened by gossip she cannot control, to the malicious son of the local factory owner, the spinster sisters living with regrets, the disgraced elderly governess and her two young pupils and the scarred and handsome army officer seeking to escape private pain, the inhabitants try to negotiate their changing world and each other, over the course of this tumultuous year.

Against a background of an encroaching cholera epidemic, the mass emigrations of the Highland Clearances, the last days of the Caribbean slave plantations and clamour for political reform, *The Cromarty Library Circle* is in the best traditions of the great novels of society from *Cranford* to *Middlemarch*.

There is a tussle between land and sea within me. The sea clings, and salt seems hard to remove from the skin. Around my inland home, sand falls from my shoes long after each coastal visit, sea-rounded pebbles and shells nest on table-tops, and I 'recognise' sea algae in the feathery growth of lichen on mountain rocks. Since childhood the sea has had this strange, strong hold on me but also brims with disquiet. The thought of being underwater fills me with breathy, claustrophobic panic, as does the notion of being out of sight of land. Perhaps I've inherited a fear of drowning from all those great and grand great-grandfathers, cousins and uncles lost, the sea captains marching back in time in the village of Braunton.
