Lindy Elkins-Tanton leads NASA's Psyche mission, a \$1.2 billion megaproject that sent a spacecraft on an eight-year journey to investigate an asteroid between Mars and Jupiter. Along the way, she has managed challenges ranging from potentially catastrophic technological malfunctions and overbudget subcontractors to fraught email chains about who clogged the toilet. And she did it all while building an extraordinary team culture. In *Mission Ready*, Elkins-Tanton shows other leaders how to do the same.

Mission Ready provides a blueprint for building strong teams capable of delivering exceptional results in high-pressure situations. Leaders set the tone, but every team member determines both their own success and the success of the team. Drawing on social science, cognitive science, and organizational science research, Elkins-Tanton gives practical advice on how both individual contributors and leaders can excel. Even for projects that don't involve launching a rocket into space, the lessons in this book will help readers guide their teams to new heights.

Lindy Elkins-Tanton is a professor at UC Berkeley, director of the Berkeley Space Sciences Laboratory, and lead of the NASA Psyche mission. She is the author of *A Portrait of the Scientist as a Young Woman*. She lives in Richmond, California.





Cliff seeks to answer the question that has fascinated him for years: why do some of us see challenges as invitations to act, rather than burdens to deal with or threats to fear? Why do some people think up bold ideas and find a way to make their goals a reality no matter the odds, while many others tell themselves to "be realistic," take the safe route, and let those dreams go? What is it about the mindset of "doers" that enables them to act when the rest of us would deem it impossible?

The answer, Cliff argues, is a combination of audacity, self-confidence, and—above all—a sense of permission that comes from within. Fear, Shame, Poverty, and the Making of the Christian Right - a Personal History

Written in vivid prose, On Fire For God is a stirring and urgent examination of the far-reaching emotional, political, and sociological effects of the Christian Right. With unflinching honesty, exvaneglical journalist Josiah Hesse shares his personal journey from the stifling working class town of Mason City, Iowa, through the institutions of the Christian right: a toxic mixture of schools, ministries, and Christian camps that taught creationism, foretold horrific stories of the rapture, instilled sexual shame, and fearmongered followers into believing ceaseless agony was awaiting sinners in the afterlife. At the same time, greedy preachers siphoned his community's wealth while preaching a doctrine of prosperity and humiliating the poor. Hesse reveals how this brand of Christian conservativism traps working-class believers into an isolated bubble of racism, xenophobia, martyrdom, and self-loathing—turning them into passive, low-wage workers who would never dare to ask for higher wages or utter the word "union." Like many of his peers, Hesse eventually escaped his hometown a high-school dropout, ultimately finding himself squatting in Denver where, for the first time, he truly considers that perhaps God doesn't exist, the world wasn't going to end, and that he was woefully unprepared for a future he never thought would arrive.

While prevailing theories about the disappearing working class point to opioids, automation, or globalism as the culprits, Hesse's story of awakening and escape exposes how conservative Christian conmen routinely strip communities, such as Hesse's hometown of Mason City, Iowa, of their wealth, rationality, and self-esteem. His story goes far beyond that often-asked question: "Why did 81% of evangelical voters—the majority of them poor and working class—support Donald Trump?" Instead, Hesse brings deep feeling and piercing immediacy to what he describes as the socioeconomic tragedy of the American working class.





Working as a cassette DJ and ticket girl, she would see (and sometimes meet) the luminaries who'd pass through town—Nirvana, Jane's Addiction, Pavement, Sonic Youth. Thanks to a long-shot fan letter to a P.O. BOX, her band Tinker scored a life-changing opening slot for The Smashing Pumpkins and, sensing her natural talent on bass, Billy Corgan recommended her to Courtney Love. Melissa joined Hole for the band's 1994 Live Through This world tour, just one of the many uncanny threads that weave destiny throughout this riveting memoir.

Whisked from her local scene and thrust into the eye of a hard-living hurricane of grief on a global stage, Melissa joined Hole just after the deaths of Kurt Cobain and Hole's prior bassist, Kristen Pfaff, with the just-widowed Courtney Love at the center of it all. It was a tour of passionate intensity, as a chaotic yet stunningly powerful band constantly threatened to spin out of control. Melissa brings the reader with raging intimacy right into the action, offering a heroic portrait and a long overdue, full-throated defense of the unforgettable, iconic intensity and brilliance of Courtney Love, as she howled into the darkness as if to keep grief at bay.

That was only the beginning of Melissa's journey. 

Along the way he talks to countless men about their male friendships, from cowboys and blues musicians to preachers and rootless teens. What began as a simple desire to catch up with a few friends turned into a deep exploration of the challenges and rewards that men experience in forming bonds with each other. In McCarthy's own words, "It turns out that guys have a difficult time with friendship." But that's not the way it needs to be.

Andrew McCarthy is the author of four books, Walking With Sam, Brat: An '80s Story, Just Fly Away, and The Longest Way Home — all New York Times best sellers. He is an award winning travel writer and served for a dozen years as an editor-at-larger at National Geographic Traveler magazine. Andrew has directed scores of television shows, his recent documentary, BRATS, debuted at #1 on Hulu. He is perhaps best known as an actor for the past four decades, appearing is such iconic films as Pretty in Pink and Less Than Zero. He lives in New York.

By one of the fastest runners of her generation, an affecting, brutally honest memoir of elite sports gone wrong—and a clear-eyed call for how parents, coaches, and young athletes themselves can build a healthier youth sports culture.

Few women have ever run 800 meters in under two minutes. Even fewer people have taken on running's abusive training culture and won. Mary Cain has done both.

She emerged as a running phenom at age 12, a straight-A student obsessed with Greco-Roman mythology and the freedom she felt when she ran fast. Like any middle-schooler, she just wanted to fit in, so she learned to run through the discomfort of hard training sessions, and the confusion of her coaches' and teammates' bullying. And she was overjoyed when, at 16, Alberto Salazar called to invite her to train with the famed Nike Oregon Project.

Cain was poised to transform the sport, Salazar told her. She resolved to hold on to his favor, even as he insisted she lose weight and push through the pain of emerging injury. For years, she excelled, setting records against elite runners twice her age. The Olympics were in her sights.

But off the track, Cain was crumbling. She snuck granola bars in the middle of the night and sank into a deep depression as injury after injury set in. Finally, she left the Oregon Project, telling herself she just needed a break. A chorus rang out across the running community: What happened to Mary Cain?

Now, with her suit against Nike behind her, Cain is ready to share her side of the story—and to flip the script on abuse in youth sports. She draws on her diaries from this wrenching period of abuse to show, with clarity we rarely see, how young minds respond to the win-at-all-costs culture that pervades youth sports today. By turns raw, wry, and impassioned, *This Is Not About Running* is a fierce memoir of the damage wrought when we prioritize competition over mental health.



Mary Cain is a professional runner and advocate for mental health in sports. At age seventeen, she became the youngest American athlete to represent the US at the track and field World Championships. She is also the founder of Atalanta NYC, which mentors underserved girls in the Bronx through running. Cain is a graduate of Fordham University and currently attends Stanford Medical School.

Maurice, Little Mutulu, Mogie, Mocedes, Mopreme, 'Preme -- Mopreme Shakur has been known by a lot of names. He is the eldest son of Mutulu Shakur: a leader of men, a prominent figure in the movement for the liberation of Black people, a thirty-six-year-long political prisoner in a country that doesn't admit we have them. He is the big brother of Tupac Shakur: the greatest rapper of all time and a legendary, transcendent figure whose music will outlive us all by generations. He is the only surviving member of the venerable hip hop groups T.H.U.G. L.I.F.E. and Outlaw Immortalz, which he co-founded with Pac. Mo's life sits at the intersection between the story of a man you should have read about in your American history books but didn't and a superstar you think you know but don't.

In his memoir, Mo shares not just the incredible and inspiring story of his father and his quest for racial justice decades before the Black Lives Matter movement but also all of the stories about Tupac's meteoric rise and artistic success. Many of the stories here have never been told before, from the "work hard, party hard" behind-the-scenes ethos of recording Pac's hit albums to who the family believes was behind Pac's first shooting in New York to rolling Pac's ashes into a joint as an emotional and important part of saying goodbye. From documentaries to films to other books, Mo has been involved as a crucial figure in managing Pac's posthumous legend but has carefully monitored and withheld stories and involvement to ensure that he could tell his own stories, in his own words, when the time came. There is nobody else who sits at Mo's unique intersection of experiences; nobody else as accomplished a writer, rapper, producer, and who has witnessed so much history so intimately. Mopreme Shakur's story is singular and revelatory, inspirational and powerful. As Mo himself would say: dig that!

Mopreme Shakur is a solo rapper and member of T.H.U.G. L.I.F.E. and Outlaw Immortalz, a writer, producer, and performer who played a crucial role in the production, recording, and release of all of Tupac Shakur's albums, both during his life and posthumous.

The story of three years of Marya Hornbacher's fully nomadic life alone on the road, traveling through a rapidly transforming United States in a 16-foot Scamp trailer pulled by a Ram truck.

In 1998, she published a memoir, *Wasted*, which was a sensation and one of the foundational texts on anorexia and bulimia. According to *New York Magazine*, it's sold over a million copies. She was 23. Five years later she published a beautiful, well-reviewed novel called *The Center of Winter*. And in 2008, she published *Madness*, a NYT bestseller about bipolar disorder. Following the success of that book she decided, as she puts it "that it was time to step away from publishing until I'd aged out of the tragic trainwreck ingénue white girl writer cohort into which I'd long been lumped," and for the last fifteen years has been committing award-winning journalism for a variety of publications and teaching at Northwestern and elsewhere.

She's now 50 and a little more than two years ago, spurred on by the Supreme Court's overturning of Roe v. Wade, she left her home and most of her posses-

sions behind and hit the American road. The road has been her new home for the past 28 months and it will be for at least eight months longer. Her proposal is breathtaking—funny, wrenching, confrontational, heartwarming and heartbreaking. It's a beautiful and frightening journey. It's a woman's solo search for personal freedom at a time when, as Michelle Obama just recently put it, women are at risk to "become collateral damage to [men's] rage." It's not a political book but it is a story that takes place in a time in which it is impossible to escape the politics of division.


In the 1800s, Appalachian farmer and rogue William Prestwood kept salacious coded diaries, leaving his descendent, Jeremy Jones, to reflect on his complicated legacy.

In 1975, a man stumbled upon a box of hand-sewn notebooks in a house set for demolition in Wadesboro, North Carolina. After thumbing through the delicate pages and finding them written in code, he passed the books to a retired NSA cryptanalyst who deciphered them, uncovering the recorded life of a white Southern farmer named William Thomas Prestwood. The diaries offered a ground-level view of a 19th-century man who passed his days recording eclipses and dissecting rabbits and calculating planetary orbits and reading Goethe and sneaking into barn lofts and closets with dozens of lovers. "The reader is left," the codebreaker wrote, "with the lasting impression that here in these pathetic little books is the very essence of Everyman's life from the cradle to the grave." But to author Jeremy Jones, this strange farmer was no Everyman. He was his great-great-great-great grandfather.

Cipher reanimates Prestwood, warts and all, following the author's ancestor as he courts women and hides runaway slaves, as he fathers children with his wife and with an enslaved woman, as he mines for gold and befriends Daniel Boone's great nephew, and as he rubs shoulders with a young Zebulon Vance and raises sons soon to die on the fields of Gettysburg. With research, Jones fills in the blank spaces of this Everyman's life. Along the way, Jones begins tracking his own life alongside the fascinating arc of this long-ago forefather, forging an intimate relationship with a man whose own account, in Jones's expert hand, begins to take on texture, drama, emotional resonance—even as the author uncovers curious and disturbing details about his ancestor. And thus, about his family. About himself.

Jeremy B. Jones is the author of the memoir *Bearwallow*, which was named the 2014 Appalachian Book of the Year in nonfiction and awarded gold in memoir in the 2015 Independent Publisher Book Awards. His essays appear in *Oxford American, Appalachian Reckoning*, and the *Iowa Review*. Jeremy earned his MFA from the University of Iowa and now serves as an associate professor of English.

He has received fellowships and awards from the Guggenheim Foundation, the Whiting Foundation, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Society of Fellows at Harvard University. He is a Professor of Literature and Distinguished Chair of the Humanities at MIT.





What does it take to change even as we search for our footing in an era of profound upheaval and roiling uncertainty?

As obsessed as we are with change, as much as we love a good makeover story, we're also often wildly suspicious of those who claim to have pulled it off. With his trademark curiosity, empathy, humor, and intimate, character-rich reporting, Denizet-Lewis confronts our ambivalent relationship with change by taking us inside the lives of people who've transformed themselves—or say they have.

From psychedelic reality benders to political converters to gender transitioners, from a seemingly transformed murderer to a bully-turned-Buddhist and an octogenarian grandmother trying to change her temperament ("Better late than never!" she says), he investigates the many ways we try to reimagine ourselves—and what's at stake when we do.

We tend to picture change as linear and self-determined, but Denizet-Lewis shows that much of what we think we know is wrong. Profound change is often less self-reinvention than self-discovery, and personal change isn't always so personal—it's better understood as a hazardous team sport. Our attempts to change are frequently politically fraught, shaped by incoherent cultural beliefs about who is allowed to change, and who we think is even capable of it.

Drawing on insights from psychologists, neuroscientists, spiritual teachers—even the author's own father, who once edited a newsletter devoted to "the art and science of transformation"—*You've Changed* challenges us to think more deeply about what real change looks like. How *does* it happen? When can we trust it, in ourselves and in each other? And what shifts, or stays the same, when we shed an old skin?



Through the surprising and captivating stories of Americans in flux—and a free-wheeling inventory of the author's own misfires and epiphanies—*You've Changed* is essential reading for anyone who's ever wanted to change something meaningful about themselves, or someone they love.

How Literature Teaches Us to Flourish in the Face of Existential Despair

The best way to describe this book is George Saunders' A Swim in the Pond in the Rain meets Jay Shetty's Think Like a Monk. It allows the reader to "take" one of the most popular and celebrated classes at the University of Pennsylvania, Religion 256: Existential Despair. But this class is not about religion, at least not overtly. It's about, as the Times says, "...[discovering] your own answer to the question of what a human being is for." It's also about the power of books—a carefully chosen 15 in this case—from James Baldwin to Carmen Maria Machdo to Christopher Isherwood, read one by one in a specific order.

Over fifteen transformative weeks, Professor McDaniel guides readers through three major themes: 1) Self and the Body; 2) Love and Desire; 3) Time and Death. He developed these themes from his work in the field of Religious Studies over time across different traditions, (Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Taoism, etc.) because these are often the way an acolyte is guided through the study of what it means to be alive. Religion 256: Existential Despair is essentially about how and why to live. But you could also say it's "about love and the choices we make, or love and survival," as one of Professor McDaniel's students said when asked. This Will Destroy You will be written for the solo reader and will include instructions for groups such a book clubs. As you will read, Justin McDaniel created his Existential Despair class as a response to the devastating student mental health crises he witnessed unfolding on his campus and at countless other colleges across the nation. The first Religion 256 class, launched in the fall of 2017, was an experiment, one just barely green-lit by his then department head. It was so successful that it's gone on to become one of UPenn's most in-demand classes, with over 400 students on the waitlist each semester.

Justin McDaniel is the Chair of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. His work on pedagogical methods in the courses Existential Despair and Living Deliberately have been featured on NPR, *Huffington Post, Washington Post*, the *New York Times* and many other venues.

The scam often begins with an innocuous "wrong number" text sent via WhatsApp or a friendly hello on Facebook or LinkedIn. As soon as the victim replies, the scammers start turning the psychological screws with promises of easy money. Many of these crimes are unreported, and almost all go unsolved. But from among the millions who have fallen victim to this fraud, a small cohort have fought back. *The Big Trace* will follow Brian Bruce—a Mississippi family man—who became an expert at cryptocurrency tracing in a bid to find his scammers and bring them to justice. Working alongside law enforcement and a Singaporean activist nicknamed "Xellos," he has achieved unprecedented victories for himself and other scam victims. As Bruce quickly realized, though, everyday Americans were far from the only ones to suffer under this criminal regime.

Hundreds of thousands of people have been trafficked into dystopian scam compounds scattered across Southeast Asia. Lured in with lucrative offers for non-existent jobs, recruits are threatened with beatings and forced to send the seemingly innocuous texts we all receive on our phones. They are the victims of a nefarious modern slavery that's become so industrialized that forced scam laborers are often bought and sold on platforms like Telegram. With its extraordinary characters and life-or-death consequences, *The Big Trace* will reshape conversations about cybercrime and human trafficking and is poised to join the ranks of investigative classics such as John Carreyrou's *Bad Blood*. As a story of hubris and ill-gotten gains, it echoes the portrait of Jho Low in *Billion Dollar Whale*. Nick Bilton's *American Kingpin* also offers also offers an apt comparison as a story about how criminals innovate and about the hard-working people who try to stop them.

UNTITLED ON PORTRAIT OF WALLY

How an Intrepid Customs Agent and a Gutsy Federal Prosecutor Brought Justice to the Art World

A revelatory new work of narrative nonfiction which explores one of the most consequential legal dramas in the history of art: the custody battle for prominent Austrian Expressionist Egon Schiele's fabled *Portrait of Wally.* The efforts of federal prosecutors and investigators not only led to a settlement in favor of the painting's rightful owners, but to new standards for museums and a new paradigm for the restitution of looted objects.

Painted in 1912, *Portrait of Wally* was one of the artist's greatest works. It was raw and emotional, depicting Schiele's lover and muse, Wally Neuzil. After Schiele's death in 1918, the painting was acquired by Lea Bondi, a Jewish collector who thrived in Vienna's diverse artistic world. But in 1938, it was stolen by a Nazi gallerist, and Bondi was forced to flee to London. She tried to recover the painting in the aftermath of the war, only to be betrayed by a passionate young collector named Rudolph Leopold, who coveted it for himself. With *Portrait of Wally*, Leopold found the cornerstone for what would, in time, emerge as the greatest private collection of Schiele's art anywhere in the world. Cohen's book will piece together this intricate secret history, exploring archives across the United States and Europe.

Bondi's heirs tirelessly sought to reclaim the painting, and in 1997 they finally had a chance. Loaned by the newly established Leopold Museum in Vienna, *Portrait of Wally* was to headline a retrospective at MOMA. But the *NYT's*' Judith Dobrzynski rocked the art world when she revealed the true history of the painting. Just weeks later, it was dramatically seized by the Manhattan DA, beginning an epic, decade-long legal battle. That closely fought case will provide the structure for the

book, as well as its emotional climax: a 2008 court-room showdown between Leopold and the Bondi heirs. Cohen's book has all the makings of a page-flipping literary thriller in the vein of *Catch Me If You Can*, yet it also promises to tell a more profound story about justice and restitution—one akin to such works as *Killers of the Flower Moon* by David Grann and *Say Nothing* by Patrick Radden Keefe.

MARIACHI DREAMS

A Year of Music, Magic, and Belonging on the Border

Journalist and anthropologist Cecilia Ballí's *Mariachi Dreams*, chronicling a year in Starr County, Texas, where three of the country's top high school mariachis vie for trophies and glory, complete with character portraits, heated competition, and a backdrop of polarizing border policy.

Every year along Texas's southern border, in a small, poor, rural region called Starr County, three of America's top high school mariachi groups vie against each other for glory and bragging rights. Cecilia Ballí first threw open the doors to the world in a *New York Times* Magazine piece in late 2022, and the response was overwhelming: a flood of appreciative notes from readers, hundreds of comments, emails from professors who began teaching the piece in their classes, and interest from the film and TV world that led to both the scripted and unscripted rights to the piece being optioned. In *Mariachi Dreams* she continues the story, chronicling a full calendar year among these three teams, not only because her *Times* piece revealed that there was an audience for it but because right now the story of high school mariachi is actually a story about so much more.

Just as Buzz Bissinger's *Friday Night Lights* looked beyond the goalposts to issues like religion, race, and class in a small town where football was king, *Mariachi Dreams* will lift its gaze from competitive mariachi and focus, too, on immigration, border history, the changing demographics of Texas and all of America, and what it means to straddle dual cultures the way most of the book's characters do. This book will captivate readers with its immersive plot, enlighten them with its timely themes, mark the powerful debut of a new voice in narrative journalistic nonfiction, and introduce mariachi to the world as the site of so much magic, heartbreak, transformation, and belonging.

Nature writer Devon Fredericksen weaves together natural history and cultural lore into a lyrical exploration of mutualism between eider ducks, the people who care for them, and the wider ecosystem.

The narrative opens in the windswept archipelago of Vega, just south of the Arctic Circle, off the west coast of Norway. There, two eider ducks alight on the sea, amidst the flotsam. They've flown north for the spring, as they've done for millennia, ready to lay their eggs. They'll gain their strength and rest in order to fend off otters, mink, sea eagles, and other forces of nature. Their survival depends on their vigilance, as well as an unlikely protector: Vibeke Steinsholm, a 60-year-old woman with wild, copper hair, who has left her home on the mainland to spend a season guarding the birds.

Structured in six parts, the narrative follows the birds as they Partner, Shelter, Nest, Protect, Survive, and Gather. Each of these phases is introduced through a vignette of the birds, and then, in alternating chapters, explored and complicated through Vibeke and her fellow bird keepers, as they navigate the larger implications of companionship, industrialization, scientific intervention, conservation, integration, and reciprocity. While the eider ducks become the gravitational force of the book, their relationship with Vibeke pulls the reader through the long, sun-filled days to the summer solstice and the birds' departure.

Devon Fredericksen has written for publications such as The Atlantic, Guernica,

and *The New York Times*, and her article "The Eider Keepers," published in bioGraphic, was listed as one of Longreads Top 5 stories in 2024. She has authored multiple guidebooks to the outdoors, such as *How to Camp in the Woods* (Black Dog & Leventhal, 2019).

The Ancient Tradition and Untold Future of the Kumaris of Nepal

Each year at the Indra Jatra festival that takes place in the streets of Nepal's capital, the country's president sits at the feet of a young girl who bestows a tika mark on his forehead. In so doing, she grants a blessing to continue his term. She is the kumari of Kathmandu: one of a dozen living goddesses who embody the Hindu deity Taleju across Nepal, and a role in which she receives devotees, offers omens of the future, and sanctifies the national political system. She is also just a girl.

When kumaris reach adolescence, they are stripped of their divinity and returned to ordinary life without an education, career, or marriage prospects. Since the 11th century, a small group of girls venerated as goddesses have held a unique position at the center of Nepalese political and cultural life—and yet their agency to determine their own lives has been curtailed, and their stories have gone untold. *Girl/Goddess* will chart the twists and turns of Nepal's recent history from the perspectives of the child goddesses who have presided over it. Through the stories of kumaris and former kumaris, *Girl/Goddess* will bring an outside audience into the complexities of an oft overlooked and poorly understood region, one that is both a dramatic case study in the determining geopolitical forces of our time and an extreme yet familiar example of how modern society treats girlhood—with equal parts fear, injustice, and veneration.

Deeply researched like no previous study or sensationalist account of the kumari tradition and grounded in Emily's relationships with kumaris themselves, *GirllGoddess* will draw on Emily's clear-sighted investigative instincts as a seasoned reporter. In Emily's telling, Nepal's utterly unique kumari tradition becomes an illuminating window onto girlhood's all-too-familiar contradictions. How can a girl be both a child and a goddess? How can she find lasting agency when her perceived value is tied to her purity and youth? How can she hold onto history, tradition, and faith while fighting for change?

Between fluctuations in grocery store prices, the looming threat of trade wars, environmental flux, and the now-annual bird flu crisis, the topic of food systems—how our food is grown, delivered, priced, and consumed—has become commonplace across our political discourse, our dinner table debates, and our internal grocery store monologues. And as *The Atlantic's* Yasmin Tayag asserts in this timely and enlightening new work of narrative nonfiction, that's not likely to change anytime soon.

Out of Stock will not be an alarmist investigation of the challenges that climate change, industrial farming, politics, international conflict, and animal disease pose to our food supply. Rather, it will aim to prepare readers for an unfamiliar future by immersing them inside our immensely complex food system and educating them on the forces that shape it. Few of us, Tayag argues, truly understand the degree to which shortages are set to affect us all—from the strain on our wallets to the availability of our cultural staples to the survival of our businesses.

Combining thorough reporting, vibrant storytelling, essential historical context, and insightful analysis, *Out of Stock* will, across four sections, chronicle the food shortages we're already living with, the shortages just on the horizon, and the shortages that vulnerable communities have long been battling, before offering a glimpse of the hope that may lie ahead. Each chapter will be driven by characters in the trenches of struggle, innovation, and transformation—from chocolatiers changing their product to compensate for persistent cocoa shortages; to orange farmers embracing science to save their dying livelihoods; to free-range meat "scavengers" sharing their way of life with their communities; to scientist-bakers determined to change the way we eat. Adaption, readers will learn, is vital. But in an uncertain future, Tayag concludes, even if we need to eat differently, we can still eat well.


Augustine of Hippo (354–430), also known as Saint Augustine, was one of the most influential theologians in history. His writings, including the autobiographical *Confessions* and The City of God, helped shape the foundations of Christianity and Western philosophy. But for many centuries, Augustine's North African birth and Berber heritage have been simply dismissed. Catherine Conybeare, a world-renowned Augustine scholar, here puts the "African" back in Augustine's story. As she relates, his seminal books were written neither in Rome nor in Milan, but in Africa, where he had returned as a wanderer during a perilous time when the Western Roman Empire was crumbling. Using extant letters and other shards of evidence, Conybeare retraces Augustine's travels, revealing how his groundbreaking works emerge from an exile's perspective within an African context. In its depiction of this Christian saint, *Augustine the African* upends conventional wisdom and traces core ideas of Christian thought to their origins on the African continent.

Catherine Conybeare, a renowned classicist, is the first woman to write a biography of Augustine since journalist Rebecca West nearly a century ago. Reinterpreting the writings of Augustine and his contemporaries has formed the heart of her scholarly work. She has received awards and fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the American Council of Learned Societies, and the National Endowment for the Humanities, among others. She is Leslie Clark Professor in the Humanities at Bryn Mawr College and lives in Pennsylvania.



THE TYPEWRITER & THE GUILLOTINE

An American Journalist, A German Serial Killer and Paris on the Eve of WWII

The thrilling untold story of the trailblazing writer Janet Flanner, Paris correspondent for *The New Yorker*, who sounded the alarm about the rise of fascism in Europe while becoming enmeshed in the sensational case of a German serial killer stalking the streets of the French capital on the eve of WWII.

In 1925, the Indianapolis-born Janet Flanner took an assignment to write a regular 'Letter from Paris' for a lighthearted humor magazine called *The New Yorker*, started by some friends in New York. She'd come to Paris to with dreams of writing about "Beauty with a Capital B." Her employer, self-consciously apolitical, sought only breezy reports on French art and culture. But as she woke to the frightening signs of rising extremism, economic turmoil, and widespread discontent in Europe, Flanner ignored her editor's directives, reinventing herself, her assignment, and *The New Yorker* in the process.

While working tirelessly to alert American readers to the dangers of the Third Reich, including producing one of the first detailed profiles of Hitler in an American publication, Flanner became gripped by the disturbing crimes of a man who embodied all of the darkness she was being forced to confront. Eugen Weidmann, a German con-man who killed six people in and around Paris in the late 1930s, and who was last man to be publicly executed in France—mere weeks before the outbreak of WWII. Flanner covered his crimes, capture, and highly politicized trial, seeing the case as a guiding metaphor through which to understand the tumultuous years through which she'd just passed and to prepare herself for the dangers to come.

The Typewriter and The Guillotine offers the personal and professional coming-of-age story of an indomitable journalist set against a glamorous, high-stakes backdrop – a tightly-coiled drama full of romance and intrigue.

Mark Braude is the author of *Kiki Man Ray*, a *New York Times* Notable Book of 2022 and a *New Yorker* Best Book of the Year. He has been a Postdoctoral Fellow at Stanford, a Visiting Fellow at the American Library in Paris, and an NEH Public Scholar. 



The city of Moscow stands at the center of a nation comprising eleven percent of the globe's landmass, 11 time zones and nearly 150 million people, some 13 million of whom live in the capital. In *A Kingdom and a Village*, acclaimed historian Simon Morrison offers a vividly rendered history of Russia's heart and soul, tracing its transformation from a "big village"—the demeaning nickname the St. Peterburg nobility gave to its provincial neighbor—into a spectacular metropolis of vast geopolitical import.

Morrison reaches back further still, to the founding of the place we now know as Moscow as a fortress on a river nearly a millennium ago. In the centuries that followed, any number of external forces—from Tatar Mongols and Swedes to Napoleon and Hitler—set their sights on Moscow, reinforcing its self-conception as both a glittering prize and a site of perpetual defense and resurrection.

Drawing on a rich array of archival materials, from the birchbark scrawls that record the oldest layer of Russian civilization to the articles in European newspapers heralding the opening of the magnificent Bolshoi theater, Morrison brings to life the bloody power struggles, cultural marvels, excruciating famines, droughts, storms, and fires that have shaped and re-shaped the city and reinforced its essential character. Having first visited Moscow in 1990 and made some thirty trips since,



he excavates the city's truths from its fictions—while celebrating both—in a style that's at once deeply learned and deeply personal.

With A Kingdom and a Village, Morrison makes a persuasive, even impassioned case that to understand Moscow is not only to unlock the spellbinding mysteries of Russia's past but also, critically, to grasp the grim logic of its present. It is a magisterial biography of a place—and an essential guide to a people and a nation.

Simon Morrison is a professor of music and Slavic languages and literatures at Princeton University. 


In 1909, America was home to 253 automakers, a landscape of visionaries, schemers, and would-be barons of the new century. But when playboy millionaire M. Robert Guggenheim announced an audacious "Ocean to Ocean" contest from New York City to the Seattle World's Fair, only three companies were brassy enough to show up at the starting line: Acme, Ford, and Shawmut.

Oddsmakers favored the Acme and Itala, a pricy import also joining the race, while dismissing the pint-sized Ford—a homely little number called the Model T—and the long-shot Shawmut, struggling to survive after a factory fire. In fact, many didn't believe *any* of the cars would reach Seattle at all, as they would need to forge a 4,106-mile course of mountain ranges, mud bogs, washed-out wagon bridges, and harrowing canyon trails, long before the era of asphalt highways, seatbelts, and service stations.

But Henry Ford was intent on proving that the Model T could go the distance and beat out the muscular luxury cars---and he didn't plan to leave it to chance. Indeed, a little over three weeks after the race began, a Ford crossed the line hours ahead of the Shawmut.

Except that victory was a fraud.

The Hardest, Longest Race is a colorful tale of ambition and subterfuge, but it is also a love letter to America at the turn of the Twentieth Century. As a seeming people's champion—a car for the masses—traverses the vast nation, Moskowitz brings to vivid life the diverse populace and landscape that it would soon transform.



Eric Moskowitz spent 12 years at *The Boston Globe*, where he covered transportation and was part of the team that received the Pulitzer Prize for coverage of the Boston Marathon bombing. Historians Seth Paridon and Captain William Toti, USN (RET), hosts of the hit podcast <u>The Unauthorized History of the Pacific War</u> present a captivating new look at a forgotten chapter of World War II.

The Battle of Guadalcanal is often remembered for the U.S. Marines who stormed the island's shores. Less well known—but arguably more impactful—was the epic naval battle that unfolded just offshore. In what's been called a "barroom brawl with the lights out," American and Japanese ships engaged in one of the most harrowing sea battles in history, often exchanging fire at point-blank range. While the Marines fought bravely, the Navy bore the heavier toll—losing nearly four times as many lives, including two admirals, as the Marines lost on land. Among the dead — the five Sullivan brothers, whose tragic deaths reshaped U.S. deployment policy.

The Killing Sea brings this forgotten chapter vividly to life and dispels the long-held belief that the Navy abandoned the Marines during the battle. Paridon and Toti make a compelling case that the naval battle of Guadalcanal—not Midway—was the true turning point in the Pacific War. This gripping, untold story of colossal warships, audacious admirals, Blue Jacket sailors, and astounding bravery is told in four parts—the initial battle, a period of agonizing silence, the climactic re-engagement, and a haunting denouement which features exclusive photos of the sunken ships from the Paul Allen–funded Petrel expedition.

Seth Paridon is a professional historian with over twenty years of experience in World War II history. He began his career in 2004, interviewing veterans of the 1st Marine Division for the HBO miniseries *The Pacific*, and went on to serve fifteen years as chief historian at The National World War II Museum in New Orleans. **Captain William Toti, USN (Ret.),** served more than 26 years on active duty, culminating as commodore of Submarine Squadron 3. Since launching *The Unauthorized History of the Pacific War* in 2022, the show has surpassed 10 million views on YouTube.

The story of Vincent's van Gogh's sister-in-law, Jo van Gogh-Bonger, a woman long neglected by history who played a critical role in the artist's life and posthumous fame.

The Widow Van Gogh is not a rehash of the familiar struggles of the doomed painter, although it will be his most intimate and accurate biography yet. Martelli focuses on the perspective of a woman most people have never heard of, Jo van Gogh-Bonger, Vincent's sister-in-law, Theo van Gogh's wife. Martelli had no idea Jo existed until she read in 2022 that Jo's digitized diaries and some of her letters had been made public for the first time. So began years of immersive research into Jo's life. Martelli discovered that so much of what has been written about the Van Goghs is factually distorted or simply wrong. The Widow Van Gogh will set the record straight.

In *The Widow Van Gogh*, we finally get the full picture of Vincent's final years. She has unearthed new information that solves enduring mysteries about, for examples, why the artist lopped off his own ear and why he shot himself. At the time of his suicide, Vincent was penniless and his art was considered worthless. Theo, his brother's champion, died six months after Vincent, not due to grief as many believe. He went mad and died of syphilis. Jo was left the widowed mother of an infant son, and an incredible inheritance: her brother-in-law's 300 paintings and 700 drawings. Everyone she'd met in the art world told her to sell off the collection for whatever she could get. She ignored them and began her thirty year quest to prove that Vincent was a misunderstood genius. Jo alone was responsible to translating and publishing his letters. She brought his collection to America where it found an ecstatic audience. Because of her efforts, Vincent is one of, if not THE, most loved and cherished artists around the globe. If not for Jo, it's possible no one today would have ever heard of him.

A spellbinding nonfiction historical thriller, *The Girl In Blue* unravels the tragic history behind *La Petite Irène*, an iconic Renoir portrait of a little girl with a blue ribbon, who, with her prominent Jewish family, fought to survive the German occupation of Paris during World War II and to recover the precious looted painting after it vanished in the murky international art market.

In 1941, as Nazi rule permeated ever more deeply into the fabric of French society, a specialized unit of German troops stormed the castle of Chambord in the Loire Valley to loot one of Pierre-Auguste Renoir's most gorgeous and evocative masterworks: *La Petite Irène*. The painting is of a young girl, who poses with her hands folded in her lap. As *The Girl in Blue* will chronicle in Doreen's signature writerly prose, the painting's theft, representative of one of world history's darkest chapters, tore apart a prominent Jewish family and triggered a tragic cascade of deadly violence.

The Human Zoo follows the perspective of five main characters: The German impresario Carl Hagenbeck, through which readers will see the creation of the human zoo and the business model that would drive it for decades; the Apache warrior Geronimo, who after being captured by the U.S. government sought to use his newfound celebrity status in the human zoo to advocate for his people; the dueling anthropologists WJ McGee and Franz Boas, who used the arena of the human zoo to battle for the future of an emerging academic field, with the former positing then-dominant theories of scientific racism and cultural evolution, and the latter pushing a revolutionary new theory of cultural relativism; and Ota Benga, a young Pygmy who found himself the unwilling symbol of the human zoo's final days.

With this book, Parks aims to tell the full story of the human zoo in way that no one has before, making the case to readers that the impact of these highly influential and under-covered phenomena still echo across our culture today.

The Tragic Sinking of the Steamship Valencia

The sinking of the *Valencia* was one of the most harrowing and significant disasters of its era—and an important precursor to the sinking of the Titanic six years later. In the vein of Erik Larson's bestselling *Dead Wake*, *Wrecked* will bring the catastrophic *Valencia* sinking to life and establish it as a pivotal moment in the remarkable history of the Pacific Northwest.

On a mild January day in 1906, the *Valencia* steamed out of San Francisco and began the four-day voyage to Seattle. It was a journey made countless times by steamships, yet the *Valencia*'s crew were well aware of what could go wrong. Hundreds of ships had gone down off the west coast of Vancouver Island, an area known as the "Graveyard of the Pacific" for its poor visibility, rocky shoals, and fearsome currents. The captain, Oscar Marcus Johnson, was an experienced mariner, but on the third day of the journey, he lost his bearings in the increasingly thick winter fog. As *Wrecked* will narrate in cinematic detail, the vessel's hull was torn by jagged rocks on Vancouver Island's shallow coastline—beginning a terrifying multi-day ordeal for those onboard and a desperate "Hail Mary" rescue operation for the island's lighthouse keepers and telegraph operators.

Among the passengers was a young teacher named Frank Bunker, accompanied by his wife and their two children. The hopeful future they dreamed of would be tragically destroyed on the first night—Bunker watched his wife and children drown—yet he somehow remained determined that he, at least, would survive. Against the odds, he swam to shore and became the leader of a band of survivors later known as the "Bunker Party." They would endure unimaginable hardship as they trekked through miles of wilderness for help. Of the approximately 165 souls who left San Francisco, they would be among the fewer than 40 to survive. Opposite Bunker, Wrecked will follow Vancouver Island telegraph lineman David Logan, lighthouse keeper Minnie Paterson, and marine investigator James Gaudin as they raced to save the Bunker Party as well as the more than eighty people still trapped aboard the ship as it collapsed into the Pacific. Seeing Vancouver Island through their eyes will bring it to life for readers and offer a remarkable portrait of this unique historical moment.

Karl Hess, John McClaughry, and the Search for a New Populism

Our story begins in the 1960s with two unlikely kindred spirits: Karl Hess, a speechwriter for the far-right Republican presidential candidate Barry Goldwater, and John McClaughry, a speechwriter for Goldwater's more moderate, liberal-leaning rival. What follows is the ideological journey of these two intellectual mavericks as they crisscross the political spectrum—Hess veering sharply left toward libertarianism and anarchism, and McClaughry edging rightward into Ronald Reagan's circles. One moved deeper into the establishment, the other further outside it. Yet despite their divergent paths, both came to believe in a better form of governance, which they saw in the promise of a new brand of populism built on decentralized institutions, neighborhood power, worker ownership, and democratized tools. Though they only would meet once, they would correspond for years, working individually and together to defy left-right divisions in order to give power back to individuals, and anchor politics in people and place.

In today's fractured political landscape—where distrust in centralized institutions, economic alienation, and the search for authentic community are again at the forefront—the Hess-McClaughry vision of bottom-up, locally grounded populism holds more relevance than ever. But populism has become a dirty word. Associated with authoritarianism and cultural grievance, it's been coopted by strong man demagoguery and Silicon Valley technocrats, preying on today's political dissatisfaction. *The Anarchist and the Republican* invites readers to rediscover an alternative: a populism that is pluralist, constructive, and democratic, that can empower citizens across the political spectrum who seek a more just, humane, and decentralized future.

Best known as the author of the classic lesbian novel *Rubyfruit Jungle*, <u>Rita Mae Brown</u> has also been a rabble-rousing activist, early queer celebrity, avid fox hunter, and prolific writer of cozy mysteries—and in RITA DID, June will use the story of Brown's colorful life as a conduit for the larger narrative of the lesbian-feminist movement and the radical transformations in the status of queer lives between Brown's birth in 1944 and our current moment. More so than perhaps any other



woman during this period, Brown was almost invariably in the proverbial "room where it happened," whether in a hand-dyed Lavender Menace T-shirt at the Second Congress to Unite Women in New York City or sporting a gold Rolex watch in the pages of a gossipy Washington Post article about her break-up with tennis star girlfriend Martina Navratilova.

As these examples perhaps suggest, Brown's life and legacy are as complicated as her times, and in *Rita Did*, June will honor Brown's status as a pioneer while simultaneously exploring her apparent contradictions. Inspired by historian Barbara Tuchman's framing of biography as "a portrait of an era," June will offer readers both biography and history writ large, telling the story of a woman and time that has, to date, been largely neglected by major works of trade nonfiction.

The Understudy will begin on February 25th, 1976, and take readers inside the Whitney Museum for a one-of-a-kind exhibition: Articulate Muscle: The Male Body as Art. Andy Warhol was among the visitors who crowded into the museum's fourth floor gallery to see Arnold Schwarzenegger, then 28 years old, take the stage for a live bodybuilding demonstration. That night would spark a friendship that launched Schwarzenegger's career and proved Warhol's as a cultural power broker.

The Understudy will show how, for all their differences—in their sexuality, their self-presentation, their politics—Schwarzenegger and Warhol each knew what it was like to be an outsider with big ambitions. The son of immigrants, Warhol had moved to New York from gritty working-class Pittsburgh. He had made the leap from commercial artist to gallery artist, overcoming the contempt of critics and peers alike. And in his art, he had explored how celebrities like Elvis Presley had not only achieved global fame but used their fame to "cross over" and find new success as athletes, actors, or politicians. Warhol had a theory to explain this phenomenon and Schwarzenegger gave him the perfect opportunity to test it. Per-

haps being "the right thing in the wrong space," as Warhol had so often been in his career, could actually deliver a crucial advantage. In other words, Schwarzenegger would never fit in among buttoned-up Americans—and that was precisely why he would be a star.

Elizabeth's dramatic, plot-driven biography contributes to and changes our understanding of American slavery. The clear target audience for this book will be readers of sweeping, deeply researched, and prizewinning recent histories such as Nicole Eustace's Covered with Night (Liveright, 2021), W. Caleb McDaniel's Sweet Taste of Liberty (Oxford, 2019), and Ilyon Woo's Master, Slave, Husband, Wife (37 Ink, 2023). And at a time when female agency is very much in the public eye, Elizabeth's story will have special, timely resonance.

R. Isabela Morales is a public historian and the award-winning author of *Happy Dreams of Liberty*, which was published by Oxford in 2022 and won the Frederick Douglass Book Prize among many other honors. A recognized expert on the history of slavery, Isabela is the founding editor of Princeton's public history initiative, the Princeton & Slavery Project, and the current Education and Exhibit Manager at the Stoutsburg Sourland African American Museum, Central New Jersey's first and only Black history museum.



Equip yourself with the knowledge to avoid common hiking hazards and stay safe on the trail.

The statistics are difficult to believe, but every week more than ten hikers die and at least another two hundred require rescue in North America, amounting to more than 500 lives lost and more than 10,000 people rescued every year. Analysis reveals they span the full spectrum of trail experience. The silver lining among this alarming data reveals that most hiker deaths and rescues come from just a handful of preventable causes. This presents an opportunity for this book to make a significant impact. Despite a number of articles published over the years in the attempt to raise trail-goers' awareness of this issue, the data remain unchanged. Every week, hundreds continue to fight to survive among avoidable circumstances while awaiting overwhelmed and understaffed wilderness rescue teams.

Rob Scanlon, M.D. is Board Certified in Pulmonary Medicine and Critical Care (ICU medicine) and actively in practice for over 20 years. He began his journey as a hiker/backpacker in 2002 to reduce the stress of work life. Throughout his clinical career he has followed his passion for patient education in his specialty to improve outcomes and longevity for his patients with underlying lung disease.

He joined the Wilderness Medicine Society (WMS) in 2018 through his love for the outdoors and medicine and to pursue his growing desire to impact the staggering rate of hiker death and rescue. Along with attending conferences, he has been accepted as a fellowship candidate of the WMS.

In 2018 Dr. Rob established Medical Media Consulting to engage with creators of

In *Raised to be Free*, Jane Ward draws from her decades of influential scholarship in queer, gender, and feminist studies and her own education as a queer parent to offer up a new way of not only raising children but of relating to them in nearly any context. She calls it "queer parenting," and it's the urgently needed antidote to the hyper-gendered world in which we're currently raising our kids. At its heart, queer parenting is meant to free children from the rigid gender norms that dictate and constrain contemporary life. Jane advocates for a parenting style that puts kids' self-determination first.

Jane argues that anyone—parent or no—can apply the philosophy of queer parenting to their interactions with kids by adhering to four core principles: 1) embracing young children's natural queerness in the literal, quirkiest sense of the word; 2) resisting the impulse to label a child's gender at a young age and instead giving them space to decide on their identity when and how they want; 3) refraining from imposing adult ideas about sexuality on children's behavior and interests; and 4) modeling strong feminist relationships with our fellow adults, to demonstrate to kids how to take care of each other and our environment. These methods help readers to push back against a rising tide of parental isolationism, and to relate not just to our own children, but to all children. In short, *Raised to be Free* gives readers a hopeful and practical way to raise kids to be open-minded and accepting humans.

Yet, crucially, *Raised to be Free* is not a prescriptive parenting guide. It will surely change readers' worldview and subsequently the way they think about and treat children, but ultimately this book is a cultural critique and a call to action, the kind of book that gets people talking and offers loads of examples of how its arguments are already taking effect in the world.

Jane Ward is a feminist studies professor at UC Santa Barbara. Would you voluntarily give up one of your five senses? And not only that, would you pay a premium for the opportunity? Most of us would say, "no, of course not! That's ridiculous." Yet, every single day millions of us do. We turn off our ears. We do this in the name of focus, peace, and, ultimately, control. Walking down the street, riding an elevator in an office building, waiting for an appointment to start, it's impossible to ignore how many of us are moving through the world cocooned within AirPods and headphones designed not only to play whatever media we choose, but also to block out the sounds of the world around us.

Since the 1960s a quiet revolution has occurred in consumer technology. An unobtrusive industry has carefully domesticated noise, converting it from an unwanted industrial byproduct to a desirable domestic partner and a first-rate workmate, marketed to the public as self-care technology. In *The End Of Listening*, Mack Hagood recounts fascinating stories behind technologies like the SleepMate, Beats by Dre, and nature sound apps. In *Unflattering*, Dacy will lay out the process she uses to help women shake free of our internalized baggage around what we think we should wear and instead, figure out what we actually want to wear: the clothing that fits our bodies at their current size, matches our preferences and tastes, and allows us to show up for our best work as professionals and people.

Dacy doesn't hesitate to acknowledge the ways that our clothing is political. Whereas flattering often serves as a coded way of reinforcing diet culture and body hierarchies, the *Unflattering* manifesto acknowledges the need to consciously cultivate our sense of personal style separate from the messages of the patriarchy, anti-fatness, and white supremacy. Our bodies deserve clothes that fit. Thinness is not a prerequisite for looking or feeling good. It's possible to care about what we wear while simultaneously pushing back against the harmful effects of consumer capitalism.

In the vein of accessible, enlightened handbooks like *How to Keep House While Drowning* and *Rest is Resistance, Unflattering* is a a welcome invitation and companion for the many women whose relationships to their bodies have been transformed by the principles of intuitive eating, Virginia Sole-Smith's and Aubrey Gordon's writing on anti-fat bias, and Lindsay and Lexie Kite's work on body resilience.

There may be no other music genre that has evolved like rock and roll. 



Few musicians in the history of music have amassed a fanbase as huge and as engaged as Taylor Swift has. She'll draw on scores of new interviews, asking label executives, assistants, session musicians, engineers, band members, hair and makeup artists, and music video directors - all of whom were involved with her first four country albums ("Taylor Swift," "Fearless," "Speak Now" and "Red") about their earliest memories of Taylor. She'll speak with the nation's biggest country stars Swift opened for as a young teen and the roadies who carried her equipment. All will have memories of her evolution as a songwriter and performer and Yahr is sure to uncover details Swifties will savor.

A complete, and objective history of the Police, one of the most iconic bands of a generation, has never been written.

This is a band that sold more than 100 million albums around the world, revolutionized MTV (and then disbanded at the height of their popularity), all without sacrificing a shred of artistic integrity. When they surprised us by reuniting after 22 years later in 2007 - to take their act to even larger venues – somehow it all seemed like a natural progression.

But this isn't a story about album sales and sold-out arenas. It's about the combustible, creative genius between three artists – Sting, Stewart Copeland and Andy Summers - that led to five stellar albums over five years, peaking with 1983's "Synchronicity," a record that's considered the defining work of the second British Invasion. The Police quit when they were the most popular band in the world. The Police were not a fad. When they reunited for their unexpected tour in 2007, they sold out stadiums and arenas around the world. Their catalog, from their earliest hits ("Roxanne," Message in a Bottle") to their Synchronicity five-pack of singles, remains immensely popular. On Spotify, the Police continue to stream 27 million songs a month. There is a lot to uncover. And as a compulsive, obsessive reporter, Geoff Edgers plans to document every moment.

The first book focused on the last decade of Wright's life and career, his travels around the globe, and his observations—published and unpublished—that offer both an indispensable perspective on a pivotal moment in world history and a bracing political tonic for readers today. The story has a significant international angle, following Wright's late-career travels to Ghana, Spain, and Indonesia, and how he found renewed inspiration in witnessing the decolonial efforts of the 1950s when people around the world were navigating and agitating for their freedom from oppression. It's a fascinating read—part focused biography, part narrative history, and part handbook for developing a global consciousness.

Whether we encounter him on classroom syllabi, in our extracurricular reading, or on the perennial lists of best American novels, Richard Wright is an undeniably key figure in 20th-century letters. As one of the first Black literary superstars, he redefined the standards of commercial and critical success for writers of color with his 1940 novel *Native Son* and 1945 memoir *Black Boy*—both megahits that sold hundreds of thousands of copies within weeks of publication. Conventional accounts hold that after he left the United States for Paris in 1946, Wright accomplished little of note, quietly ceding the way to authors such as Ralph Ellison and James Baldwin who would match, exceed, and even challenge his place in the canon. Perhaps it's no surprise that conventional accounts fail to tell the full story—that in the ten years prior to his untimely death in 1960, at age 52, Wright found renewed purpose as a writer and world citizen, reflected in his later life experiences and creative output that have gone woefully underexplored until now.

Drawing on Wright's oft-forgotten accounts of his travels as well as his unpublished writings, journals, correspondence, and photographs housed in his archives at Yale, *A Bridge Across The World* will craft an absorbing, cinematic tale of a familiar literary figure's surprising second act.

Natural Born Killers was released in August 1994 to lines around the block in nearly every American city...and then to lawsuits and outrage from, among others, a presidential candidate and one of America's most famous novelists. Warner Bros., the studio behind it, almost didn't release it. Politicians railed against it. Boycotts were called for. Thirty years after its release, the movie's predictions have largely come true, and yet it still feels like a warning shot. Riot will show how the universe produced this—how a violent and media-drenched world yielded the script, and how this particular collection of people ended up roaring from location to location across the American southwest before taking over an actual maximum-security prison to make a film that was both a product of its exact moment and ahead of its time in a way that none of the participants could have possibly understood.

Blessed with complete and ongoing access to the entire living cast and crew (Robert Downey, Jr;, Woody Harrelson, Oliver Stone, Juliette Lewis, Tommy Lee Jones and on and on), Ryan D'Agostino is crafting a volume that is as wildly entertaining as a story as it is deeply insightful. The shoot lasted 56 days, during which time the production was a wandering caravanserai, the entire cast and crew driving themselves from place to place, sharing motel rooms and meals (and controlled substances) in primitive, at best, conditions.

The script started out as a screenplay that Quentin Tarantino disliked so much that he gave it away. And, upon its release, the resulting movie was instantly controversial and ecstatically popular and has proven to be a condemnation of the weaponization of modern media and a sorrowful harbinger of a culture of violence that would soon lead to the spate of mass shootings that characterize our society even now.

Apocalyptic movements can depict, in fascinating detail, what concerned society most in any given time period, and how they chose to express and relieve those fears. Hill takes a deep dive into some of history's most unique, bizarre, and captivating apocalyptic movements, introducing readers to unheard-of doomsday cults and shedding new light on stories which already live on in infamy. Along the way, readers will learn why apocalyptic movements gained traction when they did — what cultural events, hopes, and fears allowed them to take hold at those particular points in time — and which themes we seem doomed to repeat over, and over, and over again.

A few years ago, Trymaine Lee, though fit and only 38, nearly died of a heart attack. When his then five-year-old daughter, Nola, asked her daddy why, he realized that to answer her honestly, he had to confront what almost killed him—the weight of being a Black man in America; of bearing witness, as a journalist, to relentless Black death; and of a family history scarred by enslavement, lynching, the Great Migration, the also insidious racism of the North, and gun violence that stole the lives of two great-uncles, a grandfather, a stepbrother, and two cousins.

In this powerful narrative, Lee weaves together three strands: the long and bloody history of African Americans and guns; his work as a chronicler of gun violence, tallying the costs and riches generated by both the legal and illegal gun industries; and his own life story. In *A Thousand Ways to Die*, Lee answers Nola and all who seek a more just America. He shares the hard truths and complexities of the Black experience, but he also celebrates the beauty and resilience that is Nola's legacy.

The Future of Truth is an immensely timely and insightful new work written in the vein of provocative bestselling books about technology and society such as The Age of Surveillance Capitalism, Weapons of Math Destruction, and The New New Thing.

Rosenbaum is a brilliant thinker and has long been on the forefront of debates about technology and media. In the 1990s, he anticipated today's algorithm-driven video feeds with the user-generated television series *MTV News Unfiltered*. But for the past year, Rosenbaum has been concerned above all with the looming significance of artificial intelligence in our lives. The book will report on the most important emerging uses of AI—from doctor's offices to police stations to dating apps. Then, too, it will feature perspectives from well-known experts including cognitive scientist Gary Marcus and entrepreneur Andrew Yang, giving readers everything they need to know about the battle for truth in our AI-powered future.

What a City Council Apology Tells Us about Race in America Today

In 2021, the international media descended upon Tulsa, Oklahoma for the centennial commemoration of the May 31-June 1, 1921 massacre in which a white mob killed more than 300 African American residents, burned homes and businesses, and decimated a thriving town once referred to as "The Black Wall Street."

Tulsa Speaks is about the ongoing work of the Tulsa City Council, both before the Centennial and afterward, when the cameras were no longer trained on the city. It dives deep into the interpersonal dynamics among the nine councilors, exploring the continuing fight for reparations and racial justice, and the long-running efforts of the sole African American councilor, Vanessa Hall-Harper of District 1, to bring repair to Greenwood.

Tulsa, like many municipal bodies across the country, serves as a hopeful sign of what we might become, as Americans, and as a microcosm of race relations in America today.

We, too, are facing unprecedented climatic changes as we struggle to adapt to a rapidly changing world. In the end, readers will discover that they don't need aliens, lost Atlanteans, or any other pseudo archaeological fantasy to be filled with wonder and fascinated by the epic story of the human odyssey in the Americas. Archeologists along the Pacific Coast—both above and below the waves—are on the precipice of writing the new paradigm of the first Americans. As history continues to show us, whatever the new narrative turns out to be, it will be ephemeral. It will be right until it's wrong.

Opening with a bold ethical, ecological, and cultural critique of the seductive idea of resurrection biology, Lewis sets the stage by exploring the latest breakthroughs and debates surrounding this controversial science. As extinction and de-extinction become pressing existential concerns, LOST examines how our shifting understanding of these forces has shaped—and will continue to shape—our perspectives on life, death, and the planet's future.

From ancient myths and early indifference to the modern-day fear of a rapidly warming planet and the threat of nuclear annihilation, Lewis traces humanity's evolving relationship with extinction, revealing how it now touches every aspect of our existence. Inspired by his popular Caltech course, *Lost* is a groundbreaking global, interdisciplinary study that not only examines extinction from a historical and biological perspective but also explores its profound cultural and ethical implications.

In an era when the future feels increasingly uncertain, *Lost* makes a powerful case for why we must fully understand and respect the finality of extinction— even contemplating the possibility that a planet without us might not be a catastrophe, but something altogether different from what we imagine. Sweeping in scope and deeply thought-provoking, this book challenges readers to reframe our understanding of loss, survival, and human existence.

Daniel Lewis, PhD is the Dibner Senior Curator for the History of Science and Technology at the Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens in Southern California, and a writer, college professor, and environmental historian. He is the author of *Twelve Trees: The Deep Roots of Our Future* (Avid Reader, 2024), *Belonging on an Island: Birds, Extinction, and Evolution in Hawaii* (Yale, 2018) and *The Feathery Tribe: Robert Ridgway and the Modern Study of Birds* (Yale, 2012). Lewis also serves on the faculty at Caltech, where he teaches environmental humanities courses, as well as at the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena.
